The surprise of the meeting was the selection of Trainer Hayward to manage the football game next year. A graduate manager was looked for, but the new turn seems to be considered not a bad thing from expressions heard this morning.

Fourteen new "O's" Twenty-two sweaters were granted last night to the football players. Fourteen of them were new men, who had not won their emblem before this year. A recommendation was also made to arrange for a ceremony in which to present the winners of emblems with their letters.

The new men to win "O's" are: Dodson, Main, Michael, Halley, Hayes, Klitz, Sullivan, Hickson, Latourette, Chandler, Newton, Menns, Sweek, McKinley. The old men, who will get jerseys are: Captain Moulten, Hurd, McIntyre, Clarke, Pinkham, Gilles, and Voight. Mar-

ager McEwen will also be presented with an emblem. Next Monday evening at a banquet these men will choose their captain for next year. The report of Manager McEwen showed that he had cleared something like \$1400 for the season, over all expenses and salaries. Trainer Hayward, C. N. McArthur and Fred Moulten, were appointed a committee to secure a coach and an assistant for next season. Coach Forbes, of course, will be secured if possible.

### FORMER EUGENE MAN DIES AT PORTLAND

Frederick Breidemeier, an old resident of Portland, died at his residence, 387 Stanton street, at an early hour Thursday morning, after a short illness. He is survived by his wife, six sons, Michael, Fred, Herman, Edmund, Otto and Walter, and by two daughters, Mrs. R. Buntendorf and Mrs. H. C. Schmeier.

The funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the German Lutheran church, corner of Sellwood and Williams avenue.

Mr. Breidemeier was born in Germany January 1, 1834, and therefore at the time of his death was 74 years of age. He left his fatherland in 1851, coming to New Orleans, where he resided until 1874, when ill health compelled him to leave the southern climate. He went to Minden, Neb., and was the founder and a subsequent resident of that place. In 1888 he left the middle west and came to Oregon. Eugene drew his attention for a few years, but later on he came to Portland, where he resided until the time of his death.—Portland Journal.

## LABOR DISPUTES WILL NOT BE INVESTIGATED

Washington, Dec. 12.—What is considered a test vote on the arbitrary investigation of labor disputes between employers and employes was taken today when a representative moved to reopen the consideration of the measure in the house. A vote on the question resulted in the defeat of the motion by 114 to 11.

The backers of the measure are disappointed, for it is considered that the test shows it is impossible to push forward this particular piece of reformatory legislation during this session. It also shows the house may be very conservative.
