### BEACH HARGIS ON TRIAL FOR FATHER'S MURDER

Irvine, Ky., Dec. 16.—The trial of Beach Hargis, charged with the murder, last February, at Jackson, Ky., of his father, James Hargis, was called here today. The wife of Judge

## CASTRO'S IRON RULE OVER VENEZUELA NEARING ITS END

Caracas, Monday, via Willemstad Wednesday, Dec. 16.—The people of Caracas arose today against Castro. An infuriated mob, unhindered by the police, swept through the city, wrecking the property of the president's henchmen and his closest friends. The people rounded up all statues and pictures of the president from the clubs and other semi-public buildings, and burned them on the Boulevard de Plaza. President Castro's rule in Venezuela is probably ended.

### MARTIAL LAW DECLARED

Caracas, Tuesday, via Willemstad Wednesday.—The Venezuelan capital yesterday was the scene of the outbreak of disorder, following the warlike activities of the Dutch warships. Martial law was declared in order to put a stop to the rioting and pillaging. Several agitators were arrested. There was no actual conflict between the people and police, and all foreigners were unmolested.

Further dangerous demonstrations are anticipated. No official act to depose President Castro has been taken, but it is expected at any moment. The troops were called out by Acting President Gomez, who issued a proclamation prohibiting any further manifestations.

### INDIAN RUNNER DEFEATS DURANDO

New York, Dec. 15.—As on the memorable occasion of his first Olympiad, Dorando Pietri collapsed with a sight of the goal tonight and Tom Longboat, the Indian runner, who had been led by a yard or more nearly all the way, won the Marathon race at Madison-Square Garden. The race was hard fought from start to finish and kept the thousands of spectators in wild excitement. At 25 miles Dorando was leading by two yards. In the fourth lap of the last mile, while the crowd was crying itself hoarse, both men slackened perceptibly. Then suddenly Dorando staggered and dropped. Longboat finished alone. His time for the distance of 26 miles, 385 yards, was 2:45:05 2-5.

### SUDDEN DEATH OF ELI C. LARIMER

Eli C. Larimer, a well-known citizen of Eugene, died suddenly at his home at 633 Oak street last evening, shortly before six o'clock. He had been in poor health for a long time, but yesterday he was feeling as usual and just before death came was preparing for supper. He was out on the porch when he fell and a few minutes afterward expired. Physicians were summoned, but they found that life was extinct. Eli Coulter Larimer was aged 82 years, 6 months and 16 days. He was born in Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania, May 29th, 1826. He moved to Indiana in 1846 and to Iowa in 1853. He crossed the plains

to California during the gold fever in 1853 and went back to Iowa in 1855. He was married in 1858 to Miss Caroline Dixon. In 1872 they came to Oregon and settled near Halsey in Linn county. They moved to Eugene about 1887 and have lived here ever since. Besides his wife he leaves five daughters and one son. The daughters are: Mrs. Hester Armitage, near Springfield; Mrs. Ada McPherson, Springfield; Mrs. Lulu Andrews, Eugene; Mrs. Laura Fraver, Canada; Miss May, at home. The son, Isaac Larimer, who is the youngest member of the family, lives at Springfield. Three children are dead, two having died in Iowa and one in Oregon. Mr. Larimer was a member of the Methodist church in his early manhood and later joined the Baptist church, but never identified himself

with the local church in Eugene. He was a sturdy pioneer of the thorough-going kind, and was a kind husband and true father. The funeral will be held at the Gordon's undertaking parlors tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

### QUINN CONVICTED OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

Everett, Wash., Dec. 16.—The jury in the superior court today brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against Richard Quinn, who mortally wounded his wife several months ago. Quinn alleged the shooting was accidental, and that he was intoxicated at the time. The couple had separated a few days before the tragedy. Misses Stella and Edith Armitage came up from Portland this afternoon to attend the funeral of their grandfather, E. C. Larimer.

### FOUR KILLED AND OTHERS INJURED

Hagerstown, Dec. 15.—Four men were instantly killed and four others seriously injured by a portion of the concrete pier of the new bridge over the Potomac at Williamsport, collapsing.
