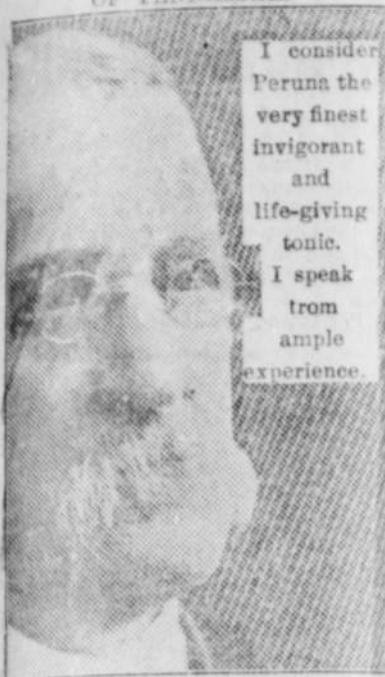

SEEK TO ENJOIN COUNCIL FROM BUILDING PLANT

Suit Filed Against City to Prevent Building of Electric Power House

(From Saturday's Daily Guard.)

Late yesterday afternoon a suit to enjoin the city council from carrying out their plans for a municipal electric power plant on the McKenzie river, and the recently appointed water committee from pretending to act as a board of water commission, was filed with the county clerk, the plaintiffs being the following well-known citizens: S. Smeed, P. M. Williams, E. J. Bangs, W. Kuykendall, J. W. Shumate, J. E. Patis, F. L. Chambers, P. W. Osburn, and T. G. Hendricks.

The defendants named in the suit are as follows: The City of Eugene, a municipal corporation; J. D. Matlock, mayor of the City of Eugene; T. H. Garrett, J. E. Roach, W. S. Moon, Geo. Fisher, John M. Williams, F. J. Berger, A. W. Gilbert, and Sherman Heller, councilmen of the City of Eugene, pretending to act as the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Eugene; and J. D. Matlock, T. H. Garrett, J. E. Roach, W. S. Moon, Geo. Fisher, John M. Williams, F. J. Berger, A. W. Gilbert, and Sherman Heller, and J. D. Matlock, P. D. Newell, W. L. Cheshire, R. M. Day, W. T. Campbell, pretending to act as the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Eugene.

The complaint goes on to recite at great length objections to the building of the power plant, but the objections boiled down to a few words are about as follows: That the appointment of the first water commission was illegal and pending the referendum has no right to act. It is illegal for the reason that the mayor was named on the commission. The council has no right to act as a water commission because it is forbidden by law. The expenditure proposed in building the plant is in excess of the legal debt of the city and balance of bonds now available were not granted for the purpose of putting in an electric plant.

The plaintiffs pray for a decree as follows: WHEREFORE, plaintiffs pray for a decree of this court enjoining and restraining the said defendants and each of them, their agents, servants and employees, and each of them from entering into any contract or contracts, or agreement, or the building or constructing of a water power or electric power or canal, ditch, flume or pipe line or transmission line, or from purchasing any real estate or personal property, or right of way for the purpose of constructing such water power or electric power, or from employing any person or persons to work upon the same, or from purchasing any material, machinery or apparatus for such purposes, or from incurring any liability therefor, or from extending any of the proceeds of said bonds except as authorized by the charter of the city of Eugene, and for such other and further relief as to this court may seem agreeable to equity, and that during the pendency of this suit, a preliminary injunction be issued so restraining said defendants, and that plaintiffs have judgment against said defendants for their costs and disbursements in this suit.

Council Will Fight Case. Mayor Matlock when seen by a reporter this morning, stated that the council will fight the suit to the last ditch and will employ the best of legal talent for that purpose. Mr. Matlock said that it was probable that some one else will be employed to represent this interest, whom the plaintiffs in the suit are said to represent. Thompson & Hardy are attorneys for the plaintiffs.

THREE SUSPECTS ARE UNDER ARREST FOR TRAIN ROBBERY. Portland, Dec. 19.—Three men were arrested in connection with the robbery of the train on the McKenzie river. They give their names as Oscar Johnson, Henry Benson and Chris Bona, and claim to be Norwegian. They may be taken before the train crew of the O. R. & N. train which was robbed Thursday night for possible identification in connection with that crime.

LAND CONTEST CASES HAVE BEEN DECIDED. The contest cases of J. H. McCormick against the homestead entry of Percy Long, has been decided by the commissioner on Dec. 11, in favor of the contestant, McCormick. The contest against Emma Weyer by Berdina Meredith, was decided on Dec. 12th in favor of the contestant by the United States land commissioner.

ROBBERS RAIDED NEBRASKA BANK. Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 19.—Robbers raided the State Bank of Ceres, eighteen miles north of here, early today, overpowered a boy who surprised them at their work, demolished the vault and secured \$1,000 and escaped. The boy was tied inside the bank and was not discovered until this morning.

SENATOR BOURNE TELLS WHY PRESIDENT SHOULD RECEIVE LARGER SALARY

Washington, Dec. 19.—Explaining his bill for increasing the salaries of the president and vice president, Senator Bourne, of Oregon, today said that aside from all sentiment in the matter, he was of the opinion that if a man was big enough to be president of the United States, the biggest corporation in the world, he certainly was as big in the business of government as the president of a railroad or manufacturing enterprise, and should be paid, as a business proposition, what the demands of the position indicate as a fair compensation.

The president's salary has never borne any relatively adequate proportion to the mental and physical work and worry of the position, which are annually increasing.

Senator Bourne called attention to the fact that the president of France's salary is \$114,000, with a like amount for executive expenditures.

Th Bourne bill proposes for the president a salary of \$100,000, and the vice president \$25,000.

CENSUS PLACES FOR POLITICIANS

Washington, Dec. 19.—The appointment of clerks and other employes needed for the work of the thirteenth annual census will be congressional patronage as in the case of the previous census. Senator Long, chairman of the committee on census, today reported to the senate the house bill providing for non-competitive examinations to be held throughout the country by means of the civil service machinery, but based on a form of examination to be provided by Director North, of the census bureau, and confined to persons designated by the senators and representatives. About 3000 places are to be filled, and preference will be given to persons who have participated in previous census work.

CITY MARSHAL AND COMPANION SLAIN BY BANDITS

Higbee, Mo., Dec. 19.—Frank Cain, city marshal, was shot and probably fatally wounded and Elmer Magruder instantly killed in the city jail by three men whom Cain had arrested for robbing the railway station at Salisbury. The men gave their names as Fred Anderson, Jas. and Bud Drusor, of Des Moines, Iowa. Cain and Magruder had gone to the cell to search the men when they opened fire. The marshal shot one prisoner in the arm, but one of the trio escaped in the excitement.

MINING BROKER SERIOUSLY SHOT

New York, Dec. 19.—Henry B. Snydam, a mining broker and member of the curb stock market, and an alderman of Plainfield, N. J., was shot and dangerously wounded in his office, 390 Broad street, today by John C. Lumsden, an inventor, who claims Snydam refused to pay him promised money for an invention. He also asserts he shot in self defense. The shooting followed a struggle with a young man named Downs, a clerk in the office, who sought to disarm Lumsden. While Downs held him, Lumsden reached under his arm and fired two shots, one striking the broker near the heart while the other went through the window.

Snydam is in a hospital in a critical condition.

OREGON SIENNA PAINT CO. WILL HAVE EUGENE STORE

D. H. Weyant, manager of the Oregon Sienna Paint Co., with headquarters and factory at Salem, was in Eugene today looking after the matter of establishing a branch store for his company in Eugene. Just now there are no vacant store rooms to be had here, but Mr. Weyant has one in view that he thinks will be vacated soon and hopes to secure it. If unable to get a room after the first of the year, Mr. Weyant says, his company may purchase a lot and erect a building of its own. The company is anxious to enter the Eugene field of business and is willing to expend quite a sum of money to do so. The crude material for the manufacture of the company's paint is mined on the Ellis Simmons place, near Walker station, in Lane county.

WOMAN SENT TO PRISON FOR TERM OF LIFE

Oakland, Dec. 19.—Mrs. Isabella J. Martin, convicted of conspiracy in the dynamiting of the home of Judge Ogden in this city, was sentenced today to life imprisonment.

Except for a fussed face Mrs. Martin made no demonstration of any sort. After brief proceedings Judge Wells declined the request of Mrs. Martin that she might meet him in chambers and she was removed to the county jail.

Every effort to delay judgment and obtain a new trial has failed, and the plea of insanity was set aside by Judge Wells, who said he had no doubt as to her sanity. Immediately after being taken to jail Mrs. Martin collapsed and became hysterical. She grew worse until she was in a dead faint. At 1 o'clock the attendants at the jail had worked over her for more than an hour and she had still failed to recover.

WINDOW GLASS WORKERS OUT ON STRIKE

Cleveland, Dec. 19.—Advices received at the headquarters of the National Window Glass workers indicate that the members of the organization quit work generally throughout the country this morning in order to enforce the adoption of a new scale which carries an increase of practically 25 per cent. A number of plants have signed the new scale and there will be a meeting of the manufacturers at Columbus, Ohio, next Tuesday to take action relative to the new scale.

OREGON ELECTRIC PAYS DIVIDENDS

The annual report of the Oregon Electric Railway company was handed into the Railroad Commission today, showing expense accounts and earnings from the first of January to June 30th, 1908 on their lines between this city and Portland.

The gross earnings of the company for the six months was \$65,340.98; operating expenses, \$48,805.77; taxes, \$3,000 and net earnings, \$13,535.21. From the net earnings account as above, the Oregon Electric has been doing an enormous business, and these earnings were mostly derived from passenger trade alone owing to the fact that during the time which this report covers, there was no freight service outside of express transportation of the Wells-Fargo Express Co.—Salem Journal.

Tolmie on East Ninth street, in Eugene, and Miss Laura Larimer, who clerked in the store for several years, were married at Seattle a few days ago. Mr. Traver having come down from Alaska and Miss Larimer having gone from here to the Sound city for that purpose. This is quite a surprise to their many friends in Eugene. The bride, since Tolmie & Traver went out of business here, was employed at the Axillary department store until a short time before the marriage.

The total number of school children in the Eugene district, finally enumerated, is 2,423 as against 2,175, enumerated last year.

Michael W. Weber was today appointed guardian of his two minor children, Garrett Raymond Weber and Michael Ralph Weber, who own property by virtue of bein heirs of their mother, Mamie Weber, deceased. Walter Price, Frank Weber, and C. Cole, were appointed appraisers of the property.

C., Dec. 19.—The insurgents against the present rules of the house, are leaving Washington for their homes, jubilant over the progress they have made in stirring up an insurrection in the Republican ranks. They assert that the rules are to be amended before the end of the session. Although it is acknowledged by some leaders of the insurgents that their only hope of amending the rules lies in the action of the minority. The new minority leader, Champ Clark, does not feel himself bound in binding his party to any program until he sees how the Republicans will line up.

To Pension Teamsters. Representative Alexander, of Missouri, today introduced a bill providing for pensions for teamsters employed as such during the war with Mexico. The government has heretofore refused to grant pensions to teamsters.

The Senate Adjourns. The senate today adjourned until January 4th.
