This story was outlined before the jury in the case yesterday afternoon by the assassin's lawyers. ## LOOK OUT FOR STOLEN MONEY ORDERS

Merchants and business men generally should never cash money orders for a stranger. There are thousands of stolen orders afloat, a favorite method of disposing of them is to make a small purchase and tender in payment a money order for a much larger sum, receiving the balance in money.

A large number were stolen at Aberdeen, Wash., on Dec. 9, 1908, together with the rubber stamps necessary to make the orders appear genuine when fixed up by the thieves or their confederates.

## MUST MAKE LEVIES BEFORE JANUARY 1
