

LOWER HOUSE OF CONGRESS SAYS EXPLANATION OF THE PRESIDENT UNSATISFACTORY

Washington, Jan. 8.—Having given consideration to the president's further views regarding the secret service, contained in his message to the house Monday, the special committee appointed to deal with the subject today brought in its final report. Accompanying it was a resolution which declared it to be the sense of the house that it shall decline to consider any communication from any source which is not respectful and recommending that the objectionable portion of the president's annual message be laid on the table; that similar action be taken with respect to the message of last Monday because of it being "unresponsive to the inquiry of the house" as to what the president means when he says in referring to the limitation placed upon the field of operations of the secret service that the "chief argument in favor of the provision was that the congressmen did not wish themselves to be investigated."

PERKINS MAKES SPEECH

Crowded galleries greeted Representative Perkins, of New York, when he arose to make his report as chairman of the special committee. Messrs. Tawney, Smith, Sherley and Fitzgerald were on the floor prepared to resent what they deemed the insinuations of the president upon them as members of the committee on appropriations. They were not alone in their indignation. Indeed, for some time past the feelings of the members have been growing more and more intense and some of them have been giving way to their sentiments in language which fully testified to their wounded pride.

After Perkins had concluded his speech on the secret service resolution Denby said the president had veered from the path of recommendation and just criticism into the realm of personal abuse, speculation and innuendo.

During the discussion Secretary Latta appeared with three messages from the White House and his appearance was greeted with roars of laughter. The messages being of a routine character, they were not allowed to interrupt the proceedings any length of time.

Bennett, of New York, proposed the adoption of the Perkins resolution and declared that if the house should accept it, its action would have no more effect on the character which history would give to President Roosevelt than the action of the senate on President Tyler's record in connection with his attitude toward Andrew Jackson.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY COMMITTEE

Mr. Perkins concluded his speech as follows:

"During long centuries our English speaking ancestors struggled and bled that a representative government might be established among English people. Our revolutionary forefathers, more than a century ago, struggled and bled that our government should be a representative government; that the laws of the American people should be passed by the representatives chosen by the American people. The congress of the United States today exists as a result of centuries of struggle for popular government. Let every man who is a member of it vote on this question in the manner which seems to him most worthy of the traditions of which we are the heirs, of the institutions of which we are the protectors, and of the people of whom we are the representatives."

As was the case when he first spoke on the question before the

holidays, Mr. Perkins was frequently interrupted by applause. Upon the conclusion of his remarks he submitted the committee's report, which, after quoting from the President's message was as follows:

Committee Report. "Understanding this language to be a reflection on the integrity of its membership and aware of its own constitutional duty as to its membership, the House in respectful terms calls on the President for any information that would justify the language of the message or assist it in its constitutional duty to purge the House of the implied charge of corruption."

"The President in his message of January 4, denied that the paragraph of the annual message casts reflections on the integrity of the House; attributes to the House 'an entire failure to understand my message'; declares that he has made no charge of corruption against any members of this House and by implication states that he has no proof of corruption of any member of this House. 'Whether the House, in its resolution of December 17, 1908, correctly interpreted the meaning of the words used by the President in his annual message or whether it is understood that language as the President implies, will be judged now and in the future according to the

HARRY THAW IS GRANTED TRIAL TO DETERMINE IF HE IS SANE OR INSANE

NYACK, N. Y., Jan. 9.—Harry Thaw is entitled to a trial by jury on the question of whether he has recovered his sanity, according to Justice Tompkins, who today heard arguments on a writ of habeas corpus obtained by Mrs. Mary C. Thaw, his mother. In applying for the writ Mrs. Thaw declared that Harry was not a criminal, having been acquitted by a jury; that he is now sane and should not be in prison. Harry Thaw appeared in court, accompanied by counsel.

District Attorney Jerome asked that the case be transferred to New York county, and said Thaw was a dangerous person and incurable.

Justice Tompkins reserved his decision as to where the trial should be held, and remanded Thaw to the asylum meanwhile, and ordered that he be permitted to see his counsel alone at any time.

THAW TAKEN FROM ASYLUM

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Jan. 9.—Harry Thaw was taken from the Matteawan state hospital for the criminal insane today to New York, to be present at the hearing before Justice Tompkins, on application of his mother, Mrs. William Thaw, for a trial by jury to determine whether Harry is insane, and whether he ought not to be liberated.

CONFERENCE OVER OREGON PINE IS HELD

Wellington, N. Z., Jan. 9.—A great conference of the timber trade was held today to discuss the question of the importation of Oregon pine. The press was excluded after the delegates asserted that the conference was for the benefit of the industry, and that the importation of Oregon pine, fully fifty sawmills would close down indefinitely. Mill owners demand the imposition of a duty on all imported timber in bulk.

FULTON BILL DEFEAT IS SERIOUS

Washington, Jan. 7.—The Fulton bill is dead. Its day of grace was last year when it had back of it the strong recommendation in the president's annual message, a page in the annual report of the interstate commerce commission, urging such legislation, and incalculably powerful groups of shipping associations with all influence at their command.

Among strong elements which harbored it were lumbermen of the United States, besides other industries. Elkins was never expected to report the bill favorably, and he intended, if possible, to fail to report it at all. Opinion was general that he could not have been forced into action.

The senate committee on interstate commerce was a tie on the vote to report the bill favorably, but Elkins got Foraker to authorize Elkins to record his ass against the measure. There will be no minority fight for the bill.

Senators and representatives will await the inauguration of Taft before taking further action. As a result the increased freight rates of 10 per cent will be enforced. Many of these rates became effective January 1.

Effect of the Defeat. Shippers of the Northwest and of the entire country are practically at the mercy of the railroads, through the failure of the senate to favorably report on the Fulton bill.

"Other interests seem to be more powerful in the senate than the shippers or the country," the interstate commerce commission and all those who have advocated the passage of the Fulton bill," said J. N. Teal this morning.

NEWS NOTES FROM JUNCTION CITY

Oscar Smith has sold his cottage to C. E. Sanders, for \$875. Mr. Smith and family left Monday for Portland, where they expect to make their home.

The tax levy for Junction for next year will be a total of 34 mills, divided as follows: County, 10 mills; city, 10 mills; school, 9 mills. This is four mills more than last year.

School had to be dismissed several days this week during the cold weather on account of the failure of the heating system. The system, however, is alright, but there is not enough of it. Something must be done even if it means having to be put in, which action the directors are now considering. The contractors have failed to make good their agreement and are therefore liable to forfeiture and damages.

The Commercial club held its usual meeting Tuesday evening despite the disagreeable weather. A petition was presented by a special committee appointed for that purpose, asking the city council to order the improvement of certain streets and to establish the grade for both streets and sidewalks. The streets included in the petition are as follows: Avenue from railroad to Kalina; Greenwood to Tenth; Ivy north to Tenth; Seventh to Kalina. A resolution was adopted endorsing the action of the city council in asking the county court to make Junction a separate road district.—Times.

"Resolved, That the House, in the exercise of its constitutional prerogatives declines to consider any communication from any source which is not in its own judgment respectful; and be it further

"Resolved, That the message of the President, sent to the House on January 4, 1909, being unresponsive to the inquiry of the House and constituting an invasion of the privileges of this House by questioning the motives and intelligence of members in the exercise of their constitutional rights and functions, be laid on the table."

NEW PHONE SYSTEM FOR COTTAGE GROVE

The latter part of last week a party of men representing the Home Telephone company, stopped off in Cottage Grove, while enroute to Southern Oregon, to look up the question of a local independent business. They have been informed that a franchise will shortly be asked of the city council for such an undertaking. Cottage Grove at present has a good system and the service is prompt and efficient but there is still an opportunity for improvement in the way of equipment. The system as it now stands consists of the old "grind organ" crank to rouse "central," while other places the size of Cottage Grove enjoy later methods and equipment. The Commercial club is looking into the matter, and the Pacific States company express their intention of establishing a more modern central office and system about town.

Prune Dryers Elect. The Prune Dryers' association met at their annual meeting yesterday afternoon. A new board and officers were elected and the report of the past year and the statements of the officers were received. The new board of directors for 1909 are: J. I. Jones, president; B. K. Lawson, secretary; J. B. Rouse, Ben Lurch and John Spray. The affairs of the company are in splendid shape and they look forward to the new year's business with brighter prospects than ever before. A manager will be secured to conduct the business and the business will be continued in a better way than before.

INJUNCTION AGAINST INSURANCE COMPANY GRANTED

New York, Jan. 9.—Supreme Court Justice Erlanger last night issued the injunction asked for by William Hepburn Russell, a policy-holder in the Washington Life Insurance Company, restraining the Pittsburgh Life & Trust Company, which recently took over the business of the Washington Life, from disposing of any of its property or securities it obtained from the latter company.

The decision on the application for a receivership was reserved.

YOUNG LADY IS FUED VICTIM IN KENTUCKY

Williamstown, Ky., Jan. 9.—Miss Ethel Ransom, aged 25 years, was killed and five injured, two perhaps fatally, in a street feud fought early today. There has long been a bitter feeling between the Ransoms and the Ransons families, and it led to trouble when they met at a dance last night at the home of Wesley Barnes, two miles east of Williamstown, culminating in a fight in the street in which clubs, stones and pistols were used.

BOUNDARIES OF NEW COUNTY ARE MODIFIED

The committee appointed by the Cottage Grove Commercial club to draft a bill providing for the formation of a new county from north Douglas and south Lane to present to the legislature this winter, and to outline the boundary for the new county, is ready to submit its report to the club. It is understood that the committee has been very modest in its demands for territory from the two old counties. That the west boundary line will only take in Lorane valley, leaving at least a 30 mile strip along the coast in both Lane and Douglas for the formation of a coast county as some future time if required. The south line barely takes in Leona, leaving Drain in Douglas county and includes only a very little more than the Bohemia mines and Steamboat creek in north-east Douglas. The north line runs east and west a short distance north of Creswell, leaving out to Lane county all of the Middle Fork country, the new north boundary intersecting the east boundary line at Waldo lake.

"Nesmith County" The name suggested for the new county by this committee is "Nesmith county" in honor of that grand, sturdy old pioneer, Col. Jas. W. Nesmith, a settler of 1843, whose home was in Polk county. He was a democrat and was prominent in the early affairs of Oregon, having served as circuit judge, legislator, trustee of Oregon academy at Lafayette, captain of a company in the early Indian troubles, was severely wounded by the Indians at Oregon City, became Brigadier General Oregon Guard, and served one regular term and one unexpired term in the United States senate from Oregon in the early sixties. That his name should be perpetuated in the manner suggested is a happy thought on the part of the Cottage Grove Commercial club committee and it is a suggestion which will not doubt be endorsed by the club and the people generally.

Oregon Hotel Change. Col. and Mrs. W. H. Blair have sold their furniture and fixtures to Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Westbrook late of Roseburg, who have secured a lease on the Oregon hotel building and second story of the Stewart & Porter brick adjoining, which contains many nice new rooms and suits of rooms with bath, all of which Mr. Westbrook will furnish in elegant style and he will conduct a first class hostelry.

Another Sawmill. Stocks and Harlow having purchased the Alca sawmill plant from J. H. Chambers, propose to move it to Cottage Grove and operate it at this place providing a suitable location can be supplied by the town. The Commercial club has the matter under advisement and is endeavoring to find a location for the new mill which would provide another good-sized payroll for this city.

Moving His Mill. Lou McCoy and a small force of men have been busy some days past moving his portable sawmill from the Lee place at Divide, over to the Bert McDole place, where the mill will make a fine job of sawing ties, which will be delivered on the railroad right-of-way at the Veatch spur, a short distance north of Divide. Ties having recently advanced from \$7.50 to \$9, many mills will cut ties almost exclusively hereabouts.

Other Items. A lively basketball game was played between Cottage Grove and Drain Friday evening at Drain, resulting in a score of 17 to 9 in favor of the local team. The Drain boys put up a pretty good game, but were outclassed by the local team.

EARTHQUAKE ALONG ENTIRE WESTERN COAST OF MEXICO

Mexico City, Jan. 9.—The entire western coast of Mexico was shaken, by an earthquake yesterday which was felt at Acapulco and at Oaxaca. The damage was trivial and no fatalities are reported.

LAKE GENEVA GIVES WARNING OF EARTHQUAKE

Genoa, Jan. 9.—Inhabitants in this city state that the waters of Lake Geneva rose and fell for two days with curious syphon-like action for three weeks before the earthquake at Messina. The same phenomena was noticed before the San Francisco disaster and is attributed to seismic gases.

The over-Sunday round trip rate on the Southern Pacific from Eugene to Portland has been advanced from \$4 to \$5.

MRS. FLORENCE ERB AND SISTER ACQUITTED BY JURY OF CHARGE OF MURDER

Media, Jan. 7.—Mrs. Florence Erb and Mrs. Catherine Beisel, her sister, charged with the sensational murder of Mrs. Erb's husband, J. Clayton Erb, on October 6, 1908, were today acquitted by the jury and discharged from custody.

The jury was out nearly eighteen hours, and almost up to the moment when the jury announced it had agreed the prospects for a unanimous decision of the twelve men was not very bright. During the morning the jury filed into court and asked for further instructions on the question of self-defense, and while the spectators were still standing in the court room discussing the instructions given the jury word came that the men had agreed. The defendants were sent for at once.

During this heartbreaking interval the defendants were so nervous they could not remain still. Jumping from their seats, striding up and down, sitting down again, their hands clasped behind their backs, they were more restless than any jungle animals in a cage of the city zoo.

When the verdict was read the sisters fell in each other's arms and the women in the audience wept as they looked at the pathetic scene. In an instant the defendants were surrounded by friends and their relatives and overwhelmed with congratulations. This scene lasted several minutes, then, after the jury had been polled and discharged, Mrs. Erb hurried to the foreman and wrung his hand. Mrs. Beisel did likewise, and they went down the entire line of twelve men. Tears stood in the eyes of most of them as the thanks of the women were sobbed out in broken syllables.

Mrs. Erb said after the jury had gone that she was confident she would be acquitted, but had not so much faith as regards her sister's fate. Mrs. Beisel stated she was not at all confident of acquittal, "for you never know what twelve men will do." She also was confident of her sister's freedom.

YOUNG LADY EMBEZZLED FUNDS OF EMPLOYERS

Kansas City, Jan. 7.—Miss Nettie O'Donnell, aged 32, former cashier and bookkeeper of Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Co., was arrested last night on the charge of embezzling \$40,000. According to the police Miss O'Donnell has made a complete confession of the embezzlement, which took place in July, 1908, and a short time afterward fire destroyed the branch office of the company, where the woman was employed. Most of the company's books were burned, but Miss O'Donnell's cash book was, however, found only slightly damaged and an expert accountant was employed to investigate the firm's affairs and discovered the shortage. Miss O'Donnell asserts she does not know why she took the money.

The fire was believed to have been of incendiary origin, but Miss O'Donnell denies any knowledge of it. Frank O'Dow, also former bookkeeper for the company, has been arrested and the police state that O'Dow has signed a statement that he received \$500 from Miss O'Donnell and with it started a cigar stand. Miss O'Donnell is now his clerk. She declares O'Dow did not know she had embezzled the money.

THORNTON HAINS DEPRESSED OVER OUTCOME OF TRIAL

Flushing, Jan. 9.—All evidence in the trial of Thornton Hains will be in today. The defendant has been visibly depressed since he left the witness stand Thursday, but said today he had no fears of conviction and explains his depression as the effect of the strain of the long trial, and "so much depends on the outcome," as he expressed it.

CARVER RAILROAD SOUTHERN PACIFIC LINK

The Carver road, the Corvallis & Alsea River Railway, is now completed to within one mile of Monroe, the rails being laid to the cross roads at Spring Hill. The people at Monroe are confident that this road is merely another link in the S. P. system and they fully expect to be on a line that reaches further than Monroe. They have it sized up that the Alsea branch is never to be built but a timber road.—Corvallis Times.

TILLMAN SAYS PAPERS WERE TAKEN OFF DESK

Washington, Jan. 9.—Senator Tillman reports that some papers bearing upon the Oregon land fraud case, and which he requires in the preparation of his speech in reply to the president's charges, are missing from his desk at the capitol. He does not say the papers were abstracted by detectives, but does not say it would be impossible for such an official to gain access to the room and to his desk, both of which are fastened by ordinary locks.

Washington, Jan. 3.—President Roosevelt tonight made public details of an investigation by postoffice inspectors and secret service agents of Senator Tillman's connection with an alleged "land grab" in Oregon, as he presents the evidence to Senator Hale, in response to the latter's request to the heads of the various executive departments for a statement of the opinions of the secret service the president undertakes to show:

That Mr. Tillman used his influence as a senator in an effort to force the government to compel a railroad corporation to relinquish its control of land grants from the United States in order that he and his family and his secretary, J. B. Knight, might profit through the purchase of some of the land;

That the senator used his government franking privilege in numerous instances for the conduct of private business.

NAVAL CONSTRUCTOR HAS BUTTERFLY WIFE

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—The sensational suit for divorce by Naval Constructor Holden Evans, of Mare Island, has added another chapter to the book of "home tragedies" in the Army and Navy. In the complaint Mr. Evans tells over again the old story of the butterfly wife with nothing to do and the naval officer with little. The incident upon which he bases this action occurred Christmas day, but it was, he alleges, the culmination of many days of misery resulting from incompatibility of two natures, each, pulling in opposite directions.

"My wife has come to think that I regard my work as the all-important thing and thinks I have neglected her. It is the truth."

Mr. Evans charges that "while he was ill upstairs, his wife entertained a young naval officer down stairs and that, when he suddenly appeared, he found the officer kissing his wife."

Though he neglects to name the offender in his complaint, gossip in naval circles and in Mare Island says it is Lieutenant S. W. Osburn, chief engineer of the Wyoming, and one of the very young officers. It is also said that the two have been acquainted about a month, meeting at some social function at the navy-yard.
