FIRE PROTECTION OF EUGENE BEST IN WILLAMETTE VALLEY

Waste of Water by Users Causes Drastic Regulation by the City

Ample fire protection is provided in Eugene by the measures adopted by Superintendent Taylor of the municipal water plant, and Eugene is not in danger of a catastrophe as are most of the cities in the Willamette Valley, including Portland. The measures to provide the protection are the shutting off of water in the district West of Willamette street, except during the hours 7:30 to 1:30 in the morning and from 4:30 to 5:30 in the afternoon.

The superintendent also stated this morning that many pipes are frozen in West and East Eugene and in the business district. However, he states, that because the pipes are nearly empty is no reason that they should freeze, and the complaint of many people from the western portion of the city that their water pipes are frozen on account of the shutting off of the water is a misconception and that one section of the town is as bad as another.

"More water is used during the cold season than in the summer during the irrigation season," the superintendent said in explaining the water situation.

Last Friday night the reservoir was full and the pumps doing their best. By Sunday morning the water was all out of the reservoir, and the water was demanded faster than the water could put it into the pipes. Nearly every house in the city had their faucets open to keep the pipes from freezing. Some were wide open, others just a little, but the combined drain used a tremendous amount of water, more than I have ever seen at any other time."

WILL TEST RIGHT OF OFFICIAL TO HOLD HIS OFFICE

Olympia, Jan. 12.—Harry Ballinger, attorney for Lieutenant-governor Coon, said today that proceedings to test the qualification of Lieutenant-governor-elect Hay would be instituted tomorrow in the supreme court after Hay had taken the oath of office. Coon's contention is that Hay disqualified himself for office in the primary election by purchasing newspaper advertising space of a character alleged to be prohibited by the primary law.

TRIAL OF TIMMONS BEGINS AT SALEM

Salem, Or., Jan. 11.—The selection of a jury to try C. Y. Timmons, charged with the murder of his wife in this city last fall was begun before Judge Burnett in the Marion county circuit court at 1 o'clock today.

Timmons, it is alleged, killed his wife as she lay asleep by his side in a lodging house on Court street, by cutting her throat with a razor and then hitting her on the head with an ax.

Timmons attempted to commit suicide after the alleged murder, but recovered and must now stand trial.

WILL PLANT MANY TROUT EGGS IN M'KENZIE

Commercial Club Committee Reports 150,000 on Way—Monthly Meeting of Club

At the regular meeting of the Commercial Club last night a large number of matters of importance were discussed and acted upon. principal among them being that of the formation of the new county of "Nesmith." A delegation of citizens from Cottage Grove was present, for the purpose of presenting the matter before the club. The speakers were H. O. Thompson, Hon. R. W. Veatch, Attorney J. C. Johnson, N. H. Martin, C. H. Burkholder and J. F. Spray. All these gentlemen presented facts and figures in support of the measure and were enthusiastic over the matter. F. W. Osburn, S. H. Friendly, E. O. Potter and Dr. D. A. Paine spoke against the proposition and the last named moved that it be the sense of the club that the organization is opposed to the division. The motion was unanimously carried.

Home Telephone
Another matter of importance was that of an independent telephone system for Eugene. C. C. Craig, representative of the Home Company, was present and addressed the club on the advantages of his system. He said it would cost Eugene about \$75,000 to install a system with 2000 phones. Mr. Phillips, of the Pacific States Company, said that his company would have the improvements completed here inside of sixty days, and after that the service would be as good as any on the coast.

Fish For McKenzie
An important matter was the report of the fish committee stating that 150,000 trout eggs had been shipped from Washington to be planted in the fish hatchery on the McKenzie river to restock this famous fishing stream. It was urged that all sportsmen attend the meeting of the club tonight to discuss the preservation of the county's fish and game.

Smaller Matters
B. Little Wells, representing the Sunset Magazine, was present and addressed the club on the matter of advertising in the magazine, presenting an elaborate scheme. The club authorized a contract for such advertising for Lane county.

The committee appointed to enlarge the billiard room reported two bids, one for \$250 and the other for \$170. The committee was instructed to report further.

The piano committee reported a majority in favor of purchasing a \$350 Mehlin, a minority favoring a \$500 Weber. A proposition was made by the Eilers piano house, of Portland, and the Stevens & Hullin house, of Eugene, whereby the Weber would cost the club only \$350, and the Stevens & Hullin house would be ordered.

The club endorsed the Buccell entertainment course and the arts and crafts organization in this city.

Sugar Beets
Manager Hartog presented reports on the analysis of the samples of sugar beets sent from here to California, and a committee was authorized to investigate the matter of securing a sugar factory.

The result of the analysis of the beets sent from here are as follows: Sample grown by P. Casperson, 14.6 per cent sugar; by W. P. Bradley, 16.8 per cent; L. B. Rossman, 18.1 per cent. The price paid by the sugar company is \$4 per ton for 13 per cent or less, and 25 cents a ton for each additional per cent, so that Mr. Rossman's beets would bring \$5.27 1/2 per ton and Mr. Casperson's \$4.40. The beets were analyzed by the Hamilton City (Glenn county) Sugar Co., whose own beets run as high as 23 per cent.

A letter from a firm in the East that wants to install a fruit and vegetable cannery here was referred to a special committee.

Advertise in Many Papers
Before the club meeting the board of governors met and authorized Manager Hartog to place classified advertisements of Eugene and Lane county in 20 Eastern newspapers with a combined circulation of 3,508,900. The advertisements will run for four weeks.

Denver, Jan. 12.—John W. Shafrath, former congressman from Colorado, was today inaugurated governor. The ceremonies were unusually simple and witnessed by an immense crowd.

Constantinople, Jan. 12.—The Turkish government accepts the Austro-Hungarian offer of \$10,000,000 indemnity for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, thus removing the possibility of war.

THOUGHT KERR WAS DEER AND KILLED HIM

(From Tuesday's Daily Guard.) George Kerr, residing near Wildwood, near the end of the Oregon & Southern railway, between Cottage Grove and the Bohemia mines, was shot and killed yesterday afternoon by Orin Hunt, a friend and companion, who mistook him for a deer. News of the killing was received early this morning by Coroner Gordon over the telephone. He left on the delayed overland train this morning for Cottage Grove, to which place the body of the young man was brought on the train. The coroner received no particulars of the shooting over the phone, and concluded to investigate to see if an inquest was necessary.

Later Sheriff Bown telephoned to Cottage Grove to learn particulars, but could find out little aside from the fact that the two young men were out hunting together in the snow when Hunt spied something that very much resembled a deer and fired. He was horrified to find that the object was his friend. He immediately ran to the nearest house and secured assistance, but found that Kerr had expired in the meantime. Hunt is naturally grief-stricken and refuses to be comforted.

Deputy Sheriff C. C. Hammond left on the afternoon train for Cottage Grove to look after the matter for the sheriff's office.

Purely Accidental
Deputy Sheriff Hammond telephoned to Sheriff Bown late this afternoon giving him more of the particulars of the shooting. He said it was purely accidental and no blame was attached to any one. Kerr and Hunt were accompanied by Kerr's brother. They had crippled a deer and separated to look for it. George Kerr suddenly appeared from behind a clump of brush and Hunt, thinking it was the deer, fired. Kerr was aged 26 years and Hunt's age is 22.

The boiler of the heating plant at the Bangs Livery Co.'s stables blew up this morning and ruined the plant. No other damage was done. Luckily there was no one standing near or there might have been a fatality to record.

APPROPRIATION FOR RIVERS AND HARBORS WANTED

Portland, Jan. 12.—The Chamber of Commerce, Manufacturers' Association and Commercial Club of this city and nearly all the commercial bodies of the Pacific coast, have telegraphed the Pacific coast senators and congressmen in Washington, to the speaker of the house, president of the senate and rivers and harbors committee urging the passage at this session of congress of a rivers and harbors bill, and especially calling attention to the danger of delay and the great financial loss attendant upon the stoppage of the work now in progress on the Pacific Northwest and the entire Pacific coast. The commercial bodies in all cities and towns are taking similar action.

MCINTIRE SUMS UP IN HAINS CASE

Flushing, Jan. 12.—M. F. McIntire summed up for the defense in the trial of Thornton Hains today. He charged that a conspiracy of the Bay-side Yacht Club members, influenced by motives of revenge, was responsible for the conduct of the defendants, and that the killing of Annis was the act of a madman.

George O. Knowles and W. T. Bailey have bought the new and secondhand store at 75 West Eighth street, and will enlarge both their store and stock. Fred Finseth, an employee at the Eugene Planing Mill Company's plant, while at work on a shaper this morning, accidentally got his left thumb caught in the machine, tearing the end of the member off. He will be laid off on account of the injury for some time.

FIFTY MINERS LOSE THEIR LIVES BY EXPLOSION

Bluefield, W. Va., Jan. 12.—As the result of another explosion in the Lick branch mine at Switcheback, twenty miles from here, between fifty and one hundred miners were killed this morning. The number, however, may be largely increased as from 280 to 300 miners were at work at the time and it had not been ascertained shortly before noon how many escaped.

On December 28, an explosion occurred in this mine, causing a loss of fifty lives. The cause of the explosion at that time was not ascertained and the cause of today's explosion is yet to be determined.

SENATOR HEYBURN RE-ELECTED BY IDAHO SOLONS

Boise, Jan. 12.—United States Senator Heyburn was re-elected today by the legislature in separate session, and the joint session tomorrow will ratify today's action. The vote stood: Senate—Heyburn, 11; French, 1; Stockslager, 8; Woods, 2. House—Heyburn, 44; Stockslager, 5; Woods, 4.
