WIRELESS PROVES GREAT VALUE IN OCEAN WRECK

Boston, Jan. 23.—The White Star steamer Republic, which sailed from New York yesterday for Mediterranean ports, carrying 259 first class and 211 steerage passengers, was rammed by an unknown vessel and disabled, 26 miles south of Nantucket in a thick fog early today. The passengers and crew were taken off in safety by the Italian steamer Florida from Naples to New York.

Immediately after the accident the wireless apparatus in the Republic flashed the news of the plight in all directions and within short time several vessels were on the way to offer assistance to the first message of alarm which said stamer was sinking and the later message said that the engine room was flooded but the steamer could keep afloat.

The United States government revenue cutters picked up the call for assistance and within a few minutes the cutters Acushnet and Gresham were on their way to the scene.

Conflicting Reports.
Vineyard Haven, Mass., Jan. 23.—It was reported at 1:30 this afternoon that the Republic was still afloat, but the incoming Luchania reported at 12:30 that the vessel would sink.

Valuable Vessel.
New York, Jan. 23.—The Republic is valued at \$1,500,000 and her cargo was worth about \$60,000.

Soon he became quiet and when time for arising for the day's work came she was unable to awaken him. She soon discovered with horror, that he was dead. The fright occasioned by the dream, whatever it was, was too much for his heart action and the organ gave way under the strain. Mr. Nice had been in his usual good health the day before and felt well when he went to bed.

Deceased was aged about 56 years and leaves besides his wife, two sons, Ira, on the farm, and John, who is employed in the Eugene postoffice.

The funeral will be held tomorrow at 1 o'clock with interment in the Mt. Vernon cemetery.

LADY PAGET COMES TO UNITED STATES

London, Jan. 23.—Lady Paget, daughter of the late Paron Stevens, sailed for New York today, accompanied by her son, Albert, and several friends. Her stay in America will be extended, as it is her first visit to her native land in a number of years. She does not plan to return here until March, and will therefore be in New York during the height of the season's social festivities. She will spend some time in Massachusetts, the native state of both her mother and her father.

New York, Jan. 23.—New York society is looking forward with keen interest to the visit of Lady Paget, who, according to a cable dispatch, sailed from England today for this city. Already arrangements are being made for some brilliant social functions to be given in her honor.

Lady Paget is a wonderful woman, darling, original, talented—a social success. As Mary Pike Stevens—better known as "Minnie"—she was the leader of "The Bouncers," a set of pretty girls of long ago who were given additional fame by the clever pen of the late Lawrence Olyphant. Her parents belonged to the intellectual and cultured as well as to the very wealthy section of New York society. Mrs. Paron Stevens had a salon to which were welcome all the clever foreigners whom business or pleasure brought to New York, and her young daughter had many opportunities of seeing members of the great European world of which she was soon to become a component part.

The marriage of Miss Stevens to the brilliant young soldier who is now known as Major General Sir Arthur Paget, took place just thirty years ago, and introduced the beautiful young American girl into the most exclusive circle of English society.

The eldest son of the late General Lord Alfred Paget, Major General Sir Arthur Paget's military career has been exceedingly distinguished. Five years before his marriage he had received his baptism of fire in the Ashantee War, and he has taken part in every important conflict in which his country has engaged during the last thirty-five years, including the South African War.

Lady Paget at once became very popular among her husband's people. The king is godfather to her eldest child, himself now a distinguished officer, and both their Majesties have always shown the beautiful and clever American hostess marked favor and sympathy, the king often being her guest in London at dinner.

RAISE FUNDS TO DEFEND MITCHELL

Indianapolis, Jan. 22.—The United Mine Workers of America today voted \$2,500 as preliminary aid for Messrs. Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison, to aid future legal proceedings in the contempt case. A resolution was also instructed by the Miners' International executive board to appropriate in the future as much as necessary to give these men proper defense. John Mitchell arrived and addressed the convention saying he had spent so much of his life building up the union that he will go to jail if necessary to advance its cause. "I will defend it as I would defend my child," he said.
