MAPLETON BY THE  
SUNSET SEA

Mapleton, Ore., Feb. 14, 1909.  
Editor Guard:—Mapleton by the "Sunset Sea," on the Siuslaw, or the "Faraway Slough," in Western Lane county, is a place of some two hundred people. It is in the heart of the mountains, which rugged stand on every side. The bottom land lies in narrow strips, widening out as you approach Florence. This land is as good as any in the world, and all kinds of large and small fruits are grown in abundance, except cherries among the smaller and tomatoes among the larger. These, however, are grown on some farms with sugar beets and corn. Apples seem to do as well as they could anywhere. Thousands of bushels are fed to the hogs during the winter season. I am told that one man who tried to get some apples out from here contracted for 15,000 bushels, and at that between Mapleton and Florence, 20 miles. These were to be good apples, of a given size, with no worms. This latter was not hard, as worms are hardly ever seen. If orchards were trimmed and taken care of, there is no telling what might be produced in the apple line.

Besides this Mapleton lies in the midst of one of the best timber belts in Lane county, and I doubt not in the world. On the watershed of the Siuslaw there are millions of feet. One of our citizens, who is said to be good in his arithmetic, has figured it out that the present rate of lumber sawing of over ten hundred thousand years to saw the timber standing at the present time. There is one 150-acre tract, on what is known as Indian Creek, that is said by loggers to contain 9,000,000 feet within its lines.

When the timber is removed the country is good dairy country. This leads us to the question, what are the needs of this part of Lane county? There are two great needs, a railroad and an open bar at the mouth of the river. If we cannot have a railroad we should at least by some means better wagon roads. Our roads should be wider, so wide track wagons could have no trouble in coming in. They should be smooth enough, at least in summer, so that automobiles could get in with ease. This would bring summer travel and help consume our products. One of our citizens recently traveled five days to haul a load of apples to Eugene. The main need, however, is an open bar. With the open bar would come the railroad and like benefits. This has been taken up by some of our business men of late, and some successful work has been done. The bonding of Western Lane has been brought before the people, and the privilege to use the government tools to extend the jetty has been granted. There is one thing to be added. The \$100,000 should be made \$200,000 if possible. We believe, with some of the rest of the people here, that \$100,000 will not extend the jetty far enough to do much, if any good. Then if the government did not take it up, we would have spent \$100,000 and still be without an open bar, whereas \$200,000 would put it in shape so that vessels could come and go almost at will. We would have a greater debt, but with it we would have an open bar, and be in a shape to raise the debt, where if we should spend the \$100,000 and have no bar, we would be \$100,000 worse off than we are now. We believe the slogan ought to be "200,000 for the bar." Now we can make the people see the truth, and as Douglass said: "The consideration of the human mind is

such that if it once disregards the conviction forced upon it by a revelation of truth, it requires the exercise of a higher power to produce the same conviction afterward." That is to say that if you can make the people believe that the Siuslaw bar ought to have \$100,000, under the same conviction you can make them believe that she ought to have \$200,000. In other words, it would be easier to gain \$200,000 at one time than \$200,000 at two or three successive times, as you would be driven to do under \$100,000 if the government did not take up the project. In this all of Lane county ought to join for with an open bar and a railroad from Eugene to Mapleton Lane county would have a world market at her feet.
