INDICTMENT AGAINST

ALLEY DISMISSED

Frank E. Alley, a prominent Roseburg attorney and horsebreeder, and Rev. Steven W. Turnell, also of Roseburg, were yesterday released on an indictment which had been returned against them in February, 1906, for alleged land fraud. The motion to dismiss the indictment was made by Tracy C. Becker, special assistant to the attorney-general, who has recently returned from California to handle the government's side of the suit against the Oregon & California Railway Company.

Attorney Alley and Rev. Mr. Turnell, together with A. R. and E. R. Downs, were indicted by Francis J. Heney and the case has never come up for trial. In asking that the indictment be dismissed as to Alley and Turnell, Mr. Becker said that Mr. Alley was an attorney-at-law, and during the years the indictment was pending against him Alley could not practice before the interior department. Mr. Becker also said that it was the wish of Mr. Heney that the indictment be dismissed.

The Downs brothers were never arrested and the indictments against them were allowed to stand.—Oregonian.

SOME EXCITEMENT AT COTTAGE GROVE

There was a little scene enacted in Cottage Grove last evening in which two married men and a married woman figured as principals and which was as spicy and sensational as anything ever read in the yellow journals under the great bright red scarlet heads.

John Doe was supposed to be away from home. Richard Roe called upon Mrs. Doe. John happened unexpectedly on the scene. Richard scooted out of the rear exit bare-headed, meeting his friend, John, face to face. Then came the fireworks. FATHER AND SON NARROWLY ESCAPE DEATH

Last Sunday morning while Frank Crabtree and son were attempting to cross Row river at the Nelson ford on their way to this city from the Stock farm, which they have leased, both narrowly escaped drowning. The river was swollen from the recent rains, but not considering it dangerous, Mr. Crabtree and son attempted to cross with their team and wagon, and when about half way across the turbulent stream, the wagon box was swept from the running gears down stream, carrying Mr. Crabtree and son with it. After floating a short distance the wagon box capsize, throwing its occupants into the cold waters. The elder Crabtree not being able to swim, was assisted by his son in keeping above water for a short time, but upon both becoming almost exhausted, the father bid his son goodbye and urged him to save himself, whereupon, the young man struck out and with some difficulty finally reached the bank. Upon looking down the river he saw his father struggling in water not over his head but seemingly unable to keep upon his feet and waded out, so the young man rushed to his assistance again and succeeded in helping his father regain the bank, both being in an exhausted condition. In the meantime the double-trees had become detached from the wagon and the team easily succeeded in crossing the river. It was a harrowing experience and a most narrow escape from death. The only loss consisted of a bank book and several valuable papers which will cause Mr. Crabtree some little difficulty in getting duplicated.

Lost Part of Wagon. By Mr. Crabtree the Leader is informed today that the wagon box, and front running gears of his wagon have been recovered from the river, but that a careful search has thus far failed to locate the rest of his wagon.

CONVENTION PLAN DEFEATED IN SENATE

State Capitol, Salem, Feb. 17.—Representative Mariner's bill, permitting political parties to hold conventions and recommend candidates for election at the primary nominating election, was killed in the Senate this afternoon. Johnson and Schofield, State members, voted for the bill; while Coffey, an anti-statement man, voted against it. There were only 12 votes in favor of the bill.

No State Auditor. There will be no state examiner and no uniform system of bookkeeping throughout the state. The books and accounts of the state institutions and the state officers and of the county officers as well will be kept just as they have been in the past. The house yesterday afternoon refused the bill drawn by the special auditing committee at the request of the house and rewarded the committee by indefinitely postponing its bill.

The measure provided that the office of state examiner should be created by the legislature and the county examinations of the state and county officers. It failed by the vote of 31 to 21; 8 absent.

Bounty on Coyotes.

The coyote scalp bounty bill, H. B. 150, passed the senate this morning without amendment. It met with some opposition because it carries bounties on cougars, wildcats and wolves, and for payment of one half from the general fund, some senators contending that the revenue from payment ought to come in part from the game fund.

The senate, in passing Kay's bounty bill a few days ago, left out the coyote bounty, but fixed the same rewards as are named in the house bill on other animals that destroy deer.

This bill provides for half payments from the game fund. An effort to amend the house bill so that it would apply only to coyotes, thus allowing coyote scalps to be paid for from the general fund and other bounties to be paid in part from the same fund under the senate bill now in the house, was defeated.

Normal Bill Rejected. The senate committee on ways and means has decided to cut out the deficiency appropriation of \$19,000 to reimburse those who contributed to the support of the Drain normal school after the state quit appropriating for it.

As the school was conducted under auspices of the state regents, those who put up the money, under some color of state authority, claimed the state should repay them. But Nottingham and his colleagues think otherwise.

Chairman Nottingham says that though he has been importuned in behalf of the various land purchase schemes, only one expenditure for land will be authorized. This will be a \$3000 item for six acres adjoining the asylum site on which it is proposed to erect the new heating plant.

A splendid farm of 618 acres, within one and a half miles of Eugene, has already been contracted for, and a stock company is now being organized with \$30,000 capital to purchase this land and fully equip it with everything necessary to make it one of the most sanitary and up-to-date dairy and fine stock farms anywhere to be found. Two carloads of the very best selected registered dairy stock consisting of Jersey and Guernsey cattle, will be purchased in the Eastern states by an expert judge of dairy stock. He has been contemplating this matter for months, and has been doing a lot of corresponding with several of the most prominent breeders in the East. He knows just how to do this thing and is now in a position to land two carloads of the very best bred milk producing stock to be found and at very reasonable prices. The purpose is to raise fine dairy stock, and to supply Eugene with perfectly sanitary milk.

The stock will be thoroughly tested for tuberculosis and fully guaranteed free from any disease whatever before being purchased, and will be tested and examined every few months by the local, state and county inspectors, and everything will be run from first to last on sanitary and up-to-date methods. The benefits to Eugene and Lane county of this far-reaching enterprise cannot be estimated. The business will be started with about fifty head of cattle, and enlarged to one hundred by increase and importation as desired. The business will be run with economy and business methods under the management and direction of a board of five directors elected by the stockholders.

The dairy business has proven itself one of the safest and surest sources of income in various parts of the country including Lane county. The difficulty with the Eugene milk supply has been that successful dairymen soon make a stake and quit the business turning the dairies over to new hands, thus rendering the supply uncertain in purity. The advantage of the present plan lies in the incorporation of the company that will operate the business continuously on business principles, after the manner of banking and other corporate interests. The public and consumers of its products will be able to inspect the premises and methods of treatment at all times. Absolute cleanliness will be the motto of the management.

This enterprise means the upbuilding of the dairy business for the entire county and state, and will be a large factor in the coming district fair.

There is no dairy in the whole state producing inspected milk, and only one in the state of Washington, the demand for this class of milk is such that its production is extremely profitable. The milk produced by Washington's only inspected dairy brings 35¢ per gallon wholesale. Investors in this stock can figure for themselves that a cow giving two gallons a day for 30 days in the year will yield \$210 less the expenses. Then also the increase from these registered cattle will be sought for far and near for breeding purposes, and its sale will add largely to the income of the enterprise.

BOMB THROWER HAS CONFESSED HIS REAL IDENTITY

Kansas City, Feb. 18.—Robert Herman Bledsoe, the man who attempted to extort \$7,000 from Lawrence M. Jones, a millionaire merchant, confessed to his identity last night. He said he was well known in Dallas, Texas, and had worked for many firms in California and Wyoming, but the police are inclined to doubt portions of his story.

Deserted His Family.

Dallas, Feb. 18.—Bledsoe deserted his wife and two children several years ago and they are all now living in obscurity near Dallas. Bledsoe had the reputation in Dallas of being shiftless and ambitious. He is the son of David Crockett Bledsoe, who has been dead several years.

ANTI-GAMBLING BILL SIGNED

Sacramento, Feb. 19.—Governor Gillette today signed the anti-racetrack gambling bill.

The signing of the bill by Governor Gillette will have the effect of closing the big tracks at Emeryville and Arcadia. The law goes into effect sixty days from date and violations are punished with not less than 30 days nor more than a year's imprisonment.

SPRINGFIELD HAS NEAR BEER ORDINANCE

At an adjourned meeting of the town council Wednesday evening an ordinance was passed whereby it becomes necessary for anyone wishing to sell or keep for sale near beer or other soft drinks of the same kind, must first make application to the town recorder for a license and the same will then be acted upon by the council, who may refuse to issue any license so applied for if in their judgment the same should not be granted. The council can also revoke any license issued, for cause, upon giving notice to the person holding the same that it will be revoked.

The ordinance also contains a section where in it is unlawful to keep such places of business open later than 11:30 o'clock p. m. nor before the hours of 6:30 o'clock a. m.

Stolen Tools Found

The sledge hammer, chisel and tools that were taken from L. E. Thompson's blacksmith shop over two weeks ago and were used by the robbers in their effort to rob the store of Mr. Paul Betteheim, were found by Mr. Withrow last Saturday. They were found under the sidewalk near his woodyard and looked as if they had been carefully placed there for future use. The big sledge hammer still had the marks of paint that showed plainly it had been used in pounding the knob of the safe door off. The tools were returned to their owner who was glad to receive them, though he had sent to Portland for another hammer to take the place of the missing one.
