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GAME PRESERVE IN COAST RANGE WANTED BY COMMERCIAL CLUB

Asks to Have Two Townships
 Set Aside in the Saddle
 Mountain Country

At a regular meeting of the Commercial Club last night, perhaps the most important matter of business transacted was the endorsement of the plan to have two townships in the Coast mountains in Western Lane county set apart as a national game preserve for the special purpose of protecting elk and deer. The country designated is known as Saddle Mountain and is considered one of the best breeding places for elk to be found in the Coast mountains.

Officers, previously chosen by the nominating committee were duly elected as follows: President Helms, J. Thompson, vice-president, Morris J. Dwyer, secretary, Frank Jenkins; treasurer, S. S. Spencer; trustee, Dr. S. S. Beardsley.

The following resolutions on good roads were adopted.

Resolved, That we favor the appropriation of money by the Congress of the United States toward aiding the building and improving of public highways to be expended under the supervision of a national highway commission.

A resolution endorsing the McKen-

zie Valley Power and Irrigation Co's, scheme was adopted as follows:

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NEW CENSUS BILL WILL BE PASSED AT SPECIAL SESSION

Washington, March 9.—The passage of a new census bill during the special session, to take the place of the measure vetoed by President Roosevelt is confidently predicted by its friends in congress. The new bill provides for "a special test examination" prescribed by the civil service commission.

The selection of enumerators would differ from the ordinary selection under the civil service in that the director of the census might, when exigencies of the service required, give preference to the eligible immediately available instead of selecting appointees according to rating, as is otherwise provided.
