OPERATORS TURN DOWN PROPOSAL OF MINE WORKERS

Philadelphia, March 12.—The sub-committee of anthracite mine workers and operators will hold another meeting this afternoon in the endeavor to reach an agreement to go into effect at the expiration of the present working arrangement. The flat refusal of the operators to make any concessions has greatly depressed the representatives of the miners, who will today make another reply to the operators' offer to renew the present agreement for three years. If operators do not make concessions the convention of anthracite miners may be called, or the international executive board may be asked to decide upon a policy to be pursued.

The miners demanded an advance in the scale.

PEACH ORCHARDS UNHURT BY COLD

Although there has been considerable said regarding the damage to the peach crop of Oregon by the severe weather of January, the yield is fully up to the mark for the year. According to Secretary H. M. Williamson, of the State Board of Horticulture, "I am sure very few peach trees were winter killed this year." Mr. Williamson says, "and from reports received from various peach-growers, I should judge that growers who predicted a failure of the peach crop were more scared than hurt. It is natural to expect peach trees to die in seasons of extreme cold, but the peach trees of the state have never been killed in the winter, and we have only the past to go by in predicting the future."

"The principal peach-growing districts in the state are The Dalles and Ashland, and reports from these sections are to the effect that little or no damage has been done to peaches or any other fruit. The Willamette valley does not grow many peaches at best, but the trees heard from in that section are all considered unhurt and capable of bearing the average yield."

FULTON ADOPTS PETITION METHOD RESIGNS POSITION

Salem, Or., March 10.—Pulling every possible wire in order to get the appointment to the newly created federal judgeship in Oregon, Ex-Senator Fulton is wiring for the endorsement of the state officials at Salem. Furthermore, he has resort to the petition method.

George G. Bingham, a Harriman attorney, is circulating the petition for him in Salem.

S. A. Koser, the newly created insurance commissioner, has secured for Fulton, the endorsement from Governor Frank W. Benson, Superintendent of Public Instruction, J. H. Ackerman, Attorney General A. M. Crawford and Chief Justice Moore of the Oregon supreme bench.

Others were asked to send a similar endorsement on Fulton direct to the president but refused, most of them because they believed the new judge should come from the eastern part of the state. Some favored Judge Stephen A. Lowe and some Judge James A. Fee, both of Pendleton. Still others refused because they did not care to mix up in any way in the fight.

Following is the exact wording of the endorsement of Ex-Senator Fulton sent to President Taft by the attorney general. It covers the points required by Fulton's friends and is typical of others sent:

"As far as I know, Mr. Fulton is a lawyer of exceptional ability and of impeccable integrity."

BLACK EYE FOR DRAIN RAILROAD

Traveling men who reached Marshfield from Drain yesterday state that Warren Reed of Gardiner informed them that the Southern Pacific has made arrangements to remove the several thousand barrels of cement that were shipped to points along the Unquag when the Drain-Coos Bay line was started a few years ago. It is stated that vessels will shortly come and take the material away, presumably to Tillamook to be used on the new line there.

There have been rumors at various times of the proposed removal of this material but this is the first time that any definite information has been received.

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS ARE SEVERED WITH NICARAGUA BY UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

Washington, March 12.—Action amounting practically to the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Nicaragua was taken by the state department this afternoon when it ordered Secretary of the Legation Gregory, in charge of affairs at Managua, to return home, leaving the legation in charge of the consul, who will have no diplomatic capacity.

MEXICO WANTS TO ANNEX

Mexico City, March 12.—There are persistent rumors that war has broken out between Nicaragua and Salvador, and that there has been an engagement between the Salvadorean and Nicaraguan gunboats at Momotombo, but the result is unknown.

The Mexican government is without official advices of the truth of this rumor. The Herald today advocates the annexation of the five Central American states by Mexico, and the general opinion here is that intervention is inevitable. Mexico looks to the United States to make the initial move.

NEW REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CHAIRMAN HAILS FROM MAINE

Augusta, March 12.—Dr. John Fremont Hill, the new vice chairman of the Republican National Committee, is one of the best known public men in Maine. He long has been identified with New England politics and was one of the most important factors in this section of the country in the campaign which led up to the nomination of Judge Taft for the presidency.

Dr. Hill was born in Elliot, Me., October 29, 1855, and has been a resident of Augusta since 1879. He represented this city in the assembly in 1889, and in 1893 and 1895 he represented Kennebec county in the senate. In 1896 he was presidential elector and in 1899 a member of the executive council of the Republican National Committee. In 1900 he was elected to the governorship of the Pine Tree State and was re-elected in 1902. As governor he displayed executive ability of the highest order and his administration received the approval not only of the Republicans of the state but of many prominent Democrats as well.

Though Dr. Hill is a graduate of Bowdoin Medical College, he has devoted little time to the practice of medicine. He is a man of considerable wealth and of late years he has abandoned the medical profession entirely to give his attention to the numerous financial and industrial enterprises in which he is interested. Soon after coming to Augusta he associated himself with the publishing firm later known as the Vickery & Hill Company. This firm made a specialty of publishing weekly story papers for the masses and in the course of a decade or two the partners accumulated millions. They built a printing plant which at the time was the largest in the world. As a result of the business of the Vickery Hill Company the Augusta postoffice became the second in the United States in the amount of business handled. On the periodical mailing days of the various publications sold trains of mail cars were run on the tracks alongside the printing houses and loaded with tons of papers to be distributed broadcast throughout the land. Dr. Hill married the daughter of the head of the firm and after the death of Mr. Vickery he continued to direct the affairs of the company.

But he has other interests as well. His share in the electric railroad development of Maine has swelled to enormous proportions his private income. Besides, he is a director and trustee of a number of financial institutions in Augusta and other cities and is a large real estate owner. For many years two of the leading hotels in Augusta have been among his holdings. In fact, it is a common saying here that almost everything that does not belong to the Vickery estate belongs to Dr. Hill. But no fault is found on this account, for no citizen ever displayed greater generosity than Dr. Hill, and he has been foremost in every movement that has had to do with the welfare and progress of Augusta and his people.

Only in one instance has Dr. Hill been known to oppose the wishes of the people, or rather their chosen representatives. And his stand in that instance was pardonable. For a number of years he lived in the house occupied so long by James B. Blaine and his family. Some years ago the legislature attempted to buy the homestead, with a view of making it the executive mansion. But Dr. Hill would not sell the estate. It so happened that the intention of the legislature was carried out, after all, for in 1900 Dr. Hill was elected governor, and for four years the old Blaine home was in effect at least what the legislature designed.

GEO. BERKELEY ANNIVERSARY RECALLS FAMOUS CAREER

Westward the course of empire takes its way:
The first four acts already past,
A fifth shall close the drama with the day,
Time's noblest offering is the last.

Dublin, March 12.—In this year of notable anniversaries it is not without interest to recall that on this date 235 years ago, March 12, 1674, there was born in Kilkenny the celebrated prelate and philosopher, George Berkeley, who is best remembered for his plan to "plant arts and learning in America." No man of his time was held in higher esteem for his virtues and philosophical powers. Page

was beginning with the familiar lines, "Westward the course of empire takes its way."

Full of courage and enthusiasm in regard to his scheme Berkeley sailed for America with his wife, landing at Newport, R. I., early in 1729. He bought a small farm, to which he gave the name of "Whitehall," and settled down to await with philosophy a promised endowment from the British government. While waiting he pursued his usual occupation of studying and writing. He attracted to his retreat many of the leaders in American thought, and he came to see that the proposed college should be, not in the Bermudas, but on the mainland. However, he never received the grant from the government and he returned to England. Before his departure from America he divided between Yale and Harvard colleges the books of his private library. His title to the Whitehall farm was transferred to Yale, to be applied to the maintenance of three scholarships and various prizes for those who should excel in Latin composition. The Berkeley prizes, it is said, have been awarded with unflinching regularity at Yale since 1733.

FISCHER'S MILL WILL BE MOVED TO SPRINGFIELD

The Guard a week ago printed a story to the effect that another sawmill would soon be erected at Springfield and that a tract of land for the plant had been purchased. It was now transpired that the mill to be located there is the plant of Fischer Bros., of Marquette, and that the work of dismantling it preparatory to moving it will at once begin.

A meeting of the Springfield Commercial Club will be held tonight to consider the matter of whether or not the plant shall be located inside or outside the city limits. The plant already secured is in the vicinity of the planing mill in the northern part of the city.

The Fischer mill is a good-sized one and employs forty or fifty men. This will add considerably to the payroll of the bustling little city across the river.

Planing Mill to Enlarge.—It is learned that the proprietors of the planing mill at Springfield intend to at once enlarge their plant, perhaps doubling its capacity. The business of the plant has been very satisfactory ever since it was built and the building that is now going on and that is in prospect justifying the enlargement.

TREASURER OF UTAH IS SHORT IN ACCOUNTS

Salt Lake, March 12.—James Christensen, former state treasurer, following his confession of his responsibility for the shortage of over \$70,000 in the state treasury, is under arrest. The money it was known, was used in speculation in Nevada mining ventures.

Christensen has been state treasurer for four years prior to January 1 of this year, and the shortage was discovered a few days ago.

Christensen was in Nevada when the discovery was made and was apprised of the fact by telegraph. He immediately returned and confessed to the shortage, and his bondsmen and friends have deposited \$70,000 to the credit of the state to cover the delinquency.

Although confined in the county jail, it is said that no formal complaint has been filed against Christensen. Attorney General Barnes is now in conference with Governor Spry as to what action to take.

Christensen was also treasurer of the Utah Board of Commissioners of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.
