WHITLA BOY RETURNED TO PARENTAL ROOF

Sharon, Pa., March 23.—Willie Whitla arrived at 12:06 this afternoon. A crowd of five thousand persons extended the boy a demonstration, and a singing and cheering crowd followed the boy and his father to the Whitla residence.

Cleveland, March 23.—James P. Whitla and son "Billy," who was returned to his father at the Hollerren last night, left today for the family home at Sharon, Pa., and was escorted to the railroad station by a cheering crowd of people. The kidnaping was clapped in the arms of his father from the moment he left the hotel until he reached the train.

Mr. Whitla handed ten thousand dollars to a woman in a confectionery store in the East End, where he went to write instructions from the kidnapers. The money was paid before the boy was returned to the hotel, it is said.

The kidnapers waited until after midnight, when they placed Willie in a car by himself. The boy was accompanied in the car by two other boys, who talked to him and took him to the hotel, where the happy reunion occurred.

Another Version Given
Cleveland, March 23.—Mr. Whitla is not inclined to discuss the matter of the ransom or the plans of the kidnapers for dealing with the kidnaping. "That will be up to the police," he said.

The money was paid in a grocery store on East Fifty-third street and standard avenue at 1 o'clock Monday. A man who gave the name of "Tom" to the people in the grocery store knew nothing about the arrangement, the man simply calling and asking if a package had been left there for him. The money had not been left, but an hour later a well-dressed man left a package for him and shortly after the stranger appeared and got it.

ALBANY EDITOR TELLS ABOUT EUGENE

Editor F. P. Nutting, of the Albany Democrat, spent Sunday in Eugene, and gives the city the following characteristic write-up:

"The locks like 10,000 population. The five miles of pavement is the largest thing for the city. Beautiful property along the paved streets is worth a better. The titled clank of the horse is worth the price as advertisement."

"The new houses all over the city and as well some splendid business blocks. Many new flats are a feature, a four-room flat renting for \$10 a month. Rents generally are lower than elsewhere. A twelve-room house was shown that brings the owner \$65 a month."

"The city is full of frat, sorority and club houses for students, fifteen or twenty to a house, full of bath

tubs, life and fellowship.

"A new structure which is a credit to the city is the First Presbyterian church, a fine building in modern architecture, and arrangement, but better is the consecrated, able pastor who stands for a better Christian manhood."

"A disagreeable municipal fight is on, but that is Eugene's affair. 'One Eugene editor doesn't have to work. He has just laid out Kincaid's addition to the city that will bring him at least \$50,000.'"

"Prices are high. A lot was shown on 11th street that recently sold for \$3800. Lots are 60x100 feet. Of course suburban lots are nothing like that."

Several former Albany people are residents: Mrs. Kate Cundiff and daughter, Margaret, whose engagement to Mr. Nat Wither, of San Francisco, a son of John Wither of Lebanon, was announced at a heart party on Saturday; Rev. and Mrs. T. J. Wilson, connected with the hospital; their son, Van, a bookkeeper in the First National bank; E. Thrall, Gusie Layton Schell, G. W. Harris, the marble cutter; G. W. Taylor, well digger, who is to return to Albany; Mrs. H. C. Watson and family being among them.

O'BRIEN DENIES STORY OF CHANGE

Medford, Or., March 22.—"Rot, absolute rot," is the way J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Harima lines in the Pacific Northwest, characterized recent stories of his promotion to the office of general manager of the Southern Pacific at San Francisco, upon his arrival here tonight, bound for Portland.

Mr. O'Brien, accompanied by Mrs. O'Brien and his secretary, Walter Guild, is returning home in his car, Oregon, in which he made the trip to Los Angeles.

"There is absolutely no truth in the story," Mr. O'Brien declared emphatically. "It is all rot, the worst kind of rot. Such a thing is not even contemplated. I went south for a private conference, but a change in the Portland office was not up for consideration."

BUSINESS CHANGE AT COTTAGE GROVE

The popular furniture firm made this change in proprietors this week, though the deal is not entirely consummated, as all of the stock has not yet been taken. He will shortly have a chapel erected in a suitable location for his undertaking supplies and business, and will probably secure a business location for pianos and sewing machines. J. B. Simeral, who has been with the old firm for some time, is out of a job by the change, which does not affect him much, as there is plenty of opportunity to get back in the harness again.

Howard Beagle is erecting a neat building on the corner of his residence lot on Fourth street to be used as a workshop or factory for the manufacture of one of the very best washing machines on the market, for which he has the patent right for this state. He will put in the necessary machinery with which to manufacture these machines, at first, of course, on a limited scale.

O. M. Kem, one of the proprietors of the Cottage Grove electric light and power plant, who recently purchased a beautiful, stately two-acre tract on Wall street, between the Comer and Reese residence properties, has awarded a contract for a commodious, modern one and a half story cottage home, 30x42 feet in dimensions, not including the porch. The contract for the foundation and carpenter work was awarded to Will Hart; the plumbing to Dave Allison and the painting to R. W. Waters.

Charles Cochran, wife and baby contemplate moving to Creswell in a short time, so that Mr. Cochran may give more attention to his real estate business at that place. He will make some disposition of his interest in the Bazaar here.

Captain Bert Lawson says he has sold out his business in order to devote more time to his campaign for councilman, and if elected will probably run just as sprightly to keep out of reach of his city constituents.

Andrew Nelson went to Eugene Thursday, and after a few days' visit with his parents will go on a trip through Eastern Oregon, Idaho and Nevada to look over some of the propositions for the installation of electric power plants.

Rev. Henry L. Nave, D. D., for nearly two years pastor of the Presbyterian church of this city, has accepted the position of field representative for Albany College, and his work here closes next Sunday, the new work beginning April 1. The doctor will travel all over Oregon, preaching Christian education, and securing students for the college at Albany. A successor has not as yet been chosen.

Captain Johnson was a Portland visitor this week, attending the United States district court in the matter of the Philip Hohl bankruptcy proceedings. Mr. Hohl's liabilities are now \$2500, with only a few book accounts that can be realized upon. The financial trouble was caused by a strike in a mill in which he was connected about three years ago.

Harry Weber was transacting business at Eugene Thursday and invested in one of McClanahan's incubators and brooders. Mr. Weber will handle Barred Rocks on quite an extensive scale.—Leader and Western Oregon.

CHAIRMAN PAYNE REPORTS TARIFF BILL AS DRAWN BUT DEMOCRATS WILL OPPOSE IT

Washington, March 18.—The house committee on ways and means agreed today, after the first meeting of the full committee, to report the Payne tariff bill back to the house without amendment. The Democrats will be given until next Tuesday to prepare a minority report.

Later Chairman Payne reported the bill back to the house without amendment and offered a resolution providing for the printing of thirty thousand copies. The house passed the resolution after considerable discussion.

Representative Broussard, of Louisiana, voted to report the bill with amendments, but all other Democrats of the committee voted against it.

GOVERNOR HADLEY MAY GET JUDGESHIP

Jefferson City, Mo., March 20.—It is rumored here that Governor Hadley will soon resign and accept an appointment to the United States bench in the Northwest.

The reason for his resigning, the rumors say, is that the climate here does not agree with him and he wishes to take up his residence in a place more fitted to the improvement of his health.

It is reported that President Taft is pleased with the idea of Governor Hadley going on the federal bench, and is ready to give him an opportunity. Hadley is a Yale man.

Fulton and Pruitt
Washington, March 20.—Senator Heyburn of Idaho interviewed President Taft today for the purpose of recommending the appointment of General Warren Pruitt, of Moscow, Idaho, for the new fourth district judgeship in Alaska. The senator also urged the appointment of ex-Senator Fulton to the new judgeship in Oregon.

ALL NORMALS TO BE KEPT OPEN

The executive committee of the state board of regents of normal schools met yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock and considered the status of these institutions, and the offers of local people to raise funds for their support to the end of the present year. President R. C. French, of the Weston school, was before the board and an amicable arrangement has been reached for the schools to complete the year's work, and their graduates will receive diplomas.

Cottage Grove, March 20.—In protest against the reported movement to remove the Vancouver military headquarters to Seattle, the Cottage Grove Commercial Club has passed the following resolutions, copies of which have been forwarded to congress:

Whereas, This Commercial Club has been advised that a movement is on foot to move the present military headquarters of the Department of the Columbia from Vancouver, Wash., to Seattle, Wash., and

Whereas, It seems to be the opinion of military officers that such a move would be prejudicial to the good of the militia, and that no benefit would result from said move except the upbuilding to Seattle; and

Whereas, Vancouver, Wash., or Portland, Or., are the most centrally located points for the direction of operations for the states comprising said department, now,

Therefore, This club, in session assembled, urges you to use your influence to prevent the moving of the headquarters as contemplated; or, in case they are to be moved, that they be changed to Portland.

JAPANESE SEND GOLD OUT OF THREE CITIES

Washington, March 20.—The Japanese in San Francisco, Seattle and Honolulu are drawing \$10,000,000 in gold every year out of the stacks of money in those three cities and shipping it to Japan. In ten years it is estimated by treasury officials that \$100,000,000 in gold has been permanently added to Japan's bank reserves, all drawn from San Francisco, Seattle and Honolulu.

This constant drain of gold from the United States to Japan represents the savings of the subjects of the mikado who are residing temporarily on the Pacific slope and in Hawaii.

The Japanese in America do not become citizens of the United States. They come here to earn money, and having earned it send it back to Japan for investment there.

Bartrum, of Roseburg, was present by special invitation, with whom the committee was desirous of conferring and taking up the matter of the permanent establishment of the proposed Nesmith county boundary lines through the forest reserve in the eastern part of Lane and Douglas counties, and is understood the Commercial Club committee received all the information desired on this subject from Mr. Bartrum, preparatory to drafting their initiative petitions for the purpose of submitting the proposed creation of Nesmith county from a portion of southern Lane and northern Douglas to a vote of the people at the general election in 1910. This new county proposition is to be put before the people in a clear and concise manner with just as good, if not better, prospects for success than was afforded Hood River at the last general election.
