

MUST ANSWER FOR RAID ON UNITED RAILWAYS' OFFICE

San Francisco, March 31.—Judge Marasky today cited the officials of the district attorney's office to show cause on Monday why they should not be punished for contempt of court in refusing to obey the order restraining them from proceeding with the search of offices of the United Railways.

Nine Men Arrived.
In Police Judge Deasy's court today, in the cases of the nine men arrested in connection with the alleged theft of documents from the district attorney's office, the dates for the preliminary examinations were set in three cases. Those of Attorneys Abbott and Murphy were continued until Monday and four others went over until tomorrow.

Defense Accepts Jurors.
Contrary to general expectations only two peremptory challenges were exercised in the Calhoun trial and it appears that the attorneys for the defense, in expressing themselves satisfied with the four jurors who were sworn in today to try the case, will abandon the right of appeal upon all issues that have heretofore arisen, and will not insist in using all of the challenges allotted them.

HARRIMAN FAVORS RAILROAD TRUST

Denver, March 30.—If E. H. Harriman could have his way, he would

bring all the railroads in America into one giant combination under one head, and immediately begin the expenditure of \$250,000,000 or \$300,000,000 in improving the weaker roads, both physically and financially. In this way he says he believes he could do the greatest good for the government, the people of the United States generally, to shippers individually and finally to owners of railroad stock.

TAFT ADVOCATES TARIFF COMMISSION

Washington, March 31.—President Taft today declared himself in favor of a tariff bureau, to be created this session of congress. He believes such a bureau would be of great assistance in the application of the maximum and minimum principle of the Payne bill.

The lowest death record for a single month ever recorded by a city of Portland's size and population is believed to be that of Portland for February. The printed report of the city health office shows that there were during last month only five deaths for every 1000 residents. The March death rate promises to be proportionately small.

CRAZY SNAKE INDIAN CHIEF STILL AT LARGE

Reported Capture of Hostile Leader Proves Unfounded

Henryetta, March 31.—The report that Crazy Snake has been captured is not confirmed. Colonel Hoffman telephoned from Pierce today that the rumor is groundless, while the Associated Press obtained similar information from Checotah, Muskogee and Thompson.

Deputies and militia today resumed the search for the Creek leader. Abe Grayson, captain of the negro element of Crazy Snake's band, was captured near Pierce, hiding in a hayfield. The negroes are reported to be highly indignant over the capture of some of their race by the militia. This is regarded as an added danger to the situation.

Medford has had a special census taken in support of the claim before the grand lodge, B. P. O. E., for a charter for a lodge of the order to be instituted there, and now Grants Pass Elks are getting ambitious and want a lodge in the Josephine county metropolis.

STEEL VIADUCT WRECKED BY DYNAMITE

Explosive Said to Have Been Placed by Disaffected Laborers

New York, March 31.—A heavy charge of dynamite, said to have been placed by disaffected laborers recently employed in the construction of a steel viaduct over the Hoboken, exploded with a tremendous crash at 3:15 this morning, wrecking one of the supporting pillars of the structure and shattering every window in a radius of a quarter of a mile. A number of persons were cut by flying glass and falling plaster, but no fatalities are reported.

In the neighborhood of the explosion there was a panic and scantily dressed men and women rushed into the streets in terror. Labor troubles have been going on for some time.

UNION PACIFIC PASSENGER IS WRECKED BY SLIDE AND TWO TRAINMEN KILLED

Ogden, March 31.—At five o'clock this morning a special train carrying doctors and nurses left here for the scene of the wreck of the Union Pacific passenger train No. 3, westbound, which occurred early today. Wrecking trains left Ogden and Evanston at the same time.

Fireman Lowham was found buried under his engine, but the body of the baggageman, C. J. Gordon, has not been located. It is supposed to have been burned in the baggage car, which, with the mail car and three passenger coaches, were destroyed by fire.

The train at 3:55 this morning ran into a landslide on Castle Rock Hill. The engine was turned over and almost instantly flames enveloped the mail car, gradually extending back until five cars were ablaze.

Conductor Miller reports no passengers killed.

STANDARD TRUST PROPOSES INCREASE OF CAPITAL STOCK

New York, March 31.—It is reported in financial circles that all preliminaries have been taken by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey to increase its capitalization from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000. The change is prompted by the desire to bring the nominal capital close to the value at which shares of the company command in the open market. They are now selling at about \$650.

NO IMMEDIATE STRIKE OF COAL MINE WORKERS

New York, March 31.—According to a statement given out by the Anthracite Coal operators at the request of the Mine Workers, the operators have agreed to continue the present agreement in force after April 1, pending further negotiations.

DEAD EXECUTIVE LAID TO REST AT CAPITAL OF STATE

With Military Pomp and Ceremony the Funeral is Conducted

Olympia, March 31.—With military pomp and ceremony, and in the presence of a large assemblage from all parts of the state, the body of the late Samuel G. Cosgrove was laid to rest here this afternoon in the Masonic cemetery. The special funeral train from Portland, bearing the remains and accompanied by members of the bereaved family, state officers and personal friends, arrived at 8 o'clock this morning.

Two hours later, escorted by a detail of troopers, the casket was taken to the capitol building, where it lay in state, guarded by troopers until afternoon.

During the morning a large number of floral pieces arrived, conspicuous among which was one from Former Vice President and Mrs. Fairbanks. Fairbanks and Cosgrove were schoolmates. The Japanese of the state sent a giant wreath arranged with rare artistic skill.

Trains and boats from Seattle, Tacoma and other Sound cities and from other places in the state, poured in hundreds of persons during the morning hours. The funeral took place in the house chamber at the capitol at two o'clock, and following this, the body was escorted by troops to the cemetery, at which the simple military burial took place.

LOS ANGELES MAN KILLS NEIGHBOR WOMAN

After Shooting Mrs. Austin He Turns the Gun Upon Himself

Los Angeles, March 31.—August Schoemer, a dairyman, 50 years old, living near Tropic, a suburb of this city, this morning shot and killed Mrs. Mary Austin, a widow and neighbor, after which he committed suicide. A mystery surrounds the shooting, which occurred at Mrs. Austin's home, where Schoemer went this morning to talk with Mrs. Austin, regarding plans for a partnership in the dairy business.

RANKIN'S APPEAL IN TIMBER CASE ARGUED YESTERDAY

Salem, March 31.—The case wherein H. C. Mahon sues M. B. Rankin for money claimed as commission from the sale of real estate was argued before the supreme court yesterday. William D. Fenton and James E. Fenton appeared for Rankin and Mahon's interests were looked after by G. F. Skipworth. The suit involves a matter of some \$30,000 claimed by Mahon, the land sold being a large tract of timber.

MRS. HELEN BOYLE HELD UNDER A HEAVY BOND

Mercer, March 31.—Mrs. Helen Boyle, wife of James H. Boyle, kidnapper of Willie Whittle, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace McClain today, charged with the kidnapping. She entered a plea of not guilty. The bonds are fixed at \$25,000.

WILL VOTE ON PAYNE TARIFF BILL ON APRIL 10

New Rule About to Be Introduced to End Discussion

Washington, March 31.—Indications are strong that a rule will be brought into the house fixing Monday, April 10, as the day for voting on the Payne tariff bill. It is understood that the rule will provide for a committee on amendments and the opening of the lumber, tea and coffee list, and it is possible that hides may be included, but sentiment seems to be growing that the senate will see that the duty on hides is restored. The rule will probably also provide for the reading of the measure under the five-minute rule during the next week. This would not give time for reading the whole bill under the rule.

In the house today Morgan, of Missouri, urged protection for the zinc industry. He quoted President Taft saying that the primary purpose of the tariff is to raise more revenue for the government.

Brantly, of Georgia, agreed with this, but contended that the primary purpose of the Payne bill is to maintain the Republican theory of protection. Brantly laid the present deficit at the door of what he charged was Republican extravagance.

Models of Warships
Washington, March 31.—Senator Heyburn, of Idaho, introduced a bill today requiring the secretary of the navy to have constructed a complete model of each vessel of war of the United States navy, which shall have or hereafter shall be given the name borne by a state. The model is to be

FREE TRADE AND PAYNE BILL FAVORED IN PHILIPPINES

Manila, March 31.—The insular commission, sitting at Baguio, passed a resolution today favoring free trade and the general provisions of the Payne bill, but requesting the assistance of the American government during the first three years of the new arrangement.

It is possible that the assembly will modify the extreme stand it has taken against the Payne bill.

COLONIST TRAFFIC DOUBLE LAST YEAR

Chicago, March 30.—As indicating the heavy movement of colonist traffic this year officials of the Harriman Pacific lines, including the Oregon roads, estimate that the volume to that territory this month and next month at 70,000, against less than 35,000 a year ago. The record spring movement for colonists was in 1907, when 65,300 were carried in March and April. In the first four days of March 1262 colonists went west through Southern Pacific gateways—El Paso and Ogden—as compared with 768 a year ago.
