Oakland, March 29.—Archdeacon Emery, who for almost a decade has presided for the missionary field of this jurisdiction, has resigned. His formal resignation, with a letter explaining the reasons, was placed in the hands of Bishop Nichols, who, however, has not seen fit to set upon it, or to make the letter public.
 Emery's resignation, however, is the outcome of the notoriety caused by the marriage of Helen Gladys Emery to Ganjiro Aoki at Seattle Saturday.

THREE-STORY HOTEL IN PROSPECT FOR SPRINGFIELD SOON
 Project on Foot to Erect \$25,000 Building—Other Interesting Items

The Springfield News has been informed that a move is on foot to erect a three-story hotel, which if erected will be built on the corner of Main and Seventh streets. The plan will be to erect a building that will cover a ground space of 60x120 feet, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000. By request the names of the parties who will be interested in the new building will be withheld from the public until further development, but we are in hopes that we will be able to give more definite information in the near future.
License of Mt. Hood Revoked
 W. T. Bishop, foreman of the Lebanon paper mills, was in town this week looking after his interests. He is the owner of the Mt. Hood on Mill street, which has been running as a soft drink emporium by a man by the name of Howard, who was arrested last week for keeping open house after the regular closing hours and pleaded guilty to the charge, being given the usual fine for a first offense. The matter was later discussed by the town council, and the

license governing such resorts was ordered revoked. For several years, since local option went into effect, there has been more or less trouble in trying to control those who conducted this particular place, and it has been found a very difficult matter. Because of the way the house has been conducted in the past the council have decided that they will not issue another license, as it will only be a repetition of the same old story, thus the Mt. Hood in the future will only be known in history.

More Light
 Manager Atkins, of the Willamette Valley Company, was in Springfield Thursday morning looking after the interests of his company. He was a pleasant caller at the News office while in the city, and informed us that they intended to have the cars running to the bridge by the middle of the month. He also stated that the company had ordered another 500-horsepower turbine engine which would be installed about the first of July. With this additional power the Willamette Valley Company should be able to handle their business in satisfactory shape and give the people an excellent light service.

HUGE CANNERY TO BE CLOSED

Gold Beach, Or., March 28.—The property of the late R. D. Hume in Curry county has been appraised at \$375,000. Mr. Hume left very little money at his death, and to carry out the bequests of his will the property must be sold.
 It is stated that the fishery owned by the dead salmon king will not be operated this year. In fact, it is given out that the cannery will be sold as soon as possible. It is currently reported that the value of this property decreased 50 per cent at Mr. Hume's death.

TWO-YEAR-OLD DEER LASSED AT ROADSIDE

 The lassoing of a two-year-old wild deer along the roadside was a feat performed by Burdette Hadley, known in Eugene as "Det," Hadley, yesterday near Crow. Young Hadley was riding his horse along the county road near some timber and happened to have a lasso hanging on his saddle, having been after some cattle the day before. "Det" suddenly came upon the deer standing at the side of the road. Instead of running, the beautiful animal stared with wide open eyes at the horse and its rider and stood still. Hadley stopped his horse and carefully swung his lasso over his head, with a dexterous movement threw it toward the deer. The loop settled squarely over its head and was instantly drawn taut. By this time the deer realized its danger and started to run, but too late. It was thrown to the ground and after a little difficulty its captor succeeded in tying it up to a tree. Later the animal was taken to Hadley's home where it is now. Its horns indicate it is two years old.

HARRIMAN AND HILL CONFERENCE

San Francisco, Cal., March 27.—Cancelling his arrangements for a more extended stay in California, E. H. Harriman left Paso Robles before daylight and came to San Francisco with the unexpected announcement that he would depart for New York tomorrow night or Sunday. His sudden change of plans he attributes to a desire to spend a few days with his sons before they returned to school and he conveyed the impression that he was anxious to resume the duties laid down two months ago. Since yesterday Harriman has been almost constantly in company with Louis Hill, president of the Great Northern, who accompanied Harriman to this city today from Paso Robles. Hill explained that he had come north to discuss matters of general interest with Harriman. The

two presidents will probably remain in close companionship until Harriman leaves for the East.
May Mean Traffic Deal.

The presence of Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Nutt implies that the conference will relate to points where the Harriman and Hill lines come into competition in Oregon and Washington. There is still time to make a traffic arrangement in regard to business between Portland and Puget Sound, for construction of the Harriman extension northward from Portland has not progressed so far but that more money would be saved by abandoning some of the work already done than by completing the line. Joint use of the Northern Pacific between Portland and Seattle would require a double track the whole distance. It would also involve the pooling of the terminals in Portland, Seattle and Tacoma and the use of the same passenger and freight stations by both systems. It would mean interchange of traffic between the North Bank road of the Hill system and the Harriman line in Eastern Washington. How the North Coast road, control of which by the Harriman system has been recently admitted, would figure in the deal is doubtful. Much grading has been done and for long stretches it parallels the Northern Pacific. Where it is an improvement on that road in grades, curves and distance, it would be worked into that road by some trade.

WALKING AROUND BORDER OF UNITED STATES ON WAGER

Tuesday morning we received a call from Stuart Cronley, of Toledo, Ohio, who arrived in Eugene the evening before.
 Mr. Cronley is making his way on foot around the outer border of the United States. He left Toledo October 26, 1907, and made his way along the shores of Lake Erie and Lake Ontario, down the St. Lawrence, along the north border of the United States, down the Atlantic coast, along the Gulf of Mexico and the southern border of the country to the Pacific, and up the coast.

DRAIN'S HOPE OF RAILROAD VANISHES

Marshfield, Or., March 28.—E. K. Jones, who returned today from a trip to Drain and Umpqua Valley points, confirms the report that the Southern Pacific is moving the project ordered to the Umpqua for the construction of the Drain-Coos Bay line. Warren Reed informed it was to be shipped to Auburn, Cal. Other material will be moved there. This removes the last hope of anything doing on the Drain line this year. Mr. Jones says that business in the valley is good, the consolidation of the mercantile firms at Elkton being decided advantage to that community.

NO CONFLICT WITH INDIANS HAS OCCURRED

Muskogee, Okla., March 29.—Up to noon today there had been no encounter between the state militia, marching upon Crazy Snake and his band of Creek Indians and negro allies, according to the best information available here, and the troops are still pursuing the reds. It is reported that Crazy Snake, fearing arrest, has deserted his followers and is on his way to Washington to intercede with the Great Father.
