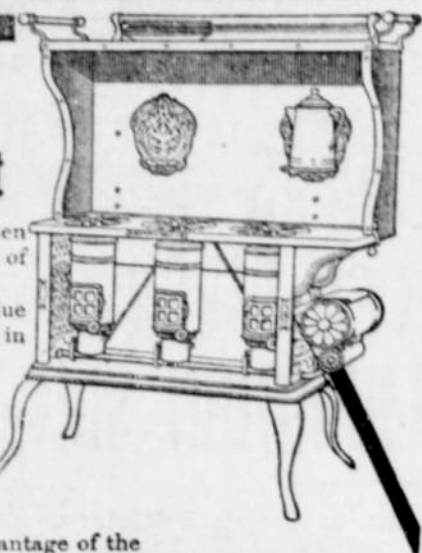

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MUNICIPAL LEAGUE AROUND BANQUET BOARD

(From Thursday's Daily Guard.)

One hundred and fifty enthusiastic supporters of the municipal ownership ticket held a lovefeast at Otto's grill last night, and decided upon making permanent the organization which won such a sweeping victory for popular rights on Monday. John M. Pipes presided as toastmaster, and his introductions of the several speakers and humorous comments on their addresses were an enjoyable feature of the occasion.

After the last course of an excellent dinner had been disposed of, Mayor Matlock was introduced, and received with cheers as he arose to speak. The mayor strongly reiterated every pledge of his platform, and declared that the McKenzie power plant would be completed as rapidly as possible after the obstructions in court were removed; that not only would water be pumped, but a complete light and power plant installed whenever the people authorize; that wells will be driven as soon as a suitable site is decided upon by the committee, and the mains extended throughout the city.

Hon. B. F. Dorris, who was introduced as Eugene's most beloved citizen, was given an ovation. He spoke on "Harmony," and told of his love for Eugene and faith in its future growth and greatness.

J. M. Morris declared that Eugene was one of the most desirable small cities, with which he was familiar in the United States, and won applause by his timely remarks.

S. P. Ness, as editor of "The Power," made a witty speech, and was followed by P. D. Newell, whose enthusiasm in the cause is contagious, and who advocated permanent organization of the municipal league.

Councilman W. S. Moon endorsed the pledges made by Mayor Matlock and explained some of the disadvantages under which the council had labored for the past two years.

Lark Biven was the last speaker on the regular program, and spoke at some length upon the principles involved in the late campaign. His address added to the enthusiasm already worked up by the previous speakers, and he was frequently interrupted by applause.

Judge Walton, in a short address, moved that the Municipal League be made a permanent organization under its present officers, and that the next meeting be held in the court house Saturday evening, April 17. This was carried unanimously.

Councilman T. H. Garrett spoke on the work of the council during the past two years, and endorsed the views expressed by the mayor.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered The Guard for its work during the campaign, which, Chairman Newell, of the finance committee, stated had not cost a cent except what had been paid in the job office for printing "The Power." Mr. Fisher was then called upon and spoke very briefly.

Hon. J. M. Shelley succeeded in bringing down the house with a story at the expense of the toastmaster, and the meeting broke up at a late hour.

The entire proceedings were characterized by good feeling and good nature, and the sentiment uppermost in all the speeches made was faith in the future of Eugene, and a determination to make a larger and better city in all respects.

NEW COMPANY IS CAPITALIZED AT \$150,000

The Calipova Springs Co. was organized here yesterday to improve the London Springs summer resort, and to put the water and mineral salts upon the market. The capitalization of the company is \$150,000 with shares valued at \$10 each. The articles of incorporation were filed today with the county clerk and secretary of state.

The directors are Levi Geer, Dr. Geo. Wall, Dr. Philip Bartle, Darwin Bristow and W. B. Dennis. The officers of the boards are W. B. Dennis, president; Darwin Bristow, treasurer; and L. E. Bean, secretary. The law offices of Williams and Bean will be the temporary headquarters of the company, and Eugene is named as the principal place of business.

The new company will immediately purchase the property of the London Springs Association, which comprises the hotel, 16 acres of ground and the baths and the springs. These will be improved and made beautiful.

It is contemplated that a large bottling plant will be built at Cottage Grove. The water will be run through a pipe line to Cottage Grove, and that town will be the main shipping point.

Arrangements have been made with the Southern Pacific Company to advertise the spring in their folders. The company will also make the railroad for freight rates, which will enable them to extend the market of the water as far east as Chicago.

One of the prominent features of the business will be manufacture of salts from the water. An evaporating plant will be constructed at the springs. The salts will be marketed all over the world, for they are of particular value in kidney and liver diseases.

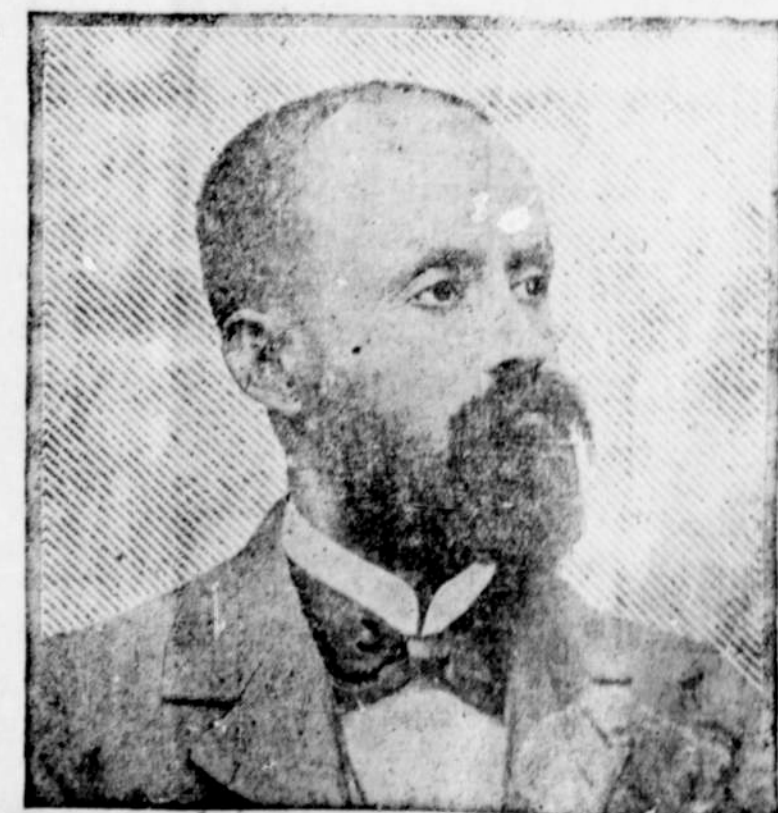
The industry promises to assume large proportions and to bring thousands of dollars into Lane county directly, as well as stimulating a large tourist traffic. To meet the demands of the public, who visit the springs, the hotel will be rebuilt and enlarged. The grounds will be parked and turned into walks and playgrounds for children. The object is to turn the resort into a high class establishment similar to the California watering places.

CASTRO DOWN AND OUT IN VENEZUELA

Washington, April 10.—It developed today that it is the intention of the Venezuelan government to arrest Castro on indictments pending against him if he ever sets foot on Venezuelan soil.

Say He Is Able to Travel
Port de France, April 10.—Doctors say that Castro is fit to travel. On the other hand the latter protests that he is too ill. He wants time to make arrangements to go to Santa Cruz de Tenerife in the Canary Islands, which is Spanish territory.

United States Watching Castro
Copenhagen, April 10.—The United States has approached Denmark on the matter of permitting Ciprino Castro to remain in the Danish West Indies, should Castro proceed there from Martinique.

Another Rumor
New York, April 10.—A revival of the rumor that Castro, the deposed president of Venezuela, will again assume the presidency, with the consent of Gomez, that there will be no opposition to his landing, is contained in a dispatch to the Herald from the Port of Spain today.

SANTA FE, N. M., HAS GONE "DRY"

Santa Fe, N. M., April 8.—The city council of Santa Fe, by a vote of 5 to 4, last night passed an ordinance closing all saloons in the city on December 31, 1909. In the meantime the license fee of saloons will be doubled.

TWO KILLED THREE INJURED IN EXPLOSION

Point Richmond, April 9.—Two men were burned to death and three others, one of whom may die, seriously injured as a result of an explosion in one of the oil wells at the Standard Oil Co.'s plant here this morning. Fifteen hundred men were called out to fight the blaze, the oil from the exploded tank burning over eight acres. Fire was under control at noon and danger of other tanks igniting almost eliminated.

An oil tank containing 500,000 barrels is burning and sixty other tanks, containing fifteen million barrels of oil, are in the immediate vicinity and in danger.

BRISTOL SHOWED SIGNS OF INSANITY BEFORE HE WAS BATHTUBBED

(From Saturday's Daily Guard.)

Evidence was introduced this morning by the University faculty to show that Bristol was queer and peculiar before he was bath-tubbed on December 17. The testimony substantiated that given by students yesterday, and to some extent contradicted that of three members of the faculty, which was given late last evening.

Two points were brought out in the testimony today, first, that Bristol was not driven crazy by the bath-tubbing, but that he had the incipient trouble before it, and second, that bath-tubbing was not prohibited by the faculty, and was not a punishment, but was used as discipline in the dormitory.

The committee on investigation went to Salem at noon to hear the statements of Dr. Tamese, of the State Insane Asylum. The students implicated expect that his testimony will clear them and their action of being the direct cause of the boy's insanity. John N. Bristol, father of the unfortunate boy, would not at first consent to this plan, but just before adjournment last night he did so.

He has fought every move on the part of the defense and appears to be resolved to punish the perpetrators of the ducking if possible. He was heard to say on the street today that "he would put those fellows behind the bars yet."

The first witness this morning was Miss Julia Burgess of the English department. She testified, as Professor Carson, Straub and Barnett did last yesterday afternoon, that the boy seemed bright and intelligent. His composition did not show any signs of incoherence. In the history class of Dr. R. C. Clark, the boy acted very peculiarly. He was very poor, and to his knowledge the custom had never been used for any other means than discipline. It is in use at the fraternities and clubs of other colleges.

Prof. F. G. Young testified to the character of the five students, who are accused of the assault. Mrs. Present, matron of the dormitory, told of the plan in governing the dormitory. Among the students who took the stand, Stanley Young stated that Bristol thought there was an iron mine on the Kincaid athletic field, and had joked with him about it. H. Gregory explained the relation that his story in the Midnight Bough had to the bath-tubbing, but said that his account should not be taken as testimony, for it was written as a joke.

Harvey Slater, a student, testified that there was no scuffle of importance, when Bristol was dipped into the bathtub or when taken to the bathroom. J. M. Slagter, the dormitory janitor, also said that the banister, which was reported to be broken down, had been in that condition all year. That bath-tubbing is an old custom was proven by C. A. McClain of the engineering faculty. Before 1902 it was used by students to discipline rough hewers.

PAYNE BILL IN SENATE TO BE CONSIDERED

Washington, April 10.—The Payne tariff bill reached the senate from the house at two minutes past noon today and was immediately referred to the committee on finance.

While the principal fight on the final passage of the bill in the house was on the lumber schedule, the only change made in that item was the elimination of the proviso for a countervailing duty. As it stands now the schedule provides for a duty of \$1 per thousand on ordinary sawed lumber, and if planned or finished additional duty of 50 cents per thousand is provided on each side treated. Hewn timber or round timber such as is used in making spars or building wharves is dutiable at the rate of one-half cent per cubic foot.

Joe Jacobs who has been a thorn in the side of the local politicians and authorities of this city for some time past, will soon cease to be reckoned as a citizen of "Beautiful Eugene." Joe was yesterday released from durance vile, where he has been sejourning at the request of the circuit judge for the past several months, also being assessed in the sum of \$500 each on two indictments for "loitering" against the peace and dignity of the State of Oregon. Joe has served out time equivalent to the sum of \$400 and yesterday dug down in his jeans and produced the further sum of \$600 upon the payment of which Sheriff Harry Brown threw Joe out upon the tender mercies of a foreign community, for the derelict was told that new climate and new scenery would be best for his health, and that Eugene could get long very well without his presence within her borders. Joe took the hint and today is packing up his belongings and will hie himself and family to the state of Washington, where he will have freer range for his peculiar talents.

CRAWFORD, THE NOVELIST, DIES IN OLD ITALY

Sorrento, April 3.—F. Marion Crawford, the novelist, died here tonight after an illness of many months. Crawford had lived in Italy for the last six or eight years. He was born in 1845. He was the leading writer of America, next to Henry James, who expatriated himself from his country. A wife and several relatives survive him.
