CITY OFFICIALS SWORN IN BY BEN DORRIS

Eugene's new city council took possession of the city last night in the benediction of Rev. O. C. Wright. Mayor Matlock followed with his address in which he said that the people had decided what policy they want in the future, that of municipal ownership.

Recorder Dorris, who has been recorder for 22 years, four years mayor of Eugene, and two years a councilman, swore in Mayor Matlock, Councilmen Berger, Heller, Henderson and Garret and Recorder Bryson. Treasurer Reiser took the oath when his bond was filed.

Mayor's Message.

Gentlemen of the Common Council of the City of Eugene: I congratulate you and our citizens on the rapid progress that the city has made the past two years under the business like and progressive manner in which you have conducted the city affairs.

When you took office two years ago, Eugene was known only as a conservative, safe place, in which to do business and a nice quiet place for homes; but it has been transformed to one of the most progressive, enterprising and prosperous cities in the West.

Its population has increased from 5,000 to more than 10,000 and more than four miles of bituminous pavement has been laid in the streets, in less than two years. This pavement is as good as any in the state. This pavement has cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000. In the past year the city has graded and graded 40 blocks or 3 miles of the streets, and about 4 1/2 miles of lumber sidewalks have been laid and more than 4 miles of cement sidewalks. This far exceeds street improvements in any previous year in the city's history.

The water plant was purchased and turned over to the city December 1st. The gross income from the plant for December, January, February and March, four months was:

Total receipts \$5,450.35
Expenses, help, power etc. 4,420.72
Net income, four months 1,029.63
This is a good showing.
Increase of warrant indebtedness the past year has been \$24,501.09, as reported by the Recorder. This increase was caused largely by the city paying for the pavement of street intersections of more than 50 blocks otherwise outstanding warrants would have been less than they were last year.

For more complete information I

refer you to the reports of officers. Several new additions have been planned and added to the city and many new residences have been erected. Property values have advanced from 25 to 500 per cent and will continue to advance if your pursue the same aggressive and energetic policy during your term in office.

The outgoing administration has had much to do with this wonderful advancement in the wealth and prosperity of the city. The people, as the late election, sustained the Mayor and Council by such a decisive majority that there is no question but that they want the same policy pursued in the future, as has been carried out in the past.

Permit me to quote your platform and to call attention to pledges therein contained, which pledges were made that the voters might know what you intended to do in case you were elected. These pledges are now standing in you and the people expect you to speedily, intelligently and honestly make good. What the people may expect of the coming administration:

Municipal Ownership Platform.

To the Voters of Eugene:
First—This is our declaration—For the enforcement of law and order, and a progressive administration, we stand upon our record of the past two years.

Second—We pledge ourselves to complete the McKenzie power plant at the earliest possible time in order that the city may have and own the power necessary and adequate for pumping water.

Third—We have already taken steps to secure wells of pure water for our water system. It will be our aim and object to accomplish this purpose without delay.

Fourth—We propose to continue the extension of the water mains throughout the city until every household can be supplied with water.

Fifth—We are decidedly in favor of municipal ownership of lights, when authorized by the people.

Sixth—I will be your policy in the future as it has been in the past, to administer the city government in the interest of all the people, without fear or favor and free from the dictation of corporation interests.

Fifth—Lights, when authorized by the people.

Sixth—To pursue the same course as you have in the last administration.

I hope and believe that this covenant voluntarily entered into with the people, has made a lasting impression on the tablets of your hearts and will be faithfully carried out to the best of your abilities.

Routine Business.

Howard Wood, the University plumber, asked for permission to lay steam pipes across University avenue. The matter was referred to the street committee.

The street committee reported favorably on the proposition to gravel Onyx avenue from East Eleventh street to Fourteenth street; Washington from Eighth to Twelfth; and Fairmount boulevard to East Fifteenth street. Council ordered ordinances drawn providing for this work. The committee also reported the amount of lumber used by the street commissioner during the month. They reported that the steam roller had been at work on West Fifth and West Sixth street, and these would be ready soon for a coating of crushed rock.

Proesse and Son were recommended by the sewer committee for a plumber's license. Sewers were also authorized in the alley between Sixth and Seventh streets from Madison west to Blair. The sewer in West Third street was ordered extended to Lincoln.

The committee reported adversely on the petition of Miss Nettie Kress and Mrs. Jessie VanSoy for rebate of assessment on the new sewer in East Twelfth street, they alleging that the old one gave satisfaction.

The fire and water committee reported that the extension of water mains to south High street would be taken up at an early date. Extension to the site of the school house in the west part of town has been ordered and is being made. Councilman Garret of the committee, reported that more pipe was needed; that the price bid now is 25 per cent less than when the first car load was ordered and the council directed the superintendent of the water department to order another carload of the pipe.

City Engineer Waggoner reported on the amount of paving laid during the past year, some 76,500 square yards, bringing the total to 93,643 square yards.

The finance committee reported on a large number of bills the largest being for a carload of pipe valued at \$1323 with the freight at \$99. Treasurer Reiser reported that there is \$411 in the water fund, and Collector Simmons reported \$1800 on hand.

Petitions Referred.

The following petitions were referred to committees:

Petition for sidewalk on the north side of Park street in College Hill park.

Petition for grading and graveling of Jefferson street from Eighth to Thirteenth.

Petition for grading and graveling of following streets in Gross addition: Agate avenue from East Eleventh street to the city limits; Twenty-first from Fairmount boulevard to University avenue; Collier street from Eighteenth to Twenty-Third and Twentieth street from Agate to University avenue.

The night police, on petition of the Commercial club, were directed to turn off the colored lights whenever they are used.

N. Humphrey presented a plan of what was referred to the street committee. Maple Croft addition to Eugene, which was referred to the street committee and city attorney for ratification.

The city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance approving the plat of the Kincaid addition.
