FIVE THOUSAND KILLED IN RELIGIOUS RIOTS AT ADANA AND IN VICINITY

Constantinople, April 20.—No fewer than five thousand lost their lives in the massacres in the valley of Adana during the last few days as the result of an outbreak of Moslem fanaticism. Of this number 2000 were killed in the city of Adana, more than 200 of the victims being Moslems. This information was received today through consular channels.

A six days' armistice has been declared in Tabriz to permit the receipt of provisions and other supplies for thousands of women and children who are clamoring for bread. Adana at present is quiet but there has been renewed attacks on the Christians at Marash.

AN AMERICAN KILLED

Washington, April 20.—An American named Baskerville, a teacher in the Presbyterian boys' school at Tabriz, accused of complicity in revolutionary movements, was killed in battle today, according to advices from Consul Doty. The mission disavowed the acts of Baskerville and he resigned.

Both President Taft and Dr. Eliot must have felt proud of the popular approval that greeted the president's announcement that he had asked the retiring head of Harvard university to accept the British ambassadorship. Men of every political party in the country hastened to endorse the president's act and express the hope that Dr. Eliot would accept. Dr. Eliot retires from the presidency of the university in May.

STRUGGLE OVER INCOME TAX IS IN PROSPECT

Washington, April 20.—It is evident that the income tax will furnish a sharp contest in the senate during the tariff discussion. In view of the facts the democrats are said to be unanimous for an income tax, the leaders of the "insurgents" republican faction appear to be confident of victory.

On the other hand the opponents of the income tax declare the democrats are not united and that some of the insurgent strength will be lost if it is shown that the tariff bill provides sufficient revenue to run the government.

Census Bill Rejected.

By an aye and nay vote the senate today rejected the conference reported on the census bill because of its failure to include the McCumber amendment, requiring applicants for civil service employment to reside in the states claimed by them as their homes.

CORBETT SAYS HE IS PROMISED FIGHT BY JACK JOHNSON

New York, April 19.—After promising Jim Corbett that he would match him with Jack Johnson on Thanksgiving day, in the event that the black champion is not defeated by Stanley Ketchel October 12, James W. Coffroth, the San Francisco fight promoter, is on his way home today. Corbett is satisfied that he will not believe Ketchel will be able to dispose of the big fellow.

Corbett admits Ketchel's cleverness, but declares the white boy is not large enough to defeat the negro. "I believe that I can lick Johnson," declared Corbett today. "This is no advertising scheme. I am earnest and am ready to prove that it is not hot air if I can get into the ring with Johnson."

"I must fight soon or not at all. I realize that I am getting old and must hurry. But I am just as fast now as I ever was and believe that I can show Johnson that I still have something of a punch left."

CONTRACTS LET FOR TWO NEW SCHOOL HOUSES

The Eugene school board today let the contracts for the erection of the two new grammar grade school buildings, one to be erected in the Fair Grounds addition and the other in Fairmount. Bids were received some time ago on the several items necessary to the construction of such buildings and after a thorough examination of the various bids the contracts were let today as follows:

For furnishing lumber—Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., \$1945.30 for each building.

Electric wiring—Pacific Electrical Engineering Co., \$122.50 for each building.

Maple flooring—W. O. Heckart, \$54 per thousand feet.

Plumbing—Claude Gaby, \$2650 for both buildings.

Mill work—American Mill & Lumber Co., (Seventeenth and Willamette streets,) \$1600 for each building.

Plastering—Wm. Ratzburg, \$900 for each building.

Painting—J. M. Murray, Fairmount building, \$800; G. W. Shinn, Fair Grounds building, \$800.

Cement floors and cement sidewalks—T. H. Ellis, \$1900 for both buildings.

Heating plant—W. G. McPherson Co., hot air fan system, \$2650 for each building.

The entire work will be under the supervision of W. H. Alexander, the well-known contractor, who will do the construction work. The excavation for the Fair Grounds building is completed and work will begin on the foundation at once. Excavating for the Fairmount building has begun.

Both buildings will contain eight rooms and will be built exactly alike, but only the four lower rooms of the Fairmount building will be finished at present, as there is no need yet of eight rooms in that part of the city.

JOHNSON-JEFFRIES

BARRED FROM SEATTLE

Seattle, April 20.—President of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, has declared that the Johnson-Jeffries fight cannot be pulled off at the exposition. The state law gives him power to prevent such exhibitions, and Mayor Miller says he will stop such an exhibition in this city.
