

HONOR REMAINS OF MAN WHO LAID OUT CAPITAL CITY

Washington, April 28.—With simple though impressive ceremonies, the remains of Major Chas. L'Enfant were today transferred to the national cemetery at Arlington, thus being accorded the nation's greatest tribute to the memory of the distinguished French engineer who, under the authority of General Washington, laid out the plans for the capital city of the United States.

For the transfer of the remains of the designer of the beautiful capital from an obscure and unmarked grave at Green Hill, Md., to a more slightly resting place and the erection of a memorial, congress recently appropriated \$1000.

This forenoon, before being removed to Arlington, the body of L'Enfant lay in state in the rotunda of the capitol, and from 10 to 11 o'clock a memorial service was held. The service, although short and simple, was most impressive. The ceremonies were conducted in the presence of a congregation which included many from the highest official life of the nation, eminent representatives of the Society of Cincinnati, of which Major L'Enfant was a member, and also representatives of the daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the American Revolution, the Columbia Historical Society, and the Washington Society of Engineers, which has taken a special interest in the remains of L'Enfant.

The two memorial exercises were conducted by the president of the Society of Cincinnati, the ambassador from France. At the conclusion of the services the remains were taken from the capitol to Arlington cemetery under a military escort furnished by the War Department.

President Taft was present only as a spectator.

Ambassador's Address.
Ambassador Jusserand declared that L'Enfant had foreseen the present greatness in all its aspects, "even the last acquired one, the one of which the American nation is justly proud, her navy." The intuition L'Enfant had of the future of his adopted country was nothing very extraordinary, the ambassador continued.

"All French people," he said, "had the same. From the first France thought that the United States would be and should be a great nation. The first diplomat ever sent here came from France, and now Pierre L'Enfant will sleep his last sleep in that Arlington cemetery where so many are buried who fought as he did, and fell as he did for the nation, near that of General Sheridan, who left such examples of heroism, he rests on the slopes from which can be seen

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ROBBER DIED CURSING PRIEST WITH LAST WORDS

Killed Policeman in Duel and
Was Himself Fatally
Wounded

Logansport, Ind., April 28.—"You go to hell."

A dying highwayman shot by a policeman, who was himself fatally wounded by the thief this morning, raised himself with one last supreme effort to shout this invitation at a priest bending over him with an appeal for a confession. Then he fell back dead. The man is unidentified.

The highwayman and Patrolman Kroeger were shot in a revolver duel following a series of hold-ups by the dead thief and a companion. The latter was captured today and identified as Charles Pierce of Scranton, Pa.

He is charged with having fired the shot that killed the policeman.

MANUFACTURERS MEET IN ANNUAL SESSION AT BOSTON

Boston, Mass., April 28.—The eighty-sixth annual meeting of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers opened today for a two days' session. Governor Draper welcomed the members at the opening session.

Among the subjects to receive attention at the meeting are, transportation for mill yards, commutator grinding, cotton futures on the New York and New Orleans Cotton Exchanges, air conditioning for cotton mills, finishing and bleaching, loom improvements, losses in cotton due to moisture and other causes, additional top strippers on revolving flat cards, scientific methods in warp sizing, automatic looms, economy in steam generation, preparation and marketing of cotton to the factory, cotton fibre substance and its properties, advantage of variable speeds for ring spinning and later forms of spindles.

FEAR FURTHER TROUBLE MAY OCCUR AT ADA

Ada, Okla., April 28.—Fearing that as a result of the lynching here of four cattle men for the murder of A. A. Bobbitt, further trouble might arise, Oscar Peeler, an alleged accessory to the crime, and Edward and David Johnson, charged with the murder of another man, have again been removed to Tecumseh for safe keeping.

AMERICAN MISSIONARIES BESIEGED AT HADJIN SEND VAIN APPEALS FOR SUCCOR

Constantinople, April 28.—A telegram has been received from Miss Rose Lambert, one of the besieged American women missionaries at Hadjin, setting forth the danger surrounding Miss Lambert and her companions, who are quite alone. The messenger who first started with the message was shot down on the way.

The communication is dated at Hadjin, April 26, and reveals a terrible state of affairs. Shooting, rioting, pillaging and burning continue, and Hadjin is almost entirely without food. The provincial authorities have ignored all oral and written appeals for help.

The American women at Hadjin are: Miss Virginia A. Billings, of Kirtland, Ohio; Miss Lambert, daughter of Bishop Lambert; Miss Emily E. Richter, of Chicago, and a Miss Baldwin.

Bishop Burgess of Long Island officiated, assisted by the Rev. Wm. R. Huntington, D. D. A reception at the Plaza Hotel followed the ceremony at the church.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. John Terrill Clark and widow of Frank M. Avery. During Mr. Avery's lifetime she lived in Chicago, but after his death she divided her time between New York and London, becoming a great social success in both cities. Mr. Kidder, the bridegroom, is a well known broker of New York and Boston. He is a Harvard graduate and has won considerable reputation as a hunter. His sister, now Mrs. Linsley R. Williams of this city, was formerly the wife of the late Paul Leicester Ford, the novelist.

Cabanne, who was smuggled out of St. Louis and brought to this city by Broughton Brandenburg, his step-father, who is being held by the police to await the action of the New York authorities in connection with the charge of the grand jury growing out of the sale of a letter purporting to have been written by the late Grover Cleveland, was today taken from the juvenile detention home and given into the custody of his father, James C. Cabanne, of St. Louis.

MINERS UNANIMOUS FOR AGREEMENT

Scranton, April 28.—The proposed agreement that the officers of the anthracite miners' union hope will be signed by the hard coal operators was laid before the delegates today and the principal section, the renewal of the old agreement, was unanimously adopted.

DEFENSE IS OUTLINED BY JAMES H. BOYLE

Says That Two Men Kidnapped Boy and He Is Not Guilty

Mercer, Pa., April 28.—James H. Boyle, awaiting trial on the charge of kidnapping Willie Whittle, expects to prove he was in Youngstown and not in Sharon as the prosecution will try to prove, on the evening before the abduction, and that he left Youngstown on the morning of the abduction, going to Warren, Ohio, where he met a couple of friends, who had the Whittle boy in their charge. He says they informed him that smallpox had broken out in Sharon and that they were taking the boy away from the disease.

Thereupon he took the boy to his apartment, Boyle insists he knew nothing regarding the correspondence concerning the ransom.

Mrs. Boyle has no defense prepared, and she seems satisfied that there is no evidence against her.

THREATEN TO KIDNAP WILLIE WHITLA AGAIN

Boston, April 28.—Charged with attempting to extort \$10,000 from James Whittle, of Sharon, Pa., under the threat they would again kidnap Willie Whittle, two men were arrested here yesterday and gave their names as John W. Wright and Ernest H. Martin.

ANARCHIST PLANNED TO KILL FAILLERIES

Incriminating Evidence Found After His Arrest by The Police

Monte Carlo, April 28.—A man named Verdier has been arrested here and is declared by the French authorities to be an anarchist and that he visited Monte Carlo for the purpose of killing President Failleries, of France, who is visiting here. A revolver loaded with jacketed bullets was found on Verdier as well as a letter addressed to the prefect of the department of the Alpes Maritimes, in which the man explained the motive of his contemplated act. The police believe he is insane.

WHEAT MARKET MAKES STEADY GAIN IN TODAY'S PRICES

Chicago, April 28.—Additional gains were made today in wheat prices at the opening of the market, initial quotations showing advances of from 3-8 to 1 3-4 as compared with yesterday's close. May opened at \$1.22 3-4; July at \$1.09 1-2. At the close the market was firm. Closing quotations: May, \$1.22; July, \$1.09 5-8; Sept. \$1.01 7-8 and \$1.02; Dec. \$1.00 7-8.

Four hundred chicks were burned to death in the fourth fire to occur in Pendleton within the past 24 hours. The explosion of an incubator in a chicken yard caused the fire.
