This Season's Clothing Sacrificed

DEVELOPMENT OF RESOURCES IS THE THEME

(From Tuesday's Daily Guard.)

So far this afternoon the convention of the Oregon Development League, held in the city, is a big success. The weather is good, the attendance from outside points is large and the visiting delegates seem delighted with Eugene and the way they are being entertained here.

The first delegates came in from the north on the early morning train. Theodore B. Wilcox, who resided at the meeting this afternoon, those who came in this morning were taken in hand by Eugene boosters--we are all boosters here--and shown about the city. Most of them climbed to the top of Skinner's Butte and admired the view of the city afforded from that vantage point. All were surprised at the natural beauty of the surrounding country, and at the number of new buildings seen in course of construction from there.

At one o'clock this afternoon, the session of the convention began. There was no fixed program but a list of speakers was prepared this morning, after it was seen who was here and who would be here this afternoon. Besides Mr. Wilcox, who made the opening address, the following were on the program:

CO-OPERATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF LOCAL RESOURCES

Was Theme of Addresses--Fill Up Rural Districts and Cities Will Take Care of Themselves

The theme of the promotion meeting of the Oregon Development League, held this afternoon in the Commercial Club rooms, was co-operation and development of local resources. The success of Salem, Eugene and other towns was shown to be due to looking after the interests of the farms near the towns.

Every speaker dwelt upon the need of people not in the towns but in the country. Chairman Wilcox struck the thought of all the speakers when he explained how the future of Portland and every town is bound up in the rural districts.

Chairman Wilcox opened the meeting shortly after 1 o'clock. He congratulated Eugene upon what has been done and what she plans to do. The Portland Booster said in his remarks: "No section of the country is related to Portland from an economic view more than the Willamette valley, and in that way Eugene means much to the Portland taxpayer."

After the Lewis and Clark fair we decided that we must advertise the whole Northwest rather than Portland, the city. So must the cities of Eugene, Albany and Corvallis and all other places. Men to advertise can be hired cheaper than we can learn to think up original ideas ourselves. We must put money into advertising this state with its 90,000 square miles. Eugene has learned this, and so have other places. The purpose of the meeting is to teach each other methods, and profit by mistakes and experience. Our reputation in the Northwest is bound up with each other. Our present prosperity is not due to any one thing--it is due to all as a whole."

Thompson Welcomes Visitors
President H. M. Thompson, of the

Eugene Commercial Club, welcomed the visitors.

"The men here are those behind the guns," he said. "In honor of Mr. Richardson's work we of the Eugene Commercial Club have elected him an honorary member. He is the second to receive the honor."

Dr. L. L. Whitson, president of the promotion department of the Eugene Commercial Club, told of the method Eugene had used.

"We have filled up the country. Where there was formerly one family near Eugene there are now five. We have looked after the country and we find that the town attends to itself."

How Salem Does
A. F. Hofer, secretary of the club in Salem, said: "Last year Salem raised \$10,000. Before that we were in the two-bit class. Well we have spent it. But we keep a record of investments by newcomers. They have amounted to a million dollars. Railroad improvements and similar things totaled another million; all for \$10,000. Another thing we did was to get pledges for new buildings. We got a bare hundred finally, but as soon as they began to construct others followed and we had 324 at the end of the year."

"We spend \$1000 for little one-inch ads in the papers in the East, soliciting correspondence. We get replies and send back literature and most of all the newspapers. Papers filled with advertisements show that something is doing in a town, and people like them better than hot air boasts."

"Real estate men are dangerous, if the year unorganized. Every lie that is told is found out, and only reflects on the community. We have a plan of getting Germans. We advertise in German papers. I handle the replies. The Germans (I am one myself), I think, are a particularly good class. They put money in the banks and make business good. They come to me with their troubles, and sometimes I write their letters, and more and more people write and come."

The Dalles Deals in Conditions
J. M. Patterson, of The Dalles, told of the conditions at his home. The Dalles was once the distributing point for part of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Eastern Oregon. Everything was sheep. The railroads cut off our sheep districts.

Local Country Best
"From 1890 to 1900 we didn't have a change of 50 people. In 1900 our wool trade was all gone. Since then we have worked upon local resources and we have 1500 more people. We also subscribed for fruit magazines, and we have large orchards of three-year-old stuff, which is the result of this effort. People are now looking for small tracts, and owners are cutting their large farms up. The Dalles has new life and is getting a new, solid growth."

News From Absent Ones
A telegram was read from the Astoria body, offering regrets and congratulations. Letters were read from McMinnville, Waldport and Hillsboro and a telephone message from Cottage Grove, which places have no representatives here.

Medford's Prosperity
Judge William Colvig, of Medford, said that William county in 1900 was assessed at \$2,250,000, but in 1908 at \$26,000,000.

"That indicates some of the things we have done," he said. Judge Colvig brought down the one hundred boosters telling how he had raised the money to start the boosting fever in Medford. He said Oregon was the best country yet.

"I have been here fifty-eight years; I once went away, but the Oregon mountains called me back," he said. "We hear of Eugene in California. In Washington--everywhere we go, and we also hear of Medford. Both are known for energy and enterprise."

At Albany
E. W. Langdon, president of the First National Bank at Albany, told what had been done in Linn county. Postoffice receipts had increased 15 per cent and everything else to a greater extent.

Roseburg's Colt Boosts.
Booster C. T. Colt, of Roseburg, said that between half a million and a million dollars' increase had been made in property values. "During the last twelve months," sales have been made," he said, "amounting to more than all during the previous ten years." There are being built one \$17,000 residence, a fine Masonic temple, a splendid church edifice, paving twenty blocks, a wireless telegraph office, free mail delivery, a new telephone switchboard, a real estate organization, new store fronts and two stenographers in the promotion department, where one before had hardly anything to do.

Grants Pass and Corvallis.
E. E. Blanchard, secretary of the Commercial club at Grants Pass, told what was being done in Josephine county. He said that Grants Pass needs a few funerals, but that the knockings had been greatly reduced.

State Senator R. W. Johnson, of Corvallis, said that considerable missionary work has been done in Corvallis. Agricultural papers have been used for advertising the middle West, and a fund of \$500 a month has been raised.

Tom Richardson said that Corvallis had the finest Commercial club of any small city west of the Rocky mountains, and Senator Johnson told how it was built.

President Campbell Speaks.
President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, was introduced to the meeting. He said that the University had helped Eugene, and the whole state. "Our students will do the advertising of the future, and furnish the ideals of the future," he said.

"We have tremendous resources in Oregon, in minerals, in timber, in men and in ways you have never known or heard of."

Other Speakers.
Other delegates who spoke were Edwards, of Drain, R. H. Parsons, of Creswell, Hallaway, of Brownsville, and Booster John H. Hartog, of Eugene.

A. E. Tower, of Junction, reported there had been a clean up day and

the business men are unified for the purpose of boosting.

The Dalles Invites.
J. M. Patterson, of The Dalles, extended an invitation to the Oregon Development League to hold their next meeting in the "Cherry City."

Newspaper Man Has His Say.
C. S. Jackson, editor of the Oregon Journal, of Portland, with a number of pointed stories, illustrated how business makes business, and the manner in which judicious investment reaps wealth for the individual and for the community.

Tom Richardson, the chief of the boosters, then told the delegates to take the lessons of the afternoon to heart and to their home. Immediately afterwards they were taken to the University grounds in automobiles and other parts of the city.

FRANCHISE FOR LIGHT AND POWER AT SPRINGFIELD

At a meeting of the city council of Springfield last night the McKenzie Valley Irrigation and Power Company was granted a franchise to furnish electric power and light to the citizens of that city for a period of fifty years. This is the company of farmers recently organized to carry on irrigation in the country surrounding Springfield and northeast of Eugene, also to build a power plant on a site filed on by members of the company on the McKenzie river.

The company guarantees to give the people of Springfield a reasonable rate for power and light, to be fixed by an impartial commission to be named by the people. It also agrees to give the city an option on the purchase of the plant at the end of 25 years, the valuation to be fixed by a like commission. The terms of the franchise provide that the city shall have one per cent of the gross earnings of the plant until the city has attained a population of 5000, after which two per cent goes to the city.

The franchise provides that the plant shall be in operation within 18 months from the present time, and the promoters of the enterprise state that provision will be complied with, barring bad luck or accidents.

The Willamette Valley Company, the corporation that furnishes the lights and power in Eugene and which owns the street railway system, also supplies Springfield with lights, but, like the people of Eugene, the citizens of the enterprising little saw-mill city complain bitterly of the poor service and the high rates, and are glad to see a competing company enter the field. The ordinance granting the franchise passed the council unanimously.
