### BOYLES ATTEMPT TO SUICIDE AFTER VERDICT IS GIVEN

Mercer, May 10.—Threats of double suicide made by Mrs. Boyle were not idle words, as was shown today when it became known that a razor secreted in the clothing of Boyle was removed from his clothing. Mrs. Boyle, last night, swallowed enough morphine "to kill two people," as she put it. It rendered her partially unconscious, but was removed. This dose, it is believed, was responsible for her collapse in court today. It is believed she obtained the poison from a woman prisoner occupying the next cell who is a morphine fiend.

Mrs. Boyle has stated that she will commit suicide.

According to James Boyle the name of the third party will be made public soon after the couple reach the penitentiary. The person will be named in the appeal which will be taken.

Boyle told something today of the murder in which he implicates a third party to the abduction. It was committed at Youngstown, Ohio, twelve or fourteen years ago, in which a man named Vogel was killed in a quarrel. A verdict of accidental death was returned. The counsel for Boyle investigated the case and says that accidental death was the only verdict possible upon the evidence; that if Boyle has other evidence he did not tell his counsel.

James H. and Mrs. Boyle were taken to the Western penitentiary at Pittsburg late this afternoon.

### RAIN SHOWERS GREAT BENEFIT TO GROWING CROPS

(From Monday's Daily Guard)

The rains of yesterday and last night mean thousands of dollars to the farmers of Lane county. The frosts of last week, together with the dry conditions generally, were the occasion of considerable worry among the farmers. While there were a number of localities in which the frost hit hard, the damage is not as great as was first reported from some sections.

The cherry crop across the river

Does not seem to have been damaged to any extent and rains will help materially in its development. Prunes were badly nipped along the river road, but not so much on higher ground. Early strawberries were quite generally affected, but the fear of further damage is considerably dispelled by the rains which make further frosts, for the present, at least, improbable.

Aside from the damage reported to fruit from the frosts, the prospects in Lane for a good crop are encouraging. The apple crop will be light this year on account of the heavy crop of 1908.

### PRESIDENT SENDS MESSAGE ON PORTO RICAN AFFAIRS REQUIRING PROMPT ACTION

Washington, D. C., May 10.—President Taft today sent Congress a special message recommending legislation at the present extra session, amending the Foraker act under which Porto Rico is governed. The President directs the attention of Congress to affairs on the island, laying particular stress on what he terms, "A situation of unusual gravity," developed through the failure of the legislative assembly of Porto Rico to pass the usual appropriation bills, leaving the island without support after June 30 next.

Porto Ricans have forgotten the generosity of the United States the President says, in the desire of certain of the island's political leaders for power and he bids that the present situation in Porto Rico be the extension of political power to the Porto Ricans. He concludes that the absolute power of appropriation should be taken away from those who have shown themselves too irresponsible to enjoy it.

The President suggests to Congress the wisdom of submitting to the appropriation committee the question of qualifying some of the provision of the fundamental act as to the respective jurisdiction of the executive council and the legislative assembly. But no action of this kind, the President says, should be begun until the Foraker act is amended so that when the legislative appropriation necessary to carry on the government, sums equal to the appropriation made in the previous years for the respective years shall be available for the current revenue and shall be drawn by the warrant of the auditor to the treasurer and countersigned by the governor. Such a provision applies to the legislatures of the Philippines and Hawaii and, "It has prevented in these two countries any misuse of the powers of appropriation."

The President reviews the establishment of the present government for Porto Rico by the Foraker act. He says the statute directing how the expenses of the government are to be provided leaves some doubt whether this function is not committed solely to the executive council but in practice the legislative assembly has appropriated for all the expenses other than for salaries fixed by Congress and the President adds, "It is too late to reverse that construction."

The President says that ever since the institution of the present assembly the House of delegates has uniformly held up the appropriation bills until the last minute of the session and has sought to use the power to do so as a means of compelling the concurrence of the executive

council in legislation which the House desired. In the last regular legislative assembly the attitude of the executive council in refusing to pass the necessary appropriation bills.

Mr. Taft discussed the acts of the legislature and council in detail and says the facts recited demonstrate the willingness of the representatives of the people in the House of Delegates to subvert the government in order to secure the passage of certain legislation. The question whether the proposed legislation should be enacted into law was left by the fundamental act to the joint action of the executive council and the house of delegates as the legislative assembly.

The President says that the fact that the Porto Ricans forgetting the generosity of this government should not be an occasion for surprise, nor in dealing with a whole people can it be made the basis of a charge of ingratitude.

"When we, with the consent of the people of Porto Rico assumed guardianship over them and the guidance of their destinies, we must have been conscious that a people that had enjoyed so little opportunity for education could not be expected safely for themselves to exercise the full power of self government and the present development is only an indication that we have gone somewhat too far in the extension of political power to them for their own good.

"The change recommended may not immediately convince those controlling the House of delegates on the mistake they have made in the extremity to which they have been willing to resort for political purposes but in the long run it will secure more careful and responsible exercise of the power they have.

"There is not the slightest evidence that there has been on the part of the government or any member of the executive council a disposition to usurp authority or to withhold approval of such legislation as was for the best interests of the islands or lack of sympathy with the best aspirations of the Porto Rican people."
