GIRL KILLED SUDDENLY NEAR TO CRESWELL

News comes from Creswell regarding the sad and untimely death of little ten-year-old Bessie Holt at her home a few miles south of that town Friday afternoon. The little girl was a step-daughter of Peter McCune and while playing about the door yard with a small butcher knife, tripped on some obstruction and fell on the sharp pointed blade of the knife which she had in her hand and pierced her heart. She arose from the ground and exclaimed to her step-father, "Oh, I am stuck!" and fell prostrate at his feet, dying almost instantly. It was a very pathetic death and a terrible shock to the parents.

Fate seems to deal hard with this family as it will be remembered that only a few years ago, Mr. Holt, father of the child mentioned above, was killed in a logging camp by a large log rolling over him, and this is the third child which has met with an untimely death in his family. A few years ago one of the children by accident drank a cup of lye and died. A little later an infant baby was smothered while sleeping between father and mother, and this late fatal accident is no less harrowing.

Unless you know a person into whose life in some way—yours, are not greatly concerned about whether he is good or bad, desirable or objectionable. It's so with a store. The people who never visit it care nothing about it one way or the other. It doesn't exist—for them. But when they are persuaded to patronize it—when they come to turn the spotlight of their attention on it—when it comes to have a part in their lives, as some stores must have in all cities—then it's different; then it does matter whether it strives to win confidence; it does matter whether or not its price concessions are genuine, dependable.

As predicted by The Guard, the election yesterday resulted overwhelmingly in favor of condemning the right-of-way for the city's power canal through the land of Oscar Millean. The vote was as follows: First ward—Yes, 206. No, 35. Majority, 171. Second ward—Yes, 92. No, 12. Majority, 80. Third ward—Yes, 108. No, 23. Majority, 85. Fourth ward—Yes, 136. No, 26. Majority, 110. Total—Yes, 542. No, 96. Majority, 452.

JOE SIMON WINS IN THE RACE

Portland, May 8.—As the result of the municipal primaries held here this afternoon, former United States Senator Joseph Simon, Republican, and former Circuit Judge M. G. Munly, Democrat, will face each other in June for mayoralty honors, 171. Senator Simon was selected by his party to head its ticket by two to one majority over A. G. Rushlight. Charles E. McDonnell, a well-known Spanish-American war veteran, ran fourth in the race. Munley's victory was by a narrow margin over Mayor Harry Ylano. Councilman Frank S. Bennett has been nominated the Republican candidate for municipal judge over Seneca Pounts.
