## 2 MORE BLOCKS OF STREET PAVING CONTRACTED FOR

The city council met in adjourned session this morning at ten o'clock for the purpose of letting the contract for the paving of Oak street between East Ninth and East Eleventh. The contract for building the cement curbing was to let it to T. H. Ellis and that for the bitulithic pavement to the Warren Construction Co. on a basis of \$2.10 per square yard. The pavement is to be 42 feet wide. There was considerable discussion as to the cost of the pavement, but W. L. Archambault, the company's representative, stated that he was sure the company would make a number of concessions. The result of yesterday's election was canvassed. It was found that 542 votes had been cast for the proposition of empowering the city to condemn the right-of-way for the power canal through Oscar Milligan's land and 99 had been cast against it, leaving a majority for the proposition of 443.

### Last Night's Meeting.

Much routine business was transacted by the city data at their regular meeting last night. Bids for the transmission wire to be used from the proposed power plant to Eugene were opened. There were two bids, one from the American Wire and Steel Co. at \$15.25 and \$15.75 1-2 per 100 pounds, being accepted.

Reports from committees were read and placed on file. Councilman Moon reported that prices had been secured on additional street sprinklers and the committee recommended the purchase of one more. The report was adopted and the committee directed to purchase one.

The matter of a sewer to the new school house in the Fair Grounds addition was referred.

A petition was presented to macadamize West Seventh street from Olive to Blair. The matter was referred to the city engineer to obtain figures on the approximate cost. The committee recently appointed to select a site for the wells of the city water works reported as follows:

"We, the committee appointed to select a site for a city well, recommend the Chase property, across the river one mile from town, as the most suitable site. This site is

not overflowed by high water and a well here would give us McKenzie river water. Mr. Chase has a well here, 25 feet deep which pumps 350 gallons per minute, and yet the supply seems to be inexhaustible. We also recommend that by crossing the river at Fairmount the expense could be lessened and a revenue obtained by consumers in that part of the city.

The water collector reported that \$13339.31 was collected as water rents during April.

## CAPTAIN HAINS CONVICTED OF MANSLAUGHTER

Flushing, N. Y., May 11.—The jury in the case of Capt. Peter C. Hains, Jr., U. S. A., charged with the murder of Wm. E. Annis on August 15, 1908, brought in a verdict of guilty of manslaughter, in the first degree this afternoon. The jury has been out for four hours.

The defendant was remanded to the custody of the sheriff for sentence next Monday morning, and it is expected that counsel for Hains will make the usual motion for a stay of

sentence, and will take an appeal. The maximum sentence is twenty years' imprisonment.

### FIRST NATIONAL AND BONNETT BROS. WILL BUILD BRICK BLOCKS

Saturday night the officials of the First National Bank secured an agreement from Bonnett Bros., who now own the Bangs Livery stable property, that if the bank will erect a two-story brick block in the rear of the bank building, they will put up a brick block just across the alley, the property now being occupied by the wooden portion of the stables.

The bank has had this proposition

under consideration for some time past but the officials would not decide upon it until they secured an agreement from the Bonnett Brothers, as they did not want an old fire trap across the alley from their new building.

The bank's new block will have a frontage on West Ninth street of 60 feet and will be 45 feet deep. The lower floor will be divided into two large store rooms, both of which have been spoken for, and the upper floor will contain office rooms. At least one physician has asked for a suite of these rooms.

The building will be faced with pressed brick. W. O. Heckart has been awarded the contract to build it.

The Bangs Livery Co. has a lease on the Bonnett property for over a year yet, and until that expires the latter will not put up their brick building.

### WOMAN'S BODY IN OLD CEMETERY

Providence, R. I., May 11.—The terribly battered body of Mrs. Laura E. Regester, a Cranston woman, was found today in an old Hebrew cemetery of this city. She had evidently been strangled, and her clothes were bloody and torn. The police believe she was murdered on the road and ragged to the cemetery. The woman was 32 years old and had been divorced. It is understood she had recently become engaged to be married again.

The investigation by medical experts found that the woman was criminally assaulted.

### S. P. FARE REDUCED FOR EUGENE EVENTS

The Southern Pacific has granted the petition of the Commercial club and of the University for a one and one-third rate to Eugene during this week. The reduction is made for both the Junior week end at the University and for the I. O. O. F. dedication Saturday.

According to the rules of the reduction, fifty tickets will have to be sold during the time. Full fare must be paid, but the passengers may receive rebates, when they present their receipts accompanied by certificates from the registrar of the University and from the management of the Odd Fellows dedicatory ceremonies.

## BOYLE FOUND GUILTY BY JURY IN SHORT ORDER

Mercer, Pa., May 6.—In the trial of James H. Boyle, the alleged abductor of "Billy" Whittle, today, the latter pointed a finger at Boyle and said:

"That is the man." Boyle entered a formal plea of not guilty, and "Billy" was the first witness, his answer causing a ripple of laughter when he answered the question where boys go when they do not tell the truth, saying, "they go to hell."

In his boyish way the witness told of a man who said his name was Jones, who called at the school in a buggy and told him he was taking him away on account of smallpox; that he was to take other also, and that "Billy" was to meet friends on the train.

The witness described the wanderings of himself and his abductors with remarkable detail for one so young. Boyle Found Guilty. When the court convened this afternoon counsel for James H. Boyle, on trial for kidnapping Willie Whittle, entered a plea of nolle prosequere, or refusal to offer any evidence.

Boyle was then found guilty, the jury being out fifteen minutes. At the conclusion of the trial of James H. Boyle, Mrs. Boyle was brought into court, the intention being to put her on trial at once.

### WOMAN LURES OFFICIAL TO RUIN

Olympia, Wash., May 5.—On fictitious and forged vouchers, which he induced Governor Mead and State Auditor C. W. Clausen to approve, Ortis Hamilton, formerly of Colfax and Spokane, secured while Adjutant-General and spent personally between \$20,000 and \$50,000 of state military funds, according to a partial confession, made to Governor Hay and Attorney-General Bell here this afternoon. Hamilton is now in custody of the sheriff here in default of \$10,000 bonds, having been arrested on complaint of the Attorney-General's office on charge of larceny of state moneys.

Money Spent on Affinity. Having absolute confidence in Hamilton's honesty, Mead and Clausen audited Hamilton's vouchers in a perfunctory manner, so when the Adjutant-General sought a means of securing funds to spend upon his affinity, Hazel Moore, a notorious

character, it was easily discovered. Hamilton, in his confession to the Governor, said he was unable to state the exact amount of his shortage, but George Lamping, of Seattle, who succeeded him as Adjutant-General some weeks ago and who has been checking up the records, says the amount will range between \$20,000 and \$50,000.

Hamilton, who isn't past 30, spent three years at the old Bishop Scott Academy, under Dr. Hill. He came here from Colfax, Wash., where his father, J. W. Hamilton, conducted a drug store. He was popular at the Academy, being regarded as especially solid in morality and honesty.

"It seems too much for me to believe," said Dr. Hill last night. "He was one of the finest young men I ever came to know. He came to the Bishop Scott Academy in 1890 and remained three years. I was so impressed with him that I kept in touch with him after he left school and watched his advancement with great interest. I, for one, will reserve judgment until his explanation of the unfortunate difficulty is fully presented."

### FIRES DESTROY MUCH PROPERTY NEAR VANCOUVER

Vancouver, B. C., May 6.—Three hundred and fifty thousand dollars of damage was done by a fire early today at Barnet, which wiped out the saw mill of the North Pacific Lumber Company.

Kamloops, B. C., May 5.—Hundreds of thousands of dollars in property were destroyed and scores of ranchers forced to flee for their lives as the result of a disastrous brush fire that swept the country from Notch Hill as far east as Three Valley, and south from Sicamous as far as Vernon.

Among the losses are two large saw mills, both of which were totally consumed in the wall of flame that swept over the land. The big Carlin mill, located between Tappawed Sliding and Notch Hill, was wiped out, with a loss of \$75,000, as was also the Carrigan mill on Salmon River, valued at \$35,000. Several of the millhands had to flee for their lives.

## WILL IMPEACH FEDERAL JUDGE OF MISSOURI

Washington, May 6.—At the conclusion of a lengthy statement in the house today regarding his resolution of inquiry into the official conduct of Federal Judges McPherson and Phillips of the western district of Missouri, Representative Murphy of that state announced that he would present formal charges of impeachment.

Make no Statement. Kansas City, May 6.—"I have nothing to say at this time and will make no statement until Representative Murphy formally presents his charges of impeachment," said Judge Phillips when shown the Washington dispatch. McPherson also declined to make any statement.
