MANY DELEGATES TO STATE GRANGE
McMinnville, Or., May 13.—Today the Oregon State Grange reached the highest point in attendance, the visitors numbering fully 500. The session was a busy one from morning until midnight, the forenoon being devoted to legislation and memorial services in honor of deceased members of the State Grange during the past year. The afternoon was taken up with reports of standing committees and the evening with degree work.
When the report of the committee on good of the order was read the matter of publishing the Pacific Grange Bulletin jointly by the State Granges of Oregon and Washington provoked considerable discussion. Many were dissatisfied with the pres-

ent arrangement, but it was decided to continue the publication jointly for another year.
Bank Guarantee Favored.
The Oklahoma bank guarantee bill was the subject of a warm debate and the executive committee was authorized to submit the bill to the initiative at the next general election, with some modification applicable to such a law in the State of Oregon.
Three important committees were appointed to make reports at the next session of the following matters:
Conservation of water—C. D. Huffman, H. B. Alderson, W. J. Edwards, Mrs. Minnie McClosky, M. J. Mangie Birtner.
Conservation of forestry—A. T. Shoemaker, J. D. Clutwood, E. L. Clyde, Mrs. Sarah Merchant, Mrs. Jane Armstrong.
Denatured alcohol—C. E. Senec, T. H. Davis, J. Henry.

Free River Demanded.
A memorial will be presented to the Oregon Congressional delegation asking that the Willamette river be made free from all tolls forever. This means the purchase of the canal and locks at Oregon City by the General government.
A resolution was unanimously adopted without a debate opposing a state and calling on subordinate Granges and other organized bodies to assist in retaining the present constitution, subject only to the initiative in making changes.
A resolution providing that laws be passed for maintenance of only one normal school in the state of Oregon was read and referred to a committee. It will come up before the close of the session and will probably be adopted. It provides for adequate state aid, but does not designate any particular locality for such an institution.

Johnson Road Bill Indorsed.
The committee on good roads submitted a report endorsing the Johnson good roads bill as revised by the joint committee of the last legislature. It will be taken up by the Granges and their indorsement will undoubtedly follow.
The committee on assessment and taxation in a voluminous report, made the statement that the farmer pays more than his just share of all taxes because his property is visible, and favored an amendment to the state constitution permitting property to be classified so as to retain uniformity in each class, all public utilities, corporations and privileges to pay their full share. The committee recommended the election of a tax commission and urged a campaign of education in all subordinate Granges.
When the committee on education came in with its report and made

recommendations as to the course to be pursued in our rural schools, there was a general discussion of the subject. State Superintendent of Schools, J. H. Ackerman, made the principal address and outlined what he considered the needs of country in solving the problem now already solved by the schools.
Salem Journal: Spring wheat, which would have been hardly suitable for hay, in the condition it was growing before the rain, and which would not have been high enough stalked to be cut with the reaper, will grow to full harvesting size now, and a fair, if not a bumper crop, is predicted. Half the spring wheat had not sprouted, but it will now come up and grow.
J. C. W. Deckham, former governor of Kentucky, has become editor of a newspaper in Frankfort.

A meeting of the ladies' auxiliary of the Commercial club was held last night, at which time the standing committees were appointed. The executive committee consists of the officers of the auxiliary and two others. The committee is as follows: Mrs. R. McMurry, Mrs. W. W. Calkins, Mrs. E. J. Frasier, Miss Minnie Schwarzschild, Mrs. Lulu Tollman, Mrs. J. W. Kys and Mrs. J. Goldsmith. Mrs. E. D. Yoran was appointed chairman of the calling committee, the other members to be appointed later.
It was announced that the sum of \$600 is in the fountain fund and it is planned to have another day such as the one conducted at the Kood-ee nor a few days ago to raise money

for the fund. This time it will be at the Palace of Sweets on Saturday, May 22. The auxiliary is hoping that the University Senior play may be repeated for the benefit of the fund, and if so, the proceeds ought to be sufficient to complete the \$1,000.
ONE WAS KILLED, MANY INJURED
Memphis, May 15.—R. J. Rawlins, former mayor of Lenox, suburb of this city, was killed and a half dozen injured in the collision of a car and paving machine this morning.
