TO REMOVE DISABILITIES OF ENGLISH ROMAN CATHOLICS

London, May 14.—A comprehensive bill for the removal of Roman Catholic disabilities and providing for an alteration in the accession oath taken by the British sovereign was introduced by William Redmond in the house of commons today. The Roman Catholics never have ceased to inveigh against the "insulting references" to certain beliefs in the monarch's accession declaration as "superstitions." The same opposition that hitherto had defeated any effort to alter the oath again showed up today when a petition signed by 499,000 persons against the removal of Catholic disabilities was handed in just before Mr. Redmond arose.

SWINBURNE OUT AND SEBREE IN

Retiring Rear Admiral Has Reached Age Limit.

San Francisco, May 17.—Rear Admiral W. T. Swinburne, hailed down his flag on the cruiser West Virginia today, having reached the age of retirement, and Rear-Admiral Uriel Sebree, commander of the second division of the fleet, took command of the whole, raising his flag on the cruiser Tennessee, which hereafter will be the flagship.

No unusual ceremonies marked the transfer of commands. The flag of Admiral Sebree received a salute

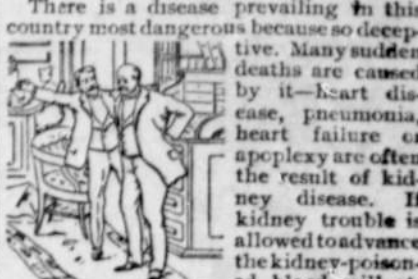

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SUDDEN DEATH OF STANDARD OIL MAGNATE

(Continued from Page One)

Some six or eight years ago, Mr. Rogers was known in the world of finance but comparatively little beyond the domain of dollars. His actual power, to the world at large, was obscured somewhat by the name of Rockefeller. This suited Rogers, who shunned notoriety. He was satisfied to manipulate and grow enormously rich without attracting personal attention to himself. His wealth has been estimated at close to \$4,000,000.

Mr. Rogers was never known as one of the nation's very rich men who went in for any special form of charity or philanthropic work. His sentimental fondness for the town of his birth, however, was evidenced by his lavish expenditure of money for Fair Haven. To his native town he gave more than \$4,000,000 for the erection of municipal buildings, the laying out of streets and parks, to say nothing of his generous gifts to poor and needy residents. He gave to the town the Rogers school, built at a cost of \$100,000, and a high school building which cost \$750,000. A town hall cost another \$200,000. As a monument to his daughter he erected the Millicent Rogers Library, costing \$350,000, and as a memorial to his mother, Mrs. Mary Eldredge Rogers, he built the First Unitarian church and its elegant parsonage, costing \$1,000,000.

Mr. Rogers was twice married. His first wife, by whom he had three daughters and a son, was Abbie T. Gifford of Fair Haven. She died in 1893. On June 4, 1896, Mr. Rogers then 63 years old, married Emelle Augusta Randel, daughter of a diamond merchant in New York. She was then 45, and it was her second venture in the matrimonial way. Her first had been unhappy, and she had been divorced from her first husband, Lucius R. Hart, a metal broker, only a short time when she accepted Mr. Rogers.

Mr. Rogers had a magnificent town house at the corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-eighth street and a country place at Fair Haven, which he had beautified at an expenditure of more than \$1,000,000.

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
