COUNTY JAIL PRISONERS DRAW THE COLOR LINE

Chicago, May 18.—The "strike" of white prisoners in the county jail, because 1788, were compelled to live and exercise with negro prisoners, and which was thought to be broken after four days of solitary confinement of a score or more of prisoners, was renewed this morning when the negroes refused to take their exercise in the same corridors with the whites. The men were again placed in solitary confinement. Later, when food was taken to them, they refused to eat.

FAST TRAIN TO BAY CITY JUNE 1

Portland, May 17.—Orders for the assembling of the equipment for the new 27-hour limited train for the Portland-San Francisco service have gone forth from Chicago. If the equipment required for this solid-vaulted Pullman train, which will be electric lighted throughout, can be gathered together in time, the track service will be inaugurated one week from yesterday, May 23. If delays are encountered, the opening of the new service will be put off for another week. South bound, the new 27 hour train will have a daylight run through Oregon. The train will leave Portland and San Francisco simultaneously, at either 6 or 6:30 p. m., arriving at destination at 9 or 9:30 p. m., the following day.

CAPTAIN HAINS GOES TO PRISON

New York, May 18.—Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., sentenced yesterday on conviction of manslaughter for the killing of Wm. E. Annis, left Queen's county jail today for Sing Sing prison to begin serving his term of from eight to sixteen years.

New York, May 18.—Eugene L. Young, counsel for Hains, said that no application would be made for a certificate of reasonable doubt, but that an appeal in the captain's behalf would be taken to the higher courts in the regular way.

OFFER TO MACADAMIZE EUGENE'S STREETS AT \$1.35 PER SQUARE YARD

Sten Lund, Representing Chicago Contracting Co., Makes Proposition.

An offer to macadamize the streets of Eugene for \$1.35 per square yard was made at an adjourned meeting of the city council last night by Sten Lund, representing the Chicago Contracting Co., one of the largest firms of its kind in the United States. The macadam would be five inches thick in the gutter and eight inches thick in the center of the street. Mr. Lund stated that he would not consider any contract for less than \$100,000, as his plant is a large one and it would not pay to move it here for small contracts. The cost of a street three miles long and twenty feet wide, according to his figures, would be \$47,500. The proposition was taken under consideration.

Other Matters. L. M. Travis, attorney for the aerle of Eagles, and L. N. Roney, addressed the council and asked that the sewer in the alley between Willamette and Oak and Fifth and Sixth streets be lowered so as to drain the basements of the new Roney block and the block that is to be built by the Eagles adjoining. The matter was referred.

A committee, consisting of Garrett, Williams, Gilbert, Roach and Henderson, was appointed to confer with a committee from the Commercial club and a committee from Springfield in regard to improving the road between Eugene and Springfield.

David Thompson was given the privilege of taking the wood he had already cut on the city's new dumping ground and to leave the remainder on the tract.

The city attorney was directed to begin new condemnation proceedings against Oscar Milligan for right-of-way through his land on the McKenzie for the city's proposed electric power plant.

Another meeting of the council will be held this evening.

C. S. Farrow, formerly in the real estate business in Eugene, but who has been in the Alberta country with his family for two or three years, has purchased a steam laundry at Lethbridge. That town is one of the most thriving towns in Alberta, with a population of 7,500, and is situated on the Crow's Nest Pass line of the C. P. R. R., about 450 miles from Spokane.

Chris Hostettler and Herman Wenger left today for the Alberta country, where they have purchased some farming land.

RHODODENDRON FESTIVAL IS NOW CLOSE AT HAND

The annual rhododendron festival to be held in Florence Saturday, May 22, promises to be a brilliant success. A very expensive program is being prepared and arrangements to entertain the largest crowd ever assembled in Florence.

The coronation will be on a barge or boat near the city dock, Hon. E. E. Benedict being selected go crown her majesty. The Queen-elect will be conveyed to coronation in a "dandy" supported by four big husky "dandy wallahs," and preceded by the Grand Marshal of the Day, John L. Furnish, who will have his sword drawn and flourishing it, shout to the multitude to "make way" for the loyal party.

The "dandy" in which she rides will be made of rhododendron wood and flowers and will excel in beauty any now in use in the far east; it would make Lew Wallace's Prince of India "mad as a wet hen" to see it, for it surpasses in grandeur the one in which his adopted daughter Lael was supported.

She will be met at the landing by Hon. E. E. Benedict who will escort her and the Maids of Honor to the most glorious palace of rhododendrons ever conceived.

After the coronation T. A. Yast, Lord Mayor of Florence, will deliver an address of welcome to Her Majesty, Queen Rhododendron, maids of honor and subjects, kneeling at her feet, will turn over to her two keys made of rhododendron; one the key to the city and the other the key to the hearts of her subjects.

Following this will be the naval parade on Sluslaw bay amid music from Florence band and firing of salutes from Glenada side.

On return to the city wharf the Queen will be escorted in her "dandy" to her permanent palace, where she will listen to an address on the Sluslaw Bar Improvement Issue delivered by the Hon. L. E. Bay of Eugene, then will be dined at Bay View hotel at 12 o'clock.

In the afternoon, beginning at 2, the school exercises and address by H. W. Thompson of Eugene, followed by the boat races and athletic sports. In the evening a dance will be given in honor of Queen Rhododendron and her Maids of Honor. Music furnished by Gardiner orchestra, with piano accompaniment. The Queen will lead the grand march.—Florence West.

FLOUR ADVANCES IN ALL CITIES OF NORTHWEST

Portland, Or., May 16.—Advances in food prices of general interest to consumers are being made in the flour and butter markets. Yesterday morning there was an effective advance of 20 cents a barrel in all grades of domestic flour. This brings the wholesale price of patent flour up to \$6.25 a barrel, the highest price at which flour has been quoted in the local market for many years.

The advance is due not only to high price of wheat, but to the fact that stocks of flour in the northwest have run down to the danger point. The smaller mills have nearly all exhausted their surplus of flour and the larger mill are said to have barely enough to carry them through to the time when new-crop wheat will be available. A similar advance of 20 cents a barrel occurred in the Seattle market Friday. In the East flour prices are even higher than on the Pacific Coast.

COTTAGE GROVE DISTRICT FAIR

Cottage Grove, May 17.—The Cottage Grove District Fair Association has not been meeting with any regularity, but this is no sign of a lapse of interest in the enterprise. The Nesmith matters have been engrossing largely upon the time of the committee and consequently the fair matters have been postponed. A meeting will take place in a short time at which the general outline of the fall festival will be arranged, the prize lists made up. An effort will be made to enlarge upon the fair of last year in every department. Undoubtedly some form of amusement will be arranged about the ground and entertainment will be a feature of the event. A week will be used instead of three days as was the time limit last year. A little earlier start and with the present buildings to commence with and the present prospect, the District Fair of 1909 will be one of the best ever.

CHURCH FOR MEN ONLY; CAN SMOKE

Atlantic City, N. J., May 17.—A church for men, and to have no women members of the congregation, is projected by supporters of Rev. Sidney Goodman, pastor of the fashionable Church of the Ascension. Recently the minister came in for severe criticism because he allowed his hearers to smoke during the Sunday evening service. Dr. Goodman declared that to make men attend church inducements should be held out to them. He maintained that smoking aided his listeners to reflect and cogitate upon the substance of his sermons.

The men's church will have club-rooms, a stage for vaudeville and a moving picture outfit. The building will be erected after the pastor's return from Europe in the fall.

NORTHERN PACIFIC ROBBERS EFFECT ESCAPE FROM POSSE
