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SEVERE QUAKE CAUSES HUNDREDE DEATHS IN FRANCE

Marseilles, June 12.—The earthquake last night was the most severe in the departments of Herault and Bocheche du Rhone. Fifteen are dead at Lambesc, ten at St. Cannat and twenty at Rognes. It is believed the total death will reach 100. The temperature has fallen sharply throughout the region.

FRENCH TOWNS DAMAGED BY SEVERE QUAKE

A large proportion of the houses were damaged and those standing are cracked and threaten to fall at any minute.
