PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.
Portland, Ore., June 17.—First arrivals of 1909 peel of chittim for export are shown in the local market. A few small lots of the new peel have already been sold around 5c a pound and the market is quite good at that figure. Old bark is quoted around 5 1-2c a pound, although it is reported that a fraction advance over this figure has recently been paid.

According to those dealers in closest touch with the chittim bark situation, the peel in Oregon and Washington this year will be somewhat heavier than expected, although the volume will not reach the proportions of recent seasons. The

price offering for chittim is not quite as satisfactory as some had predicted a short time ago and this will perhaps cut down the operations somewhat.

East Inquiring for Bark.
While no business of importance is noted in the chittim bark situation at this time, some inquiries regarding the probable size of the peel and prospective prices are being received by local people from eastern buyers. First purchases of bark are of a speculative nature only; no orders received thus far, so far as known.

Old bark is held in firm hands and holders are disposed to ask more for supplies than the eastern manufacturers are willing to give.

Old Potatoes Hard to Move.
With new potatoes coming in freely and prices gradually weakening, there is next to nothing doing in the old spud trade, and the season may be considered at an end. For the small quantities that come in from the country from time to time dealers are generally paying the growers from \$1 to \$1.25 a hundred, but there is no demand of consequence for them even at these figures. New potatoes are now selling at 3 to 4 cents a pound.

1908 Hops at 13-12 Cents.
The latest development reported in the hop market is the closing this week of a contract in the State of Washington for the delivery of 10,000 pounds of the coming crop at 13-12 cents a pound. This is the highest price thus far paid for the 1909 crop in the northwest. Higher prices are said to have been offered in Oregon, but the growers here are not disposed to sell their coming crops at a price.

Green Hops Condon Wool.
Charles H. Green, representing Kosland & Co., of Boston, was in Condon last week, according to the Condon Globe, and bought several clips of wool, among them those of R. N. Donnelly, C. L. Prindle and George Markley.

The prices ranged from 20 cents up. The Kerr-Gifford warehouse is baling the wool preparatory to shipping. Mr. Green left bids with the Condon National Bank on several clips of wool which are only partly delivered.

Cheese Prices Stiffen.
Prices in the cheese market show a stiffening tone for better quality and local holders of the Tillamook product report that they are unable to fill all the orders. While some grades of cheese are being cut 1/4c a pound, the better known brands are firmer than ever and no sales are reported under 16c in a wholesale way. Puget Sound continues to send in orders but they cannot be filled in their entirety.

Some Mohair is Moving.
Several fair sized sales of mohair are reported in the Portland market during the past 48 hours, around 23 1/2c a pound. Present arrivals are from Southern Oregon coast points, where the shearing is always later than in the Willamette Valley.

Fine Wool Holding Steady.
For fine wool there is still a most excellent demand in the Portland market and as high as 24 1/2c is still being offered for extra select grade. For ordinary quality the market is easy and weak, with values falling in the Willamette valley at from 22c to 23c a pound.

Portland Livestock Market.
Portland Union Stockyards, June 16.—The strength of the cattle market at the present time is due to the fear of killers that they will not be in a position to dictate prices to shippers after the present run from California is concluded.

Select quality steers and cows were never in better demand than they are today. The fact that considerable strength is shown in the local market during the California grass season, shows a really wonderful condition and indicates that the market has already been reached.

While the showing of cattle is close to the very bottom of the cat-yards today was only fair; the railroad from California being stopped enroute to water and feed and will not be in before tomorrow morning; the unexpected liberal run has not demoralized prices here at all.

All Crying for Hogs.
For hogs the trade never cried so loudly as it is doing today, and considering what real poor stuff is being brought to the yards, top quality should by all means be breaking some records. With hogs in the East around the \$8 mark, to stuff from local places should bring \$9 in comparison, but owing to the lack of select quality in the yards recently the trade is unable to ascertain just what the top price would be.

Sheep market is feeling some of the strength noted in other lines, and during the past 24 hours one transaction was reported at something better than \$5.20 for 235 head of lambs, that averaged about 17 pounds. Wethers are selling up to \$4 and the demand is better than several days ago when transactions were reported at \$3.50.

Market for calves is in fine shape and top stuff is readily picked up by killers as high as \$2.25.
