CAMPBELL-FELLMAN MAN TO OCCUPY SANFORD BLOCK

The Campbell-Fellman Co., Eugene's big housefurnishers, have completed negotiations with James Sanford and have taken a lease of the new brick building now being built across the street from The Guard office. The new structure is being built, planned and arranged especially for the house-furnishing business, and when completed it will be the finest home of a furniture house on the Pacific coast outside of the large cities. It will be much larger than many of the big furniture stores in Portland.

The size of the new structure will be 81,100 feet, with a steam heating plant on the outside of the building and a large shipping porch in the rear. There will be four floors, a cement floor in the basement, which will be seven feet high, the ground floor, a large spacious balcony and the top floor. This will give a total of nearly 35,000 square feet of floor space, and in height the building will be several feet higher than the two-story buildings adjoining it. In arrangement the building will be perfect in every detail for the furniture business, not a point being overlooked.

The elevation of the building shows it to be one of the finest structures ever put up in Eugene. The front will be literally a mass of plate glass show windows, plate glass being used also in the upper story. On the alley and in the rear of the building glass will be used above and below the balcony, and this with the second story gives it the appearance of a three-story building. In every way the building will be one of the best ever put up in Eugene for store purposes. The pressed brick is brought from the East and is light and uniform in color and cost nearly 10 cents a brick.

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TRAIN CREW'S COURAGE AVERTS OIL EXPLOSION

A burning bridge on a curve, six miles from Springfield and three miles from Hayden's bridge, yesterday afternoon would have caused a serious accident had not the crew of the Springfield switch engine, sent from Springfield with section hands, shown unusual coolness. The switch engine, tender or tank car first, sped around the curve on to the burning bridge before the engineer could stop. As the tender struck the structure the timbers sank several feet. Fortunately the momentum of the engine stopped, and the locomotive did not plunge off the track.

The tender, filled with fuel oil, was over the flames that were burning the trestlework. At this critical moment the section hands deserted and fled for fear of an oil explosion. The train crew, however, began to fight the fire beneath the tank car with water from the engine, and conquering them, averting an explosion which might have cost lives and would have destroyed the engine and much trackage.

An "extra" from Albany pulled the switch locomotive back on the track. The bridge was repaired this afternoon. The damage to the company is about \$500. Children playing near the bridge set the grass afire, and the flames spread to the bridge before any older person discovered the fire.

FARMER ARRESTED FOR
SELLING PRUNE BRANDY
HE MANUFACTURED

Charles Knoop, a farmer residing near the city, was indicted by the grand jury last evening, on the charge of violating the local option law. He was arraigned in the circuit court this forenoon and time for entering plea was set for tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. It is alleged that Knoop manufactured prune brandy on his farm and sold it to his neighbors and others who came along to buy it.

One Year in Pen.
Charles Gardner, who has been in the county jail here for some time past awaiting trial for stealing a suit of clothes from the Imperial restaurant, yesterday decided to enter a plea of guilty and accordingly late in the afternoon was taken in court and the plea entered. He waived time for sentence and Judge Harris gave him one year in the state prison at Salem.

Gave Liquor to Minor.
Edwin R. Hasley, a drummer from Seattle, who was arrested a few days ago on the charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was indicted by grand jury this afternoon, on the charge of giving liquor to a minor, but the other charge against him and a similar charge against Jesse E. Simpson were dismissed. Hasley pleaded guilty and was fined \$150.
