The traveling public in general is dissatisfied with the new train schedule which was into effect today. There was an error in the time card in last night's Guard. No. 14 is given as coming in at 5:30 p. m., when it should have read 5:20 p. m. No passengers will be taken on the new train which passes through here going north at 5:21 p. m. This cuts out an evening train for Portland and there are no trains on which passengers can go to Portland between 12:22 at noon and 2:43 o'clock the next morning, which is as bad as before. No. 14 was put on several years ago. The Cottage Grove local passes through going north at the unseasonable hour of 4:59 in the morning, but 14 comes through an hour later. This helps some, but it is half an hour earlier that the Cottage Grove local used to be, and that was early enough. There seems to be little kick on the time of the arrival of the south bound trains.

ROAD COMING TOWARD EUGENE

(Ralph Watson, Special Correspondent of the Portland Journal.)

What of Klamath Falls, and of the Klamath Falls country? Not many days ago the people of that little city, down in the southwestern part of the state heard for the first time the whistle of a locomotive, a sound for which they have been listening for many years. On Monday last, in honor of that whistle, and in celebration of what the people believe it means, or will mean to them and their city, 8,000 people joined in the celebration of "Railroad Day."

Business men from Portland on the north, to San Francisco on the south, journeyed in large numbers to attend the exercises in honor of the coming of the railroad. People from the interior country who in some instances saw a railroad train for the first time in their lives, came long distances to pay tribute to the coming of the long sought boon. Speeches were made, parades were carried out, entertainment on a lavish scale was prepared and extended by the people of Klamath Falls to make the turning point in the history and development of the city and the country noteworthy.

First Milestone.
This railroad, the California & Northwestern, reaching from the base of Mount Shasta at Weed to Klamath Falls, is only the first milestone in the development and the future progress of the country. Reaching out through a country, which, where it runs, is as level as a floor, the California & Northwestern is constructed of steel as heavy as the main line of the Southern Pacific or the O. R. & N. Its roadbed is as good or better than that of the Southern Pacific.

Mr. Harriman is pushing this line on past Klamath Falls, the city, to upper Klamath Lake. Ostensibly this is being done to bring down the much sought pine timber of the upper lake region. But the rails on the extension are just as heavy, the roadbed is just as good, the culverts are of concrete and of steel, which is pretty thorough building for a logging road.

May Reach Eugene.
It is admitted by Harriman people that the California Northwestern is to push on past Klamath Falls, past the Walker basin country, across the mountains to a junction with the Springfield-Natron branch of the Southern Pacific near Eugene. This line would have not more than a 2 per cent grade from Weed to Eugene and would cut out the present heavy 4 per cent climb on either side of the Oregon-California line. Its construction means that the Klamath Falls country will be on the main line of the through Portland-San Francisco service.

Surveyors again, are now working out a line from Klamath Falls, through Lakeview to Altruas, Cal., and on from there over the present Nevada, California and Oregon route to Reno, and a junction with the main Ogden line of the Central Pacific and Union Pacific system.

It is being asked why this line should be constructed at this time, or in the near future, and the answer is that Harriman desires a short cut to the east for the great loads of pine lumber now being clamored for by the eastern market.
