### BROWN FAVORS TAIT'S INCOME TAX

Washington, June 17.—"That Congress shall have the power to lay and collect taxes upon incomes with-out apportionment among the several states according to their population," is the subject of an amendment to the Constitution proposed in a resolution submitted to the Senate today by Senator Brown. The resolution provides for submission of the question to the legislatures of the different states for their approval, as suggested by the President. It will be referred to the committee on finance.

### HAYWARD SAYS DAN KELLY'S CAREER ENDED

(Guard Special Service.) Seattle, June 22.—It is feared that Dan Kelly's meteoric sports career is ended. Such is the opinion of Bill Hayward, the famous University of Oregon trainer, who will handle the athletes for the U. S. A. U. meet in the stadium of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition this summer. Kelly is laid up with a badly sprained ankle and it is feared that he will lose the wonderful spring which made him the greatest broad jumper in America and enabled him to spring over the hundred yard course in Spokane two years ago in the world's record time of 9.35 seconds.

The famous red-haired sprinter intended to enter the A. A. U. meet at the exposition this summer and had been running over the Baker City roads to get into shape. He was determined to show the sporting critics that he could duplicate on a western field his performance of two years ago. The news of Kelly's injury comes as a blow to the sporting fraternity of the Northwest. The speedy western boy, after winning his brilliant race in Spokane, went east to conquer but never succeeded in rounding into shape. In the broad jump he still retained some of his old time form and made the Olympic team which represented America in London. He won his points there, taking second in the jump.

### ARNST RETAINS CHAMPIONSHIP OF WORLD'S SCULLERS

Wellington, N. Z., June 22.—R. Arnst, the New Zealand rower, by defeating W. Webb today retains the sculling championship of the world. He covered the course of 3¼ miles in 18 minutes, 14½ seconds, and crossed the line 3¼ lengths in advance of Webb.

### LONNIE HAM CASE HAS BEEN DISMISSED

The reason given by the district attorney in his motion for dismissal was that the girl in the case now has a good home with a family who are opposed to further prosecution on account of the girl's health and probable effect of the strain of the trial and on account of the humiliation and notoriety another trial would bring upon the girl.

### NOT CHARITY BUT WORK IS LONDON SLOGAN

London, June 22.—"To hell with charity—we want work," the slogan emblazoned on banners carried in the parade of the unemployed which have been so frequent of late, today found a response in the opening of the first government labor exchange, or free employment bureau. Similar bureaus will be established in all the industrial centers of Great Britain and it is hoped that they will go far toward solving the critical problem of what to do with the millions of unemployed British workmen.

The bureau opened today is looked upon as an experiment, but the plan is not an original one, as similar exchanges are already in operation in Germany and have been highly successful. According to statistics just issued by the National Union of German Labor Exchanges, there were on January 1, 1909, 389 such institutions in Germany, of which 246 were in Prussia and the rest spread over the other states of the empire.

During the last statistical year work was found for 932,956 persons, of whom 667,441 were men and 265,515 women. The great central exchange in Berlin secured employment for over 100,000 people. The exchanges at Munich and Stuttgart placed between 60,000 and 80,000, and Dresden and Dusseldorf between 40,000 and 60,000.

### DESCHUTES LINE NOW ASSURED

Contracts for Construction May be Let in Thirty Days.

Portland, Or., June 20.—Barring unexpected delays in securing a continuous right of way, bids for the construction of the Deschutes line into Central Oregon will be asked by Harriman within thirty days. The only obstacle that prevents the immediate construction of the Central Oregon road is the adjustment of right of way questions with power companies operating on the Deschutes river. The railroad company already has secured rights of way to 70 per cent of the 120 miles to be traversed by the proposed road. An early and satisfactory adjustment of pending right of way problems covering the remainder of the distance is believed more than probable without

resorting to condemnation proceedings in the courts.

This was the information announced yesterday by J. P. O'Brien, vice-president and general manager of the Harriman lines in this territory on his return from Chicago and New York, where, accompanied by W. W. Cotton, general counsel for the same railroad system, he had been in conference with the company's head officials. Incidentally, during his sojourn in the east, Mr. O'Brien personally visited Washington and assisted to expedite the approval by Secretary Ballinger of the maps of survey for the road, submitted by the engineering department of the Harriman offices.

### FLASH STORM SIGNALS AROUND WHOLE WORLD

London, June 22.—An international weather bureau which will use the wireless telegraph to flash around the world warnings of approaching storms and disturbances of the elements, is projected by the distinguished weather men of all countries gathered in London today at the initial session of the International conference of Meteorologists.

According to the plans for this world-wide weather forecasting movement, all vessels of all nations will be equipped with uniform storm signals. It is believed that this would go far toward preventing disasters at sea.

The United States is represented at the conference, opened today by Professor Willis L. Moore, chief of the United States Weather Bureau. It is stated that America will take a prominent part in the projected international bureau.

A concerted movement will be inaugurated to induce the principal governments to adopt a uniform system of wireless telegraphy marine weather reports, and to reach an agreement so that all nations shall display a uniform marine storm signal. If such an international agreement can be effected, it is believed that it will be a great factor in saving life and property on sea and land, and at the same time be highly important in the making of weather predictions.

"One of the principal problems to be taken up by the conference," said Professor Moore, "is the question of international agreement as to the taking of wireless marine weather reports. The scheme is to secure the adoption by all of the leading nations of a uniform method of taking and transmitting wireless meteorological observations so that each observation, no matter by what nation taken, will be comparable with the observations taken by any other nation. There is no uniform system of receiving and transmitting marine wireless weather reports and exactly the same things are not observed."
