

TAFT ADDS INTEREST TO YALE'S COMMENCEMENT DAY

New Haven, Conn., June 30.—Commencement Day at Yale was especially honored by the presence of President Taft of '78, who following the ceremony of the robes and walked in procession of the several hundreds of officers of the University and candidates for degrees.

Today's ceremonies commenced with the time-honored procession of officers, graduates, candidates for degrees and invited guests from the college campus to Woodsey Hall, where the graduating exercises were held with the customary pomp and circumstance. Alumni meetings and addresses occupied the afternoon, and this evening President Taft will give a reception to the graduates in Memorial Hall.

Statistics of the graduating academic class show that out of 321 men, 119 expect to go into some form of business, and 65 into law. Prof. W. L. Phelps is the favorite professor. Dr. Lyman Abbott the favorite college preacher, elementary economics is chosen as the most valuable course of study. Princeton is returned as the best outside University with Harvard next; freshman year considered the hardest, and senior year the easiest. The average age in the class is twenty-two years, nine months and thirteen days. Average experience have been in

ENTIRE STATE OF TENNESSEE WILL BE DRY

Radical Prohibition Law Goes Into Effect at Midnight

Nashville, Tenn., June 30.—The statute extending the provisions of the "four mile" law to the entire state becomes effective at midnight. Under the provisions of this law it will be unlawful to sell or tipple liquors, wines, ales, or beers as a beverage in Tennessee. The bill to prohibit the manufacture of liquors does not become effective until January 1, 1910, and counsel has been retained by the interests affected to test the prohibition measure.

Nashville is already well supplied with "clubs," but to make sure of having enough to accommodate all comers a number of new clubs have been organized, so when the open saloon obeys the command of the law at 12 o'clock tonight, just twenty-one "social clubs" will throw open their doors here and there and deal out to the members portions of liquor, beer, etc., each is supposed to have purchased and left in the locker there. TEN THOUSAND STEEL WORKERS WILL STRIKE TONIGHT AGAINST SWEEPING OPEN SHOP ORDER

Pittsburg, June 30.—At midnight tonight more than ten thousand skilled workers who are members of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Plate Workers and employed by the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company throughout Pennsylvania, Ohio, Virginia and Indiana, will quit work. At that hour the "open shop" order of the company becomes effective.

The Amalgamated Association is expected to put up a stern fight against the order, but the trust is said to be as firm on its side.

PREPARING TO RUSH RAILROAD FROM KLAMATH

Largest Contractors on the Coast Are Figuring on Natron Line Bids

Klamath Falls, Or., June 30.—The California Northeastern railroad will be constructed through to Natron at once, and the contract for the work will be let on or before July 10th. Everything possible will be done to rush the work to completion, and it is within the realm of probability that within the next two years through trains from San Francisco to Portland will be passing through this city. When the nature of the work to be done is taken into consideration it means that orders must have been issued to spare no expense to rush the completion of the line, for in crossing the mountains north of Odell there will be encountered some of the heaviest work to be found on any road in the West. But mountains will have to give way to bring the grade down to the required one per cent, and this work is to be rushed to completion with the least possible delay.

During the past few weeks some of the biggest railroad contractors in the West have been investigating conditions along the line with a view of bidding on the work. This morning Messrs. Palmer & McBride, of San Francisco, recognized as being among the giants in railroad construction went up to Klamath Agency and the northern part of the county. They were accompanied by Construction Agent Hoy and Right-of-Way Agent W. S. Worden. Nothing definite as to the purpose of their trip could be ascertained, but the real object is to find out what has to be contended with in the construction work on which they are pointed to bid. It is practically certain that they will get the contract for the twenty-five miles extension.

WILLIAM HERVE DYING AT SALEM

Salem, Or., June 29.—William Herve, who shot and killed Henry Sullivan in a pistol duel over a woman at Gates, and who was himself seriously wounded, is a very sick man at his cell in the County Jail, and the authorities fear he may die at any time. His trial is set for next week.

WILL ERECT FRAME BUILDINGS FOR CROWDS
Citizens of Kalispell, Mont., Are Ready for Land Seekers Who Are Coming

Kalispell, Mont., June 30.—In charge of a joint committee of the chamber of commerce and city council, operations were commenced this morning on the construction of three temporary frame buildings, which will be used for the housing of a portion of the 30,000 persons expected to visit this point during the coming registration for Flathead reservation lands. The buildings are designed to lodge some 300 to 400 each. Others will be erected if the three prove inadequate, and a nominal rate will be charged for lodging, for the purpose of reimbursing the treasury.

UNCLE SAM CALLS FOR HIS MONEY

Washington, June 29.—A call on National depository banks for a return to the treasury of Government funds aggregating approximately \$25,000,000, was made today by Secretary MacVeagh. Of this amount \$9,000,000 has been called for July 15, and \$16,000,000 for August 15. This call will practically wipe out all of the deposits of Government

FORD CAR NO. 2 WINS FIRST PRIZE

Seattle, June 29.—The protest of the Shawmut car against the award of the first prize in the New York to Seattle automobile race, to Ford Car No. 2 was disallowed by Robert Guggenheim, the referee, today. Mr. Guggenheim found that the evidence did not sustain any of the charges that the Ford car had violated the rules. So the trophy cup and \$2,000 go to Ford Car No. 2 and the second prize of \$1,500 to the Shawmut car which came in second.

PRESIDENT ELIOT IS MISSED FROM HARVARD EXERCISES

Cambridge, Mass., June 30.—Half a thousand members of the class of 1909 received the sheepskin rewards for scholastic triumphs at today's exercises marking the 273d commencement of Harvard University. Hundreds of alumni and other distinguished visitors participated in the program, which was one of the most interesting in the history of the nation's oldest educational institution. This is the first time in forty years that Dr. Charles W. Eliot, the retired president, has not presided on commencement day.

As in former years the alumni exercises were in charge of the class celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of its graduation, the class of 1884, with Walter Cabot Baylies as chief marshal. This class originally numbered 243, and 196 were graduated in June, 1884. There have been 32 deaths. Harvard men received degrees subsequent to the class graduation, and there are 24 temporary and associate members, making the total membership at present 205.

Harvard Yard was closed for the day to all except those particularly interested in the proceedings, but hundreds of people gathered at the different memorial gates to watch the gathering of the classes and notables. Seniors and other graduates assembled shortly after 9 o'clock, and an hour later the procession started for the theatre. The building was filled when President Lowell entered at the head of the procession. As soon as the company was seated, the formal presentation of commencement parts began.

BRANDENBERG MUST FACE TRIAL FOR KIDNAPPING

New York, June 29.—Although Broughton Brandenberg was acquitted here today on the charge of grand larceny in connection with the sale of an alleged spurious letter of Grover Cleveland's to the New York Times, he had only a few minutes of freedom. Before leaving the courtroom he was rearrested and will be taken to St. Louis next week for trial on a charge of kidnapping his stepson, James Shepard Cabanne III. The maximum penalty for kidnapping in Missouri is life imprisonment. The author was taken back to the toms in default of \$5000 bail to await the arrival of the Missouri officers.
