

EARLY FIRE DESTROYS A TAILOR SHOP

(From Thursday's Daily Guard).

This morning about 6:30 o'clock fire was discovered in the small residence owned by Dr. G. W. Biddle and occupied by George McLeod, the tailor, and J. J. Hess, presser and cleaner, across the alley from Otto's grill on East Seventh street, and before an alarm could be turned in the whole building was enveloped in flames.

The firemen responded soon after the alarm was given and a few minutes afterward had two streams playing on the burning building, one from the hydrant at the corner of East Seventh and Oak streets and the other at Seventh and Willamette. A. G. Bray acted as engine driver. He made a quick run. The fire had gained such headway by the explosion of a quantity of gasoline that it was not possible to save any of the contents and the building is a total ruin inside and will have to be torn down.

McLeod, the tailor, lost in goods, shop and household fixtures and personal effects about \$1800, and was insured for \$1000 in the German-American and Phoenix companies. J. J. Wolcott, local agent. The loss to the building is about \$1000 with \$500 insurance.

It is not definitely known how the fire started, but it is presumed that it was from the gasoline stove that was used to heat water for pressing purposes. The flames were first discovered by McLeod, who was in the back yard. J. J. Hess, who conducted the pressing and cleaning department of the shop, was in the kitchen at the time and when he looked toward the front part of the house the flames were pouring out of the front rooms toward the rear. A minute or two after the fire was discovered a gallon bottle of gasoline in the front room exploded with a loud report and of course the spreading of the gasoline about the room caused the flames to increase in fury.

Besides his tailor shop fixtures and household goods, McLeod lost six goods suits of clothes of his own besides about \$500 worth of stock and 18 or 20 suits finished or partly finished for his customers. Hess' loss was about \$200. He carried no insurance on his belongings. Mrs. McLeod and little son were at Albany, where they have been visiting for several days.

CORONER'S JURY CHARGES EASTMAN WITH MURDER

St. Michaels, Md., June 28.—With the compromise verdict of the coroner's jury that Robert E. Eastman either killed, or was accessory to the murder of Edith May Woodfill, and the declaration of United States Attorney Taylor that he was through with the case, the strange dual tragedy became a closed incident today.

Four of the twelve jurors refused to sign the verdict, and the words "accessory to the crime" were added to the draft, which, while approved by the majority, bluntly accused Eastman of the murder. The four dissenting jurors merely wished to protest, they said, against the manner in which the inquiry was conducted, declaring that much available evidence was not adduced.

PITTSBURG CARS RUN REGULARLY AFTER AGREEMENT

Pittsburg, June 29.—Following the settlement of the street car strike the cars are running in every division today.

An agreement, allowing discharged men proper hearing before superintendents and giving the assurance of the company that the secretary will shorten "swing runs" 50 per cent, was drawn up and signed. There will be no ratification meeting of the men.

If it is granted, besides this she wants \$15 a month alimony to provide for the child.

In addition to the acts of infidelity mentioned, Mrs. Todd alleges that her husband at times would remain away from home for several days at a time, leaving her no money or food, knowing that she was in delicate health and could not work to provide herself with things to eat.

GEORGE ROBBINS IS CHARGED WITH WOMAN'S MURDER

Portland, June 28.—Arrested on a street corner here late yesterday on a warrant accusing him of murder, George Robbins, whose father's housekeeper, Mrs. Emaline Casto, was killed late Saturday afternoon in the Robbins' home near Hood River, Or., is today a prisoner in the latter town.

Constable Gagnier, of Hood River, and Deputy Sheriff Morse, who traced young Robbins, returned with him on the late train last night, so as to avoid any demonstration at the depot when he arrived. The prisoner refuses to answer questions, referring to counsel a lawyer first. That the murder of Mrs. Casto was premeditated is now the belief of the Hood River county officials. Robbery was the motive.

The woman was killed by a large stone, with which the murderer crushed her skull. Mrs. Casto was working about the house, when William Robbins, her employer, left for town. Upon his return he found his housekeeper dead upon his bed. The fiend had taken from his victim \$50 in cash and a check for \$75.

The genuineness of Cleveland's signature was not material in the case, the only question the jury being allowed to consider was whether or not Brandenburg stole \$500, the price said to have been paid for the article.

One of the present party is a man who has had many years of experience in the mines, and he uses a process of his own to separate the gold from other minerals. The party is said to be having good success and are finding the work quite profitable.—Florence West.
