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## SENATOR NEWLANDS DISLIKES BILL BUT WILL VOTE FOR IT

Washington, July 7.—Speaking of the evolution of the tariff schedule today Senator Newlands said:

No material changes can now be made in the bill, and the only question before us is whether we may not by some provision, plant the seed of a rational tariff system under which excessive tariff duties may be gradually reduced and the tariff taken out of politics. The tariff is not a piece of original legislation but a measure intended to correct the error of an existing law. It is difficult for the president to accomplish what he desires by a veto unless he wishes to record his condemnation of the party's breach of faith, and the only alternative will be to accept the bill and press on later for the ameliorative legislation.

Newlands spoke on the tariff affecting the Philippine products and spoke in favor of "shaping the government of those islands so as to prepare the Filipinos for self-government and ultimately yield the islands to the government of their people."

done is to ameliorate its effects as much as possible.

"I would suggest that we put into law the recent declaration of the senator from New York upon this floor that we do not contemplate incorporating those islands as a part of the United States, or holding perpetual dominion over them; but we hold them in trust for their own people, and that our purpose is so to shape the government of those islands as to prepare the Filipinos for self-government and ultimately to yield the islands to the government of their people."

## SIX INCHES OF RAIN FALL IN KANSAS DURING LAST NIGHT CAUSING FLOODS

Topeka, Kas., July 7.—Six inches of rain fell in this district last night, the heaviest on record. Many houses in the southern and eastern sections of the city are flooded. Railroad traffic is somewhat delayed.

## SEVERAL ARE DROWNED

Chillicothe, July 7.—Floods on both forks of the Grand river are believed to have drowned six section hands and much stock has also been drowned. Many people have been driven from their homes, the flood in Western Livingston county being far worse than the one last month.

Kansas City July 7.—Patterson, Mo., a town of 1500 inhabitants, 50 miles north of here, is ten feet under water. Hundreds of people spent the night perched on the roofs of their houses. Fifty rowboats are engaged today in removing the marooned to places of safety. The rains continue

and the flood waters are still rising. Aided by a two-inch rainfall and rising rivers above, the Missouri and Kaw rivers showed here today raises of over a foot in the past 24 hours. It is predicted that a further rise will bring flood conditions tomorrow. Already several small towns are under water.

## ENDEAVORERS THROUGH ST PAUL FOR CONVENTION

Over Ten Thousand Delegates Have Gathered for Meeting

St. Paul, July 7.—With the city thronged by upwards of 10,000 delegates and visitors, representing 71,000 societies and a total membership of 3,500,000, the twenty-fourth International Christian Endeavor Convention was opened this afternoon with a meeting of the trustees. The first general sessions tonight will be addressed by Governor Johnson, while Secretary Shaw and Treasurer Lathrop will read reports showing the great advance in the movement last year, and President Francis E. Clark will make his annual address. William Jennings Bryan is among the many distinguished laymen who will speak before the convention. All of the general sessions of the coming week will be held in the magnificent Auditorium, which seats 10,000 persons.

A novel feature of the convention will be a conference of Esperantists, at which delegates from all over the world will deliver addresses in the new universal language. A special tuberculosis exhibit is shown at the convention, and marks the beginning of the Christian Endeavor Society's participation in the world-wide warfare against the white plague. A chorus of a thousand voices will sing at all the sessions. Several cities are contesting for the honor of entertaining the 1911 convention. Kansas City has a large following among the delegates from the Southwestern and Central States, while nearly all of the Southern states have endorsed Dallas.
