

EIGHT HUNDRED AND FORTY SEVEN AMENDMENTS MADE BY SENATE TARIFF EXPERTS

Washington, July 9.—Bearing the scars of eight hundred and forty-seven amendments, placed there by the senate, the Payne tariff bill found its way back to the house in exactly three months to a day from the time it was put through that body. Its reception was hailed with mingled feelings of joy and disappointment by members on both sides, who in response to a summons from their respective leaders turned out in great force.

Immediately after the receipt of the bill a recess was taken. In the debate in the house during the afternoon Representative Mann, of Illinois, declared he would vote against the bill on the conference report if the senate provision on wood pulp and print paper would be retained. He was applauded on both sides.

AGREES TO CONFERENCE

The house this afternoon agreed to the conference on the tariff bill asked by the senate, 178 to 151, and Speaker Cannon appointed the following members of the house committee on ways and means to be the house conferees:

Payne, of New York; Dalzell, of Pennsylvania; McCall, of Massachusetts; Boutell, of Illinois; Calderhead, of Kansas; Fordney, of Michigan; Clark, of Missouri; Underwood, of Alabama, and Griggs, of Georgia.

BISHOP MOORE AGAINST WOMEN TEACHING CHINESE

"Let the work be undone forever, rather than let women attempt to do it."

RAILROAD REPORT PLEASES LOWELLITES

William Kelsay has moved to Ira Hyland's place for the summer and is helping Wilbur Hyland care for his crop.

There seems to be considerable excitement about the North Fork gold mines, as a number of men claiming to be miners are daily wending their way on a prospecting expedition, and there are several miners there now prospecting. There seems to be gold dust all around the prospecting district, but there has not been any definite ledge of consequence struck yet. They all claim it is near, as the prospectors show in some places placer dirt runs as high as \$18 to the ton.

ATTACK ON ROUGH ATHLETICS BY EDUCATORS

Superintendent of Wyoming Schools Says They Dis-able Youth

Denver, July 9.—Football, Marathon running and such sports as tend to disable the American youth received a rough jolt in the department of physical education in the National Educational Association today. Ira Fee, superintendent of schools in Wyoming, made the principal attack. In an address on "Rough Sports" he admitted that there was an element of virtue in football, but in the end that it is far too rough.

"Football in the secondary schools is played by boys from 15 to 19 years of age—boys who have not yet attained full age and development," said President Fee. "The game in itself is exciting and abounds in opportunities for good team work. In many ways a great mental acumen can be developed by the training that is given the boys in the game. But I believe that the benefit derived is more than counterbalanced by the risk of physical injury and this is the almost unanimous verdict of physicians with whom I have talked concerning this branch of athletics."

"The long-distance runs I unqualifiedly condemn for boys of high school age. The long and grueling contest is a painful tax on the heart and lungs, and cases have several times come under my personal observation where boys competing in the distance runs have as a result become incurably affected with heart trouble."

"The time has come when the glory of an athletic battlefield is much more in evidence than the intellectual and moral achievement in the classroom," said William I. Stocum, president of Colorado College, Colorado Springs, Col., in his address today before the department of physical education of the National Educational Association.

"There are at present one or two things which are seriously affecting those colleges and universities the influence of which is also felt very directly in our secondary schools," the speaker declared. "This is the outcome very largely of the intense competitive spirit which has entered into the athletic sports which are carried on among American students. This competition has become so fierce of physical education in preparing athletes for contests rather than the development of thorough intellectual scientific physical culture for the larger number of young men and women."

"The great danger of the game of football as it is at present played between our American colleges and secondary schools is that it is not dominated by a love of sport for its own sake. It tends to produce an abnormal type of physical development simply for the purpose of intense competition. It does not produce either mental or physical normal conditions, but rather abnormal. Mentally it shows the same results as war. It is the dominating element of football as played at the present time on athletic fields of the country. This is indicated by the fact that the moment that the football season is over the same disappears when one side has won and another has been defeated. The spirit and conversation grow out of this game are similar to that which one hears after two warring armies have met on the battlefield, or two pugilists have met in a fight."

Grace T. Work, president of the College of Industrial Arts, delivered an interesting address in the department of manual training on the influence of industrial arts and sciences upon the rural home.

OREGON DAY AT THE SEATTLE FAIR

Seattle, Wash., July 9.—This is Oregon day at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition. Hundreds of visitors from the neighboring state were entertained by the Portland Festival chorus of 350 voices in the natural theatre this morning, and there was a reception and lawn fete this afternoon, with a promenade and dance in the Washington state building this evening.

Two special trains bringing delegations from Oregon arrived Wednesday, and two more came yesterday. Yesterday afternoon the members of the Festival chorus and their friends came to the city from Portland, and Governor Benson and his staff, together with a number of other state officials, arrived on the 4:30 train. Governor Benson responded to the address of welcome given by J. E. Chilberg, president of the exposition, this morning at 11 o'clock.

The feature display in the Oregon building is an exhibit of 1900 boxes of Valley cherries from Salem. This

is the second big consignment of cherries that has been displayed in the Oregon building since the fair opened. The other shipment was brought from The Dalles for cherry day, and was representative of the Eastern Oregon highland unirrigated variety. The latest consignment is by far the largest brought to the fair during the exposition season.

TARIFF BILL PUT THROUGH SENATE

Washington, July 8.—The tariff bill passed the senate just after 11 o'clock tonight by a vote of 45 to 34. Republicans voting in the negative were Beveridge, Indiana; Bristow, Kansas; Brown, Nebraska; Burkett, Nebraska; Clapp, Minnesota; Crawford, South Dakota; Cummins, Iowa; Dooliver, Iowa; LaFollette, Wisconsin; Nelson, Minnesota; McHenry, of Louisiana, was the only Democrat voting in the affirmative.

Insurgents Stand on Platform—The closing hours of the consideration of the tariff bill were given over to general debate, in which the "insurgent" Republicans took a leading part. It was during this debate that Beveridge announced that the "insurgents" would vote with the Democrats against the bill. This negative vote, he said, would be cast as a notice to the conferees to report back a bill containing reduction in tariff schedules.

"Our vote," he said, "shall be cast in harmony with our party's pledges as voiced by our party's leader and the national platform."

Future Course on Tariff—The tariff bill, having now passed the senate, will be returned to the house. It will probably be referred to the ways and means committee. The committee will then report recommending the adoption of some of the amendments and that the house dissent from others, and ask for a conference. The house may vote on this report as a whole or on each separate amendment separately. It will certainly reject many of the senate amendments and then appoint conferees.

The conference will meet and endeavor to arrange mutual concessions whereby the house and senate can be brought into agreement. Probably during this stage the president will be consulted with a view to framing the bill in such final shape as to ensure his approval. It will be desired by the Republican leaders to avoid a veto unless the president should insist on such radical changes as would not command a majority in both houses.
