JUNCTION FARMERS TRY COMBINED HARVESTER

Junction City, Or., July 20.—The Holt-Holly side-hill combined harvester will be tried probably for the first time in the Willamette valley this season. J. S. Watkins, Newman Bros. and A. A. Meek have just purchased and taken home a new machine. The combine will cut a 14-foot swath and clean the grain, and instead of dropping bundles, as the binder does, will drop the grain in sacks on one side, and the straw in small cocks on the other, so that the farmer can either haul it to stock, scatter it over the ground or burn it. The price paid for the machine was \$1800. The operation of it will be watched carefully, and if it proves satisfactory in the small fields of the valley many more will be purchased next season.
