Madrid, July 27.—Strikers at Barcelona have cut the telegraph wires to the capital.

Barcelona, Monday, via Perpignan, France, July 27, 1909.—Violence followed the declaration of a general strike here today, called for the purpose of protesting against the Spanish-Moroccan war.

Situation Is Grave Cerebere, France, July 27.—Travelers just arriving here report the situation at Barcelona grave.

Killed and Wounded Perpignan, France, July 27.—During the street fighting in Barcelona today a captain and three grenadiers and eight strikers were killed.

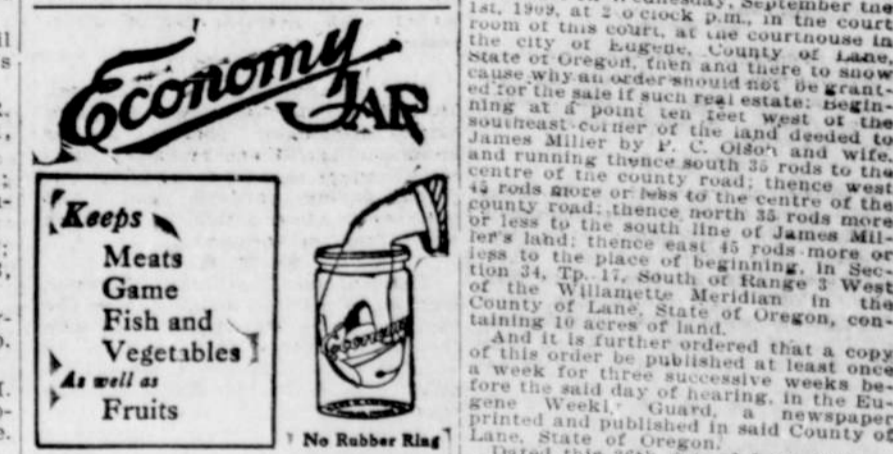

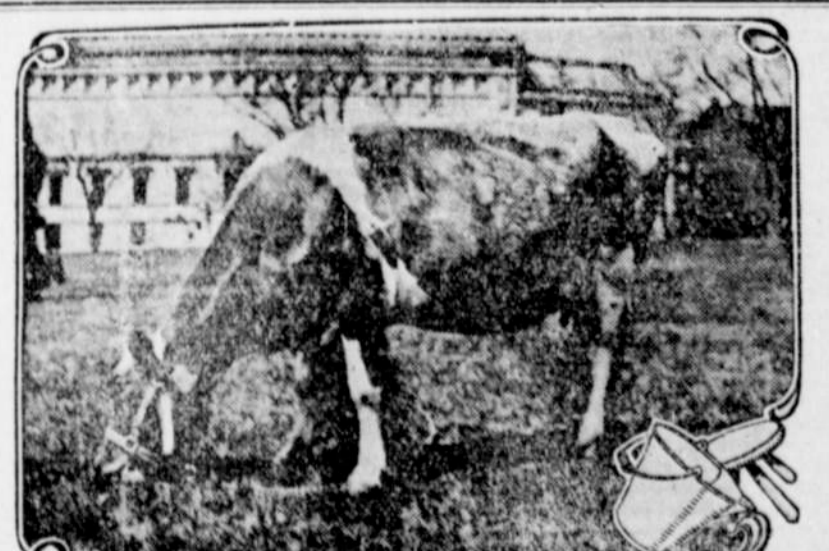
