Fads and Fashions

New York, July 24.—The lingerie gown is the all important gown now that the warm weather has come upon us; in fact, there is a distinct craze for it; and while the lingerie gown has seen several seasons of leadership it is still in the field and the reason is quite obvious, for it is the dressiest model, capable of many changes and withal very cool—the most suitable warm-weather dress.

It might be thought a difficult matter to find either new models or designs, but the stores fairly teem with new ideas. Moreover, the lingerie gown may be found in all sorts of patterns, some with little or no elaboration, and entirely suitable for mornings or occasions where a plain gown is the appropriate model; or it may be a grade as fine as a gossamer and beautifully ornamented with lace and embroideries and all sorts of fine stichery.

The lingerie gown has the great advantage of cleaning easily or laundering as well and may be done over and over again. This season the fashion of colored linings makes it possible also to get a complete change of effect, which should be added to the white slip provided.

The idea of different sets of accessories should never be forgotten, as with a soft lavender or blue slip a belt and a few bows to match, or with a pink or a pretty sash of Dresden, showing much pink in it, and a coral necklace two pretty changes are effected.

Part and all lace gowns are a feature of this summer's modes and often two or more laces are combined in the same frock. The lace gown is always a dressy one and never appropriate for the street or for morning wear.

Irish lace seems to still retain its hold upon popular fancy, and it is used in combination with chiffon bands to form the gown; indeed, the chiffon and Irish lace gown is more becoming than the all lace gown as this lace is particularly stiff and harsh next the face.

Valenciennes is liked better by many than Irish lace, and gowns of the same in combination with chiffon or fine batiste are becoming, while Spanish lace is used frequently upon green silk gowns.

There is a decided trimness in the fit of all gowns for young girls this season, and even in the separate bodices there is little blouse in front; in the back and on the sides the waist must be held down smooth and flat under the belt.

Taffeta batiste is a material that is strongly akin to the lingerie effects when done up with laces and embroideries. This material is reserved for the afternoons, and while the white effects are charming those in delicate shades of pink, blue and green, and deliciously cool and dainty to the eye.

Some of the new laces when made up over colored slips are very attractive for afternoon dresses, and also make pretty dancing frocks for the summer resort. I saw a gown the other day very fetching and easily developed. At a big sale of embroideries a piece of flouncing deep enough for a skirt had been found which was tucked finely at the top, fitting closely over the hips and falling plainly in its long lines to the feet. The slip was in white cotton mull, a beautiful soft material for this use. The waist was made over a bodice lining which really amounts to nothing more than a support about the waist.

The upper part of the bodice was ornamented with a close pattern of eyel embroidery at the waist resembling a bolero laid over a chiffon underwaist, and an embroidered belt deep as a handbreadth with deep scallops gave the effect of the Empire around the low neck and under the bust. The bodice was finished with blue silk. Needless to say the figure must be slight to wear this.

No material seems to serve so many purposes as pongee. One may secure a rather coarse-grained variety of the naturally color, and with white collars and cuffs a most serviceable suit is ready for the business "trip" for the latter purpose only it is wished pongees in dark brown and blues are to be had at very reasonable prices.

For such a gown select a model which shows some pleating in the skirt, for while all skirts fit well over the hips, there are pleated flounces let in here and there below the knees which give a considerable flare. The sleeve should not be too full, nor too small, nor the waist line too high, for line is whispered that skirts will be wider this autumn, the shoulder line broader, and the belt in almost normal position.

A number of one-piece pongee gowns are to be had of beautiful embroidery, done on pongee with the most beautiful effects, are to be had. The latter are very elaborate and suitable only to such times as when a dressy effect is in keeping with the occasion. Those for afternoons are usually made with the separate trimmings applied to suit. One model which, finished in the back with only a few wide tucks, is fastened in the front, a little to one side, all the down from collar to hem with large buttons covered with the material itself, is exceedingly pretty. At the throat is a little guimpe of the finest batiste, tucked and trimmed with narrow lace. This guimpe is only buttoned underneath into the waist, so that it can be freshened whenever necessary. Waist and skirt are all in one, but joined with a snugly fitting belt

of the pongee and the bodice and skirt must fit to perfection in such an extremely plain but exceedingly smart little gown. A soft tie of black or bright-toned silk gives a becoming color contrast.

The gingham of this summer are exceedingly fine, and are no more like the gingham of the old days than many other materials are like their namesakes of years back. They are made up in the most simple fashions, but with a cut and finish that are effective and decidedly smart.

In only a few of the pongee or linen dresses there are any yoke at the back this season, for the material comes to the edge of the collar. The front may be of any shape best liked, the square style being perhaps the most often seen.

The collarless gown, with some sort of fancy trimming is much used for gowns to be worn at the seashore or the country, or at any time when such effects are closely akin to the negligee will be in good taste, but for business or street wear its use is always questionable.

The new light traveling wrap made of soft China silk or pongee, takes a little room, keeps off the dust effectively, and is very gracefully draped. It is one of the adaptations of the kimono, but a very attractive one.

The newest in motor hats is the patent leather hat with deep brim. It is easily cleaned from dust, sheds the rain, and is a fine thing for the long journeys taken today.

NEW VIOLIN TEACHER IN SCHOOL OF MUSIC

The vacancy in the violin department of the University of Oregon School of Music, caused by the resignation of LeRoy Gesser, who goes to Europe for further work, has been filled by the election of Miss Emily Sadler, who comes to the University from Sandusky, Ohio. Miss Sadler has had years of study, and among her teachers were Professor William Yunk, of the Detroit Conservatory of Music, Detroit, Mich., and formerly concertmaster of the Vienna Court Orchestra; Jose Marien, formerly concertmaster of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, now in Germany; Sol Marcosson, of Cleveland, Ohio, and Herr Leopold Lichtenberg, of the National Conservatory in New York city.

Miss Sadler has also had much experience in teaching and solo work, having taught in several private schools, in the Detroit Conservatory, and in the Judson College, Alabama, one of the largest colleges in the South. She will begin her work in the University at the opening of the fall term in September.

FIFTEEN TONS CHERRIES HAVE BEEN SHIPPED

The Eugene Fruit Growers' Association will complete its work of packing and shipping cherries this week. It has had ten expert packers at work for the past three weeks, and has shipped cherries to probably every state in the Union outside of some of the Southern states.

About 15 tons have been shipped from the local headquarters, the bulk of these going to Seattle, Los Angeles, Salt Lake, Northern California points and Southern Oregon. But the 10-pound boxes of fancy cherries have gone to New York and Philadelphia, as well as to other points in every Eastern state. The varieties shipped have been principally Royal Anne, although quite a quantity of Kings, Lamberts and Black Republicans have also been sent away.

The prices brought for cherries in ten-pound boxes this year vary from 40 cents, the lowest, to \$2.25 per box. But at the same time these prices were being paid much higher prices were being received for cherries not so good on the Chicago market. For instance, on July 16 Kings were selling in Chicago for \$4 a box, while Lamberts brought \$3 in the same market. It costs the fruit growers here from 15 to 20 cents a ten-pound box laid down in Chicago. Something of the possibilities of the Willamette valley cherry, with a good market, may be understood when the grower would not about 4 cents a pound for his cherries if he received 80 cents a box for them in the Chicago market—that is, for the ten-pound boxes.

The committee met last Friday night and held a busy session, and many new additions are under consideration. The dates for the fair this year are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 21, 22 and 23. It was decided to hold the fair in mid-week on account of the fairs that would conflict on earlier or later dates.

Two large additions will be made to the main exhibit building. This section is to be represented in the East and Middle West this fall at the Iowa state fair, the Nebraska state fair and the Minnesota state fair, the fat stock show in Chicago, also at the corn show at Omaha in November.

This is a truly wonderful opportunity for this section, and Manager Conley, of the Commercial Club, is anxious to have every citizen bring something in the way of a meritorious exhibit to the club rooms. There the exhibits will be made ready for shipment and turned over to the agent at Cottage Grove. Then they will be taken entire charge of by the Harriman system, which will put them on exhibition.
