

## SENATE ADOPTS CONFERENCE REPORT ON TARIFF BILL: AND ADJOURN THURSDAY

Washington, July 5.—Taft left the White House for the capitol to sign the tariff bill at 4:33 p. m., the bill having passed the senate today.

### SCHEDULE ADOPTED

Without a division the senate adopted Senator McCumber's drawback resolution with a provision for free cotton bagging added.

The house unanimously adopted a concurrent resolution reducing the duties on leather goods. It had already been adopted by the senate.

At 3:14 p. m. the senate adopted the concurrent resolution reducing the leather schedule rates unanimously.

### REPORT IS ADOPTED

At 2:15 p. m. today the senate adopted the conference report on the tariff bill, which effects the final passage of the bill through congress. The vote was 47 ayes and 31 nays. The bill received all the Republican votes except those of Bristow, Clapp, Cummins, Dilliver, LaFollette, Beveridge and Nelson.

The senate then took up the concurrent resolution reducing the rates in the leather schedule.

### RESOLUTION FAILED

The McCumber resolution failed of adoption in the house on a point of order by Payne.

### PRESIDENT SIGNS BILL

The president signed the tariff bill at 5:06 p. m.

## SUTTON WAS SHOT SAYS WEST POINT WITNESS

Boston, Aug. 10.—In an interview in the Boston Post attributed to Sergeant Arthur Todd, of the U. S. Marine Corps, and made public today, it is stated that if he should be called in the investigation of the death of Lieutenant Sutton his testimony would be exactly the opposite of that given by Sutton's fellow officers. Todd has been summoned to Annapolis.

In describing the shooting Todd said:

"I was corporal of the guard on the night Sutton was shot, and from the light where I was stationed I saw a light figure about 250 feet away."

"I saw Lieutenants Adams and Ostrom and recognized them. They were near me. The man, who was in his shirt sleeves, started to run, and I heard a voice cry: 'Stop running! You are under arrest.' The man ran on, and once more I heard the same voice cry out loudly, 'Stop running or I'll shoot.' The man paid no attention and ran on, and the next moment I saw a flash and heard a revolver report. There were three other shots and the man who was running dropped."

"I ran over to him and bent over him. It was Lieutenant Sutton. I saw a hole in the man's forehead, where there was a ragged entrance, and a hole back of the left ear, where the bullet came out clean."

"Lieutenant Roelker came into the guard room where I then was, a short time before the shooting. He was with a private named Richardson and they had a drink together. At the time of the shooting he was not anywhere near."

"Next morning some enlisted men found a revolver on the ball field

which was not a regular service weapon, but a .32-calibre affair."

Todd stated that at one time in a conversation he had the bullet himself that killed Sutton, but later stated that some one else had taken it. He refused to state finally whether he knew where the bullet was or not.

"Just after the shooting, when I returned to the guard room, Roelker came in all out of breath and much excited. He said: 'My God, Archie, I think I've been shot.' I laughed at him at first, but he was so much in earnest about it that I felt in his left hand outside pocket just over his heart. There was a drill regulation book there and a bullet that had become mushroomed between the pages."

"Roelker was much excited when I pulled out the book and showed him the bullet. He stripped down to the skin and there was a reddish tinge just over the heart, showing where the bullet would have gone had not the book interfered."

"Roelker and I talked the matter over and we agreed that he must have run into the fire of bullets, one of which I have not been summoned to go to the court of inquiry and tell what I know."

## JIM FINCH MUST HANG SAYS COURT

Salem, Or., Aug. 11.—Having carefully examined every contention of counsel and every authority cited, the Supreme Court this morning overruled every point raised by counsel for the defendant, affirmed the decree of the trial court and pronounced the death knell of James A. Finch, convicted of the murder of Attorney Ralph B. Fisher and sentenced to suffer the death penalty. The opinion is written by Justice T. A. McBride and so thoroughly is every point covered that it would seem no ground for an appeal to the United States Supreme Court could possibly exist. The opinion is also unusual in that the Supreme Court says it could find no possible reason why a new trial should be granted.

### "TRUTHFUL GRAVEYARD" MIGHT HELP SOME

(Medford Tribune).

July Sunset contains an excellent story by the author of "Pigs in Pies," humorously describing how the civic pride and public spirit of a city was awakened and an era of progress inaugurated by the establishment of "Thompson's Truthful Graveyard."

Thompson, a new arrival, observing the close-fisted short-sighted narrow and selfish policy of the principal property owners, men who had grown rich in the community, yet would do nothing to uphold the city, saw that what was needed was a few funerals. Unable to furnish these he did the next best thing—he started his "truthful cemetery," right across the road from the city's unkept burial ground.

Every week Thompson planted a white tombstone with the name of a prominent citizen printed in black letters upon it. The place for the truthful epitaph was left blank. Gospel kept busy rehearsing the meanness of the citizen named, and guessing what truth would be inscribed, and who would be the next to be honored with a tombstone.

When the cemetery was pretty well filled with gravestones, the daughter of one of the leading citizens, "the worst type of the small town millionaire," who was ill, visited Thompson in an effort to bribe him in case her father died, thinking she was getting a blackmailing scheme. He showed her his "model graveyard" with the names of fictitious citizens with epitaphs recording their deeds for the public good. She entered into the spirit of the work, and it was not long before, under her father's name, was printed the following epitaph: "Gave \$10,000 for a charitable hospital."

The example was contagious, and soon under the names of other leading citizens were inscribed such epitaphs as the following: "Donated land for factory site," "Gave \$5,000 for public library," "Donated railroad right-of-way," "Subscribed \$1000 for cemetery improvement," etc., and the leading citizens began to show such public spirit that the city began to grow, and the era of progress was on.

"Truthful graveyards" could be worked to advantage in many Oregon towns, where funerals are badly needed among the mossbacks, especially in the Willamette Valley towns, where, if the needed funds actually took place, there would be no leading citizens left, and but few surviving residents.

## COUNCIL DRAWS WARRANT FOR THE MILLICAN LAND

The council this morning ordered the judgment for the right-of-way across the Millican land paid, and drew a warrant for \$3500 on the general fund. The defense has until Saturday to file pleadings for a new trial, but the case according to the understanding of the council, will be able to take possession of the Millican land immediately.

The verdict of the jury was returned a few minutes before 11 o'clock last night, after almost four hours of consideration. The jury is said to have allowed \$1200 for the actual

land, \$1300 for fencing and bridges, and the remainder for damages.

As Millican and his attorneys are dissatisfied with the result his attorneys asked time last night to file pleadings for a new trial, when the jury had reported on its verdict.

The general opinion also prevails that Millican will carry the case higher, for the attorneys in the conduct of the case definitely planned to make ground for the appeal yesterday.

The city council and its attorneys do not anticipate that an appeal will effect the progress of the canal. At the council meeting this morning the desire was expressed to take possession of the Millican land this week and begin excavation. Once the city gets possession of the right-of-way and digs its canal the city attorneys say that it will be almost impossible to oust the city.

### CARMODY WILL PLOW WITH TRACTION ENGINE

Will Make Eight Furrows at Once—Will Be Used on Farm West of Eugene

John Carmody, who owns a big farm eight miles west of Eugene, this morning received from the factory a big traction engine which will be used to plow his big grain fields. Accompanying the engine was an eight-disc plow, that many furrows being turned at once. The engine is a sixteen-horse power Taylor and Maltman make and is a powerful machine.

### SLAYER OF FERGUSON CITED TO APPEAR

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 9.—Coroner Jewett said today that he had turned the Yoncalla shooting affair over to the district attorney and sheriff of Lane county, who have been notified to bring Bacon to Yoncalla Wednesday to finish the report of the coroner's jury upon the death of M. D. Ferguson, who was killed by Bacon in mistake for a deer.

Grants Pass, Or., Aug. 3.—The county coroner and party returned today from Josephine caves, where Frank A. Ellis, a young druggist of this city, yesterday accidentally shot himself. Ellis and a party were climbing up one of the inner chambers of the caves. Ellis, who had a revolver, slipped, the revolver went off and the bullet entered his left eye, killing him instantly.

Ellis had been married only two months. His wife was with him, and stayed with the body four hours in the caves alone, the rest of the party deserting her. After help came she walked out three miles.

At the home of her daughter, Mrs. Z. M. Smith, on Fall Creek, at 5 p. m. Saturday, July 31, 1909, Mrs. Sarah G. Barclay, aged nearly 80 years. Mrs. Barclay was a pioneer of 1852 and has lived in Lane county ever since coming west. She is survived by her daughter and by Pearl Taylor and J. F. Smith, grandchildren. The funeral was held at 11 a. m. today with interment at Pleasant Hill cemetery. Rev. R. G. Callison conducted the services.

## ELEVEN LIVES LOST IN B. C. HOTEL BLAZE

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 10.—Eleven lives were lost when the Skanog hotel at Vernon, B. C., burned early today. The building was a large brick veneer structure, and patronized chiefly by the laboring classes. It had about 60 guests, and so sudden was the rush of the flames that those who did escape did so with great difficulty.

The fire was discovered about 2 o'clock, but when the firemen arrived a few minutes later both stairways were vomiting out flames and in an incredible short time the building was a blazing furnace. A search of the ruins began this morning and ten bodies have already been taken out.

### OVER \$6000 FOR PROMOTION WORK SO FAR THIS YEAR

At the meeting of the board of governors of the promotion department of the Eugene Commercial Club, besides routine business, a detailed statement of the 1909 expenditures was submitted and discussed. It shows that the total cost of the depot park to date is \$2029 and the cost of the Eugene exhibit at Seattle to date nearly \$1000 with \$500 more due for salaries for the rest of the exposition. The total expended for literature aggregates \$2234 and for postage for the first seven months of the year is \$386. For entertaining visiting conventions etc. \$243 was spent, which includes the illuminating and decorating of Williamette street.

### HAMMOND-SCHUECKER NUPTIALS AT ALBANY

The happy couple leave on this evening's local for Portland and will leave there on Saturday for the east on an extended tour. Major Hammond will be with the Oregon rifle team, as coach, at Camp Perry, Ohio, during the National matches the latter part of August, after which they will visit with his brother James and wife at Waterford, Conn. Upon their return they will probably make their future home in Portland.

The bride is an accomplished musician on the piano and harp. She was head of the piano department at the University of Oregon during the year 1907-08. The groom is a very prominent National Guard officer and has been chief deputy in the sheriff's office for several years. Both have hosts of friends who wish them much happiness and prosperity.
