Kansas City, Aug. 17.—Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma sizzled today, the day promising to be one of the hottest in the history of the Southwest.

The suffering to man and beast was intense, and early in the day the reports of prostrations began to come in.

Last night was the hottest in Kansas City in years, and at 9 o'clock this morning the thermometer registered 87 degrees.

At Topeka it is 90.

At Norfolk, Neb., three people died from the effects of the heat.

Highest in Years

Arkansas City, Kan., Aug. 17.—At noon today the temperature was 106 in the shade, the highest in Southern Kansas for years.

DENTON FLEES; HIS NEPHEW UNDER ARREST

Robert Denton, the old man who owns the cigar store in the Fraser Building at Sixth and Willamette streets, and who is under bonds to appear for trial on the charge of bribery, having given Chief of Police Farrington money at two different times to protect him from police raids, has left the city, having evidently heard that a warrant was out for his arrest on the charge of selling liquor. Neelon, who works at the store, however, is under arrest on that charge, having been arrested this morning by Chief of Police Farrington on a warrant issued out of the justice court charging him with selling a pint of whiskey on August 9 to James Chamberlain, the young livery driver who, it is said, was in an intoxicated condition while driving the Plank party to the mountains, and when the wagon fell over a grade, resulting in injuries to several members of the party.

Neelon was arraigned before Judge Bryson this morning and entered a plea of not guilty. He was placed under \$500 bonds, and his trial was set for tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.

A great many fans have been thinking that the locals could not beat a real fast bunch—but their opinions are changed now, as they defeated the fastest team in the state, and let it be said now that this same team is coming back to play again in two weeks.

DeNeffe and Baker were each in fine form, DeNeffe allowing but four hits and striking out seven men, while the best the all-stars could do was to get two hits off Baker, while he struck out five men. Jewett, at short, played a remarkable game for the locals, eliciting applause several times from the grandstand, while Smith and Henkle, left fielders respectively for the Coits and All-Stars, pulled off nice catches in the outfield.

This is how the scoring was done: The visitors got their one run in the sixth inning. Fisher, the first man up, went out, Jewett to Paine. Gray, next up, went out, Driver to Paine. That was all the scoring for the All-Stars, yet they came near duplicating the trick in the ninth.

The locals scored one in the second as follows: Paine hit safely, stole second and was advanced to third on Jewett's out, and came home when Gray made a bad peg to home of Hardesty's grounder. Again in the third the locals annexed two more runs. Coleman was hit by a pitched ball, stole second and was advanced to third on Smith's clean drive over second. Smith stole second. Coleman then scored on a passed ball. Smith taking third, while Driver was striking out. Jewett then made first on Hathaway's error. Smith scoring on the same play. In the fifth inning the locals made their last run. Coleman, first up, struck out. Smith then hit one too fast for Campbell to handle, the ball also eluding Myers and Smith raced around to third. He scored when Driver hit to Hathaway. Hathaway trying to head Smith off at the plate.

SMITHSON TIES THE RECORD

Portland Man Beats the Great Shaw in the Hurdles

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 16.—There never will be any more question as to who is the greatest hurdler in the world, for Forrest C. Smithson finished 10 feet ahead of A. B. Shaw, the American champion, Saturday, abreast of a heavy wind in the remarkable time of 15 1-5 seconds. The Multnomah Club man, always leading, finished up with a remarkable burst of speed, and had no not topped a hurdle down would have held the 15 1-5 second record, held jointly by Shaw and Kraenzlein. At the same time Smithson sped over the course the wind was blowing in his face at about 30 miles an hour. Shaw also knocked down a hurdle, but from the gun there was only one man.

Huston Not in Training

Lack of training probably lost the 100-yard dash for Oliver Huston. The University of Oregon sprinter was put out of the going in the first heat, which was won by Courtney, a 17-year-old Seattle high school boy. Huston was away nicely and for 80 yards led the field. There was a cry from the Oregon contingent that he had the heat won, but he could not keep up. Six men started in the first heat and three in the second, a fact which might have had something to do with Huston's bad finish. Martin, the winner, has been beaten by Huston every time during the four brushes they have had. Martin is the Whitman College star, running for the Seattle Athletic Club.

TWO FARM HOUSES BURNED BY FIREBUG

The firebug seems to be abroad in the land. This morning two vacant farmhouses, one belonging to Dr. L. W. Brown, and the other to the A. G. Hovey heirs, a short distance southwest of the city, were burned within two hours of each other and every indication points to incendiarism.

The house on the Hovey farm was about two and a half miles from the center of the city. It was an old structure, worth \$200 or \$300. It was burned about 5 o'clock this morning and the Dr. Brown house two hours later. The latter was a better house, a part of it being new. It was valued at \$500 or \$600. Neither was insured.

Neither house had been occupied for a long time. It is evident that some one slept in the Hovey house and then walked over to the Brown house, a mile distant, and burned it.

There were two houses on Dr. Brown's farm, and the one burned was the smaller of the two.

SERIOUS FIRE CAUSED HEAVY LOSS AT COAL CREEK

Fernie, B. C., Aug. 16.—Twenty-two buildings were destroyed by fire at Coal Creek last night, causing a loss of \$100,000. The water pressure failed and Fernie was called on for aid, but the brigade did not succeed in controlling the fire until early morning.

Thomas Townsend, who graduated from the state university this year with honors, having been president of the student body, has been elected principal of the Albany high school. He is said to have been the choice of City Superintendent Sanders and the position came to him without solicitation on his part.

BAD FIRE IN SEISER'S STORE THIS MORNING

(From Monday's Daily Guard.)

Fire causing several thousand dollars' loss to goods and \$500 or \$600 damage to the building, broke out in Mrs. Elenor S. Seiser's women's furnishing goods store in the Cherry block at Sixth and Willamette streets this morning at 4 o'clock.

Smoke was first seen issuing from the rear part of the store and an alarm was turned in. By the time the department arrived on the scene the entire interior of the building was a mass of black smoke which rolled out through apertures in the building in big clouds. The department soon had the blaze under control, but not before great damage was done.

The fire, as near as can be ascertained, started in the basement beneath the stage of the Bell theatre next door. Some are of the opinion that it started from defective wiring. This is a plausible theory, as there is a great deal of wiring under the stage of the theatre.

The stock of goods, according to a statement made by Mrs. Seiser this morning, was valued at \$16,000, and the insurance held by her amounted to \$12,000 in the following companies: The Springfield, the Fire Association of Philadelphia, the Phoenix, of London, the German-American and the Niagara.

Robert Cherry, of Cherry Bros., says the loss to the building was \$500 or \$600, mostly in cracked plate glass windows.

The Bell theatre's loss was nominal. Manager Swinney was fully insured. The theatre could run tonight, Mr. Swinney says, but he will keep closed until the insurance adjuster arrives up from Portland.

A quantity of merchandise in the rear part of Mrs. Seiser's store was consumed by the flames, and nearly the entire stock in the salesroom seems to be ruined or badly damaged by the smoke and water.

Mrs. Seiser says she will open for business again just as soon as the insurance men adjust the loss and the building can be repaired.

ATTORNEYS FOR HASKELL FILE HIS ANSWER

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 16.—Attorneys for Governor Haskell and five other defendants, indicted in connection with the alleged Muskogee town lot frauds, today filed motions in the federal court to quash the indictments, setting forth a number of sensational allegations.

Aside from the charges against five grand jurors and allegations of improper conduct on the part of United States Marshal Victor, the motion deals largely with the grand jury's selection, with especial objection to the exclusion of residents of Muskogee county, the defendant's home, from the territory from which the jury was chosen. It is alleged that five of the grand jury were deliberately sought to go on the grand jury for the purpose of returning indictments, and that G. W. Strawn, as foreman, conspired to intimidate the other jurors into voting the indictments.

It is also charged that out of eight talesmen seven are Republicans and the eighth bitter personal enemies of Governor Haskell. The motion further declares there was no evidence presented to show conspiracy to defraud.

MCDONNELL GOES OUT UNDER A CLOUD

Colonel of Third Regiment Is Now Under Investigation

Charles E. McDonnell, Colonel of the Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard has tendered a verbal resignation of his office surrounded by conditions which assure its acceptance, says Sunday's Oregonian.

Taps was sounded over his career as third ranking officer in the state militia yesterday afternoon when an order issued by Brigadier-General Finzer directed an investigation of his accounts, this dictum following closely the announcement made by Colonel McDonnell that he had decided to resign from the service. Last night Colonel McDonnell submitted to General Finzer a report of his military finances which the militia head declared to be highly satisfactory. The balance of government funds held by Colonel McDonnell amounted to less than \$300 for which he accounted to his chief.

"Protective" Meeting Held.

But another fund the extent of which is unknown has to be accounted for by Col. McDonnell. Assembled yesterday in a meeting termed "protective" by General Finzer, the captains of the Third Regiment discussed this fund with Colonel McDonnell and at the close he promised to give a satisfactory account of the trust to them tonight.

"My order for an investigation still stands," said General Finzer last night, after these phases surrounding Colonel McDonnell's exit from military life had transpired.

"There is no shortage in my account current," said Colonel McDonnell, "but I admit I was slow with my reports. The regimental funds do not amount to more than \$1500 or \$1600 and I can straighten them out in a day's work on the reports which are the hardest part of a colonel's position."

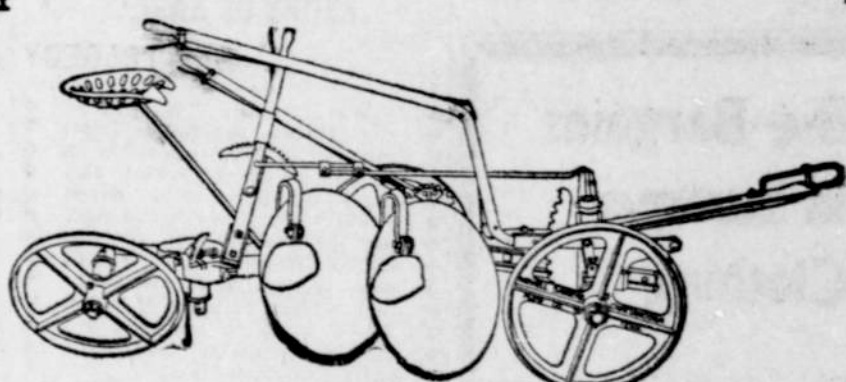
