TO HAUL RAILROAD

SUPPLIES FROM NATRON

C. C. Bowman has been busy this week making arrangements to start freighting for the Southern Pacific Company, or rather for the Utah Construction Company, who have the work in charge. He has bought a fine new outfit, consisting of a team, harness and wagon, that he says stands him a cash outlay of \$700. This gives him two good teams and will enable him to draw some big loads over the mountain roads. He left Wednesday for Natron, where his headquarters will be established, as the supplies will all be shipped to that point and distributed along the company right of way. His work will be mostly from Natron to the mouth of the North Fork of the Willamette, a distance of about 35 miles, and will require three days to make the trip. —News.

No New Developments

No great developments in the way of railroad news have occurred during the past week, though a car load of scrapers arrived here yesterday from Boca, Cal., and ten or twelve more cars of machinery and horses are expected on any train. The subcontractors are now along the route making preliminary arrangements that will be necessary before actual construction work begins. —News.

Local and Personal

The shingle mill is about to install a planer. This is a new addition and other machinery will be added soon. They have a contract to dress a large quantity of lumber and later the machine will be used in their porch column factory. This enterprise is being held up by the sickness of one of the partners, J. H. Jones, who is up in Washington at present. The mill is having difficulty in getting cars to ship their shingles, which they are manufacturing at the rate of 20,000 a day.

The flour mill is not yet running at its full capacity owing to the inability to get wheat, the farmers holding up for higher prices. They are now getting a dollar a bushel. The mill, however, will soon have some wheat shipped in from up in Washington. When the Natron extension is completed Springfield will probably be quite a milling centre, being an outlet for Eastern and Central Oregon wheat. The price of land in the valley is getting nearly too high for profitable wheat raising.

Walter ("Fat") Kestley, who is with the Southern Pacific surveying crew under Russell above Natron, cut his foot with an axe yesterday, a couple of stitches being necessary to close the wound. "Fat" says it does not hurt much, and since he gets a week's lay-off on full pay he thinks he will cut the other foot next week.

Mrs. L. K. Page returned last Saturday from her month's visit with relatives and friends in San Francisco, Los Angeles and other California points. She reports a most pleasant sojourn, and a great change in the southern state since her last visit.

The interior of the Southern Pacific depot will be somewhat remodelled so as to make more room for the agent's offices.

Considerable fun was had on the street yesterday watching the operation of breaking and shoeing a bunch of broncos to be used on the railroad work. Some of the animals were good-looking horses and others were quite mean.

The flour mill was stopped for a few hours this forenoon as a result of tearing a sheet of cloth in one of the sifting machines. It was hard to get at to repair.

The new 500-kilowatt turbine is being installed in the electric plant and will be running in a few weeks. It is held up through the missing of several parts that had to be sent for. When it is ready one generator will be used entirely for power purposes and the other for lights. They are both of the same capacity. They will give all the power necessary for the three street cars.

The big cordwood drive that has been coming down the river and into the Eugene millrace has passed. Over 150 cords have been sent down from a point on the Coast Fork this side of Cottage Grove by a party named Fisher. It is gathered in the mill pond and sold in Eugene.

Emma Bassett, formerly of Springfield, but now an O. A. C. student at Corvallis, is visiting her friends here. Her father, who was the well-known Booth-Kelly foreman here, has a mill of his own near Corvallis.

The real estate men report that since the railroad has begun operations property-owners have taken their property off the market, awaiting developments. But few transfers are reported.

Hall & Soleim have some twenty men at work on the new sewer. A car of their pipe has been held up somewhere. A tracer has been sent after it.

OREGON TRUNK WINS BATTLE WITH HARRIMAN

Portland, Aug. 24.—The Oregon Trunk Railway, which has the financial support of James J. Hill, won the contest with the Deschutes Railway Company, a Harriman subsidiary company, in the United States district court today, when Judge Bean overruled the demurrer of the Harriman road. The court also issued an order forbidding the Harriman people going upon the 60 miles of contested right-of-way up the Deschutes canyon in Central Oregon, and it is stated the injunction will stand until the final determination of the suit.

The application of the Harriman lawyers asking that the Hill road be similarly enjoined pending the adjudication of the case was refused.

FOUNTAIN OF ANOTHER KIND IS ORDERED

Ladies' Auxiliary Decides Not to Have Fountain of Pompeian Stone

The fountain which the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Commercial Club finally ordered will be a credit to the city. Fortunately the club ordered some samples of the Pompeian stone and found that it would not be durable for a fountain and although the delay has been vexatious, it has been the means of securing a much better fountain than any of those originally considered. The lower base will be built of concrete about two feet above the ground as a watering place for horses. In the centre is a group of storks or pelicans holding up the first pan which is six feet in diameter; the next pan is four and the next three feet. Above this is a spray of water coming out of water-lilies and each pan except the lower one has a row of three-inch round electric light globes. A similar fountain has been erected by the city of Galveston, Texas.
