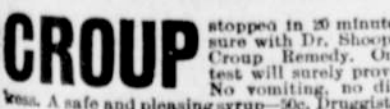

HODES BUILDING CASE AGAIN IN CIRCUIT COURT

Clemens Hodes, proprietor of the old frame building on Willamette street, occupied by the Electric theatre, today began suit in the circuit court to enjoin the city and Building Inspector McFarland from interfering with him in repairing the building, the roof having been cut full of holes during the big fire last May. It will be remembered that shortly after the fire Hodes employed two carpenters to repair the roof, but they were arrested for violating the city's building ordinance, and the work was stopped. Now that the rainy season is not far away Hodes wants to fix the building so that it will not leak, but cannot do so without permission from the building inspector, and that permission cannot be had, as the city authorities are of the opinion that such a building should not be repaired, but should be removed.

Hodes, in his complaint, alleges in substance as follows: That he is the owner of the south 22 feet in lot 4, block 10, Mulligan's donation to Lane county, now a part of Eugene, and that he owns a wooden building 22 feet 4 inches by 80 feet in dimensions and one story in height on the lot; that the building is valued at \$800, and is rented at \$60 a month on an unexpired lease; that on May 25, 1909, during a big conflagration in Eugene, the firemen, at the direction of W. T. Campbell, chief of the Eugene fire department, cut several holes in the roof of the building which admit water in time of rain; that on August 20, 1909, the plaintiff

applied to City Building Inspector McFarland by written application for a permit to repair the holes in the roof and to paint the scorched lumber in the back of the building, and not to make the building any longer, any wider or any higher than it was before the fire, nor in any way to increase the peril of adjoining property. This application was refused, he alleges. He says that he has sustained irreparable damage by the cutting of holes in the roof and by water being thrown inside of the building, and if the building is not repaired he will suffer greater damage from the apprehended rain.

Hodes asks for a decree enjoining the defendants, their agents, officers and employees from interfering with him in making the necessary repairs to the building. Geo. B. Dorris is Hodes' attorney.

NEIGHBORS AT LAW OVER DIVISION FENCE

H. L. Edmunson Sues N. Hill for Damages Because Latter's Goats Ate His Crops

An old-time neighborhood row over a division fence seems to have begun in the vicinity of Goshen. Today H. L. Edmunson, a well-known farmer of that neighborhood, instituted suit in the circuit court against N. Hill, formerly of Springfield, now a resident of Eugene, who recently bought a farm adjoining Edmunson's, to recover \$225.00 damages alleged to have been incurred by Hill's goats going through the fence into Edmunson's fields and destroying grain and fruit trees.

In the complaint filed by the attorneys for the plaintiff, L. R. Edmunson and Carl T. Travis, this afternoon it is alleged that Edmunson and Hill divided the fence separating their farms between them. Hill to keep in order and maintain the north half and Edmunson the south half. Edmunson alleges that Hill has failed to maintain a lawful fence and his goats have gone through, under and over the fence into Edmunson's farm, destroying two acres of grain and eating the foliage and bark off of 300 peach trees, injuring 215 of them and killing 35 of them, all of which has caused damages in the sum mentioned.

RAILROADS WIN OVER MISSOURI STATE OFFICIALS

Chicago, Aug. 24.—The permanent injunction sought by the Western railroads against the Interstate Commerce Commission in the famous Missouri river rate case, was granted here today by Judges Groscup, Baker and Kohlbasat, of the United States circuit court.

Besides granting the permanent injunction in the Missouri river rate case, the court also granted a preliminary injunction in the Denver rate case, which is based on similar principles to the Missouri case.

SCHIVELY ASSUMES CREDIT, NOT BLAME

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 23.—J. H. Schively, insurance commissioner, has been on the stand all morning before the impeachment court of the state senate, giving his defense. He claimed that the flat rate charged for insurance company inspections were made following the advice favoring such a plan given by former Attorney General Atkinson. He claimed credit for the new improved insurance laws and generally followed the lines of defense previously announced.

The practice of collecting examination fees in advance in this way, he said, began in 1905. Assistant Attorney-General Lee, cross-examining, referred to Schively's direct testimony, showing that 182 companies had been admitted in that period. Asked if at the rate of \$200 per company the total fees collected had aggregated \$36,400 and his share \$18,200, Schively replied in the negative, asserting that some Eastern companies with coast general offices, had been admitted after a conference with the insurance board in San Francisco for \$100 each. Asked if his share had been \$10,000, Schively testified that he could not say whether the amount was in excess or less than that figure.

Senator "Billy" Potts, of Seattle, was absent from the morning session and was fined \$25.

PROPOSED INTERSTATE COMMISSION CHANGES

Washington, Aug. 24.—Messrs. Knapp and Prouty, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, are in receipt of an invitation from President Taft to attend a conference in New York on Monday next to consider the proposed changes in the interstate

commerce act. In a general way it is known that if it is possible it is proposed to change the law so as to remove certain investigating work from the commission and place it in the hands of the department of justice. This would make the commission virtually a judicial body, with powers limited to the examination into the reasonableness of freight rates. It is opposed by a majority of the members of the commission.

MYSTERIOUS SURVEYING PARTY WEST OF EUGENE

A party of seven railroad surveyors are running a line west from Eugene through Elmira and on toward the Siuslaw. They have been at work several days and will give out no information regarding their purposes. Their line follows the same course recently staked out by the Eugene-Siuslaw railroad surveyors under Dr. Leonard.

There is much speculation locally regarding this party, and a good many persons think that it means the continuation of the Porter Bros.' Hill line from the Deschutes country across the mountains to the coast, via the McKenzie pass and Eugene.

RAILROAD WORK BOOMS PRICES OF HAY AND GRAIN

E. W. Michael, of Lowell, who was in the city today, tells The Guard that work on the Natron extension is making things lively in that vicinity. One camp, with 200 men, is in working order, and another will be established in a day or two.

Prices of hay and feed are beginning to soar already, \$20 a ton being the price now offered for hay, and the supply is short. Along the road to the railroad camps it costs \$1 a night for horse feed for a team or \$2 for four horses.

The indications are that farmers who have a supply of hay and grain to sell will reap big profits this fall and winter.

ALL IS QUIET AT MCKEES ROCKS

Pittsburg, Aug. 24.—All is quiet in the strike zone at McKees Rocks today. Several rioters, killed Sunday night, were buried today, while the bodies of the state troopers were shipped to their homes. No demonstrations occurred.

TROPHIES OF TEDDY'S HUNT ARE RECEIVED

Washington, Aug. 24.—An express wagon loaded with nine barrels and one huge box containing the trophies of the Roosevelt hunting expedition, arrived at the Smithsonian institute this morning and more will follow. The packages are marked with the initials "T. R." in white paint and can be seen a city block away. Secretary Rathbun, of the institution, pronounced the initials evidence of a trick by newspapermen.

It will be several days before the casks can be gotten into and their contents inspected.
