SPRINGFIELD AND VICINITY

RECORD PRICE FOR MAIN STREET PROPERTY

Mr. Randall, from the East, Buys Pickett Lot at \$54 a Front Foot

Another frontage on Main street changed hands yesterday when a man named Randall paid \$3000 for 55 feet between second and third streets, the Pickett property. The price—some \$54 a front foot—marks a new record for this vicinity. The fact that Mr. Randall, who is an eastern man, said to be from Duluth, Minn., has previously purchased the Washburne frontage across the street, besides other residence properties, shows that this city is an attractive place for investments to outsiders. Mr. Randall is now living in Eugene. He states that this spring he will place a two-story brick block on the Washburne lot. There is scarcely a day passes so that some Main street property does not change hands, at figures that have even more than doubled in a short time.

BICYCLE LIMITS ARE ENLARGED

The Springfield city council met Monday evening and among other things, enlarged the bicycle limit so as to prohibit wheels on Second street between North D and South B streets. The common route of the bicyclists, as well as the pedestrians from the river bridge is on South Second, but on this street there is sidewalk only on one side, making traffic somewhat crowded, so the authorities decided that the wheels must move. They can, however, ride on Mill or First street which is just as good. This move is the result of several recent accidents and the complaints following.

NOT ENOUGH SCHOOL SEATS

The crowded condition of the schools is still as bad as ever because the two additional rooms can not be used for the lack of desks and furniture. The desks were ordered from a Eugene firm, who said that they would supply them at once. It turned out, however, that only 23 seats, instead of over 50, were delivered, with the announcement that the remainder had been ordered from Chicago, and it might be some time before they would arrive. At first it was thought that the pupils could bring their own chairs, as had been tried in several other rooms. This, however, had proved impractical and the school will remain as crowded until the other chairs come. The enrollment today was 550 and 25 more are expected by the end of the week. This number is larger than the total enrollment of last year and is an increase of some 15 or 20 per cent over last year's number at this time.

FLOUR MILL PUTTING IN NEW MACHINERY

The Springfield flour mill is installing some new machinery, a grinder and a cleaner that hails, cleans, and slightly moistens the wheat. This last feature is said to greatly improve the flour. The mill has perhaps the oldest grinding machine in the state. It is a half a century old, and is the only piece of machinery that is left from the mill that was built in 1854, and is still in use. It is called a "bull burr," and consists of a revolving flat circular stone, with grooves that turn on top of a similar stationary stone that has grooves opposing those on top. This is the old-fashioned mill stone, whose origin dates as far back as history. The stone discs are about four feet in diameter, being very heavy and cumbersome.

The fall wheat is still being delivered at the mill, which is running at its full capacity to keep up, having all its own wheat still to grind, so far having been able to get at only the "exchange" wheat.

CARPENTERS ARE HARD TO SECURE

Work on the new theatre has been delayed almost a week by the inability to secure carpenters. It is now expected to be running some time next week. At first only 200 seats will be placed, although the capacity is something over 350. The moving picture business has not been what it should have this fall, but Mr. Bryn thinks that the new building will draw somewhat better crowds. At present the theatre is not able to run in the afternoon. With the growth of the town, however, it will not be long until even more of these show houses will be installed.

ELECTRIC COMPANY IS VERY SLOW

The work on the big sign, "Springfield," has stopped for a few days. It was planned to have the sign lit up Saturday night, but the electric company has not yet started work on putting up the poles for the wires, so Hayward & Company took their men off, needing them elsewhere for a few days. The letters that are not yet up are all made, so that all that remains to be done is to place them and finish the big band, and then to put on the lights and reflectors.
