## CRESWELL TO HAVE ONE MORE BIG ORCHARD

One of the largest orchards in this valley will be set out this year by L. D. Scarbrough and B. H. Schmitt. The tract of 110 acres lies at the north edge of town on the county road, and is portion of the estate of P. C. Nolan. The land was purchased by the present owners last year with the intention of cutting it into small tracts and placing them in the market, but have considered the matter and will set the land themselves.

This tract is one of the most desirable pieces of fruit land in this locality. The situation and lay of the land is especially favorable to fruit culture, and when properly set and cultivated will be one of the best orchards in the entire Willamette valley. The land is just across the road from the famous T. A. Shafer orchard and will no doubt be peach orchard and will no doubt be as that of Mr. Shafer's.

Mr. Scarbrough is the pioneer and most extensive fruit raiser in this locality. His experience in horticulture covers a period of twenty years in this community, and he now has 170 acres of bearing fruit land and owns and operates two prune dryers. The new orchard will comprise commercial peaches, pears and apples and will add much to the present large output of fruit from Creswell.

## KIDDER WILL BUILD ROAD IF SURVEY AND RIGHT-OF-WAY SECURED

Stephen Carver's Proposition  
for Elmira Line Laid Over  
for the Time Being

At the called meeting of the Commercial Club last night to hear Stephen Carver on his railroad to Elmira proposition, it was announced that Civil Engineer Kidder of St. Paul, Minn., who recently went over the route surveyed by the Lane county survey, between Eugene and Florence, thence to Coos Bay, has assured the company that the permanent survey and right-of-way for the line from Eugene to Coos Bay is secured he is confident of obtaining the money with which to build the road. This sounded so good to the members of the Commercial Club assembled, that Mr. Carver's proposition was not so lightly considered, inasmuch as Mr. Carver will not guarantee that the line will go further than Elmira.

Mr. Carver, has been announced

before by The Guard, offers to build from Eugene to Elmira, for a bonus of \$40,000. He promises nothing further than that, although it is reasonable to assume that he would push the road further west, into the timber at least.

After considerable discussion and speeches by prominent citizens, Mr. Carver's proposition was laid over until Mr. Kidder is heard from.

## DIED

In Portland, Oct. 9, 1909, John E. Lancaster, aged 46 years, from appendicitis.

He recently returned with his wife from Los Angeles, and after spending a few days here, went to Portland to attend to some business connected with a townsite on the Deschutes river, and was taken sick. He was taken to the hospital for an operation for appendicitis, but never recovered from the shock.

The remains were brought to Eugene, and after a short service by Rev. O. C. Wright at Gordon's undertaking parlors, interment was made in the Masonic cemetery.

Marshall, of Eugene, and Charles of McMinnville, who arrived in Eugene yesterday afternoon to attend the funeral. He was born in Lane county, but the last ten years of his life were spent in the East, buying and selling stock in various parts of the country. He was in business at the time of his death he was in business for himself at Klamath Falls. He leaves many friends and relatives here. He was born April 28, 1878, and was a member of the Order of Red Men, which order will have charge of the funeral.

## OREGON WILL HAVE A THIRD CONGRESSMAN

One additional congressman at least will be gained by Oregon in the coming census, and it is quite possible that Multnomah county alone will be made the new district.

Portland now has more people than either the First or Second congressional district could hold of when the last census was taken in 1900. The population of Portland is now variously estimated at between 250,000 and 300,000, whereas in 1900 the Second district had but 220,607 and the First district 192,924, the census for the state of Oregon then showing 413,536.

At present 190,000 people are entitled to a congressman. It is supposed, however, that the ratio of representation will be changed as a result of the coming census, but whether the ratio is increased 25 per cent or remains as at present, Oregon will have one more congressman and perhaps two. Only the most enthusiastic politicians look for two additional representatives.

There is a suggestion that the new district be formed of Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop counties, but as Multnomah will have more than enough for a congressman, this self-sufficient district in itself would satisfy Eastern Oregon, as it would eliminate the possibility of Eastern Oregon congressional aspirants having to fight a Multnomah man for the nomination at every election. Making Multnomah county a congressional district would throw the fight into this country, while the two outside districts could look after their own affairs.—Telegram.

## WATER PLANT MAKING MONEY FOR THE CITY

The report of Superintendent Taylor, of the Eugene water department, for the month of September, shows a good profit over the expenses of the department, setting at rest all doubts as to whether or not the system is making money for the city. The report is as follows:

Pumped during the month, 38,050,000 gallons; average daily 1,268,333 gallons. Expenses—salaries, \$380; office incidentals, \$5.55; electric power, \$781; oil and waste, \$7.50; total \$1174.05. Collections during the month were \$2,143.73, leaving a net profit of \$969.68 for the month.
