L. G. ADAIR, OLD-TIME DEPOT AGENT, DIES

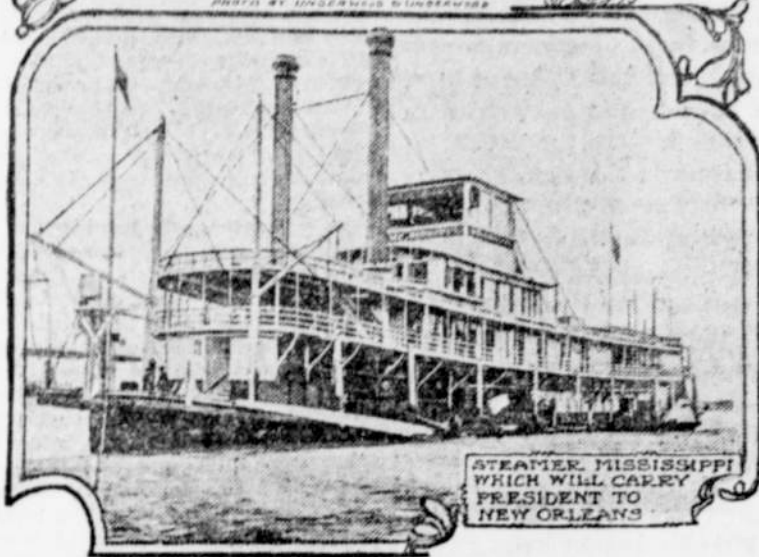
L. G. Adair, who for 29 successive years was station agent for the Southern Pacific company in Eugene, died at his home at the corner of East Seventh and Oak streets in this city Sunday at 11 a. m. after a lingering illness.

He was born in Indiana in 1840, and had lived till next Thursday he would have been 69 years old. He entered the railroad service in Indiana in early life and in 1867 was married at Richmond to Miss Sarah E. Clawson, who still survives him. They came to Oregon in 1873, first settling at Salem. They came to Eugene in 1877 and have lived here since. Mr. Adair at that time taking the position as agent for the Southern Pacific company, continuing until 1906, when he was compelled to resign on account of his poor health. He served the railroad company well and faithfully and won many friends during his work here. He will be sadly missed by the community.

Mr. Adair was a man of sterling integrity and honesty was his watchword all through life. He was a good citizen and a true Christian.

The funeral will be held at the family home tomorrow at 11 o'clock and the remains will be removed to Salem for interment. Those who wish to view the remains may do so between the hours of 9 and 11 o'clock tomorrow forenoon. Rev. H. N. Mount, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will conduct the services here and Rev. Mr. Knight at Salem.

PRESIDENT TAFT AND STEAMBOAT ON WHICH HE WILL DESCEND THE MISSISSIPPI.

President Taft will begin his trip down the Mississippi river from St. Louis to New Orleans on Oct. 25. He will stop at Cape Girardeau, Mo.; Cairo, Ill.; Memphis, Natchez, Vicksburg and other points and will make speeches at most of these places. The residents of the Mississippi valley have an object in showing the president the great inland waterway, for they realize that when the Panama canal is completed the Mississippi is to be the great outlet for the commerce originating between the river and the Rocky mountains, and they want it improved.

PRESIDENT TAFT STARTS DOWN THE MISSISSIPPI THIS EVENING

St. Louis, Oct. 25.—President Taft devoted his time today between two cities, giving St. Louis eight hours and East St. Louis an hour and a half. He arrived here this morning at eight o'clock on the Iron Mountain railroad from Texas, and prepared to leave this evening on a 1200 mile voyage down the Mississippi to New Orleans.

After greeting the reception committee of the commercial club at the station, the president was driven in a motor car to the St. Louis club, along a route guarded by police and through crowds of thousands of people. After breakfast he was driven to the Coliseum where he spoke. His ride through the streets was the occasion for another continual ovation.

After the delivery of his speech, the president was escorted to the Planters Hotel for a lunch attended by nine hundred business men. At 3:30 the president is scheduled to visit East St. Louis to meet Vice President Sherman and Speaker Cannon. While at East St. Louis, he is expected to lay the cornerstone of the new United States building, and return to St. Louis to embark at 5 o'clock for New Orleans.

The president in his speech at the St. Louis club referred to the trip to the isthmus of Panama made by that club and of the great service it had done its country by its report of its inspection.

The president declared his stand in favor of a bond issue for carrying out approved waterways improvement projects did not mean the opening of the pork barrel to send back to any particular member of congress, or make any particular section of the country prosperous during the expenditure of money. He said he was opposed to a gold bond issue for five hundred millions or a billion dollars to be parcelled out to different sections. His idea is a bond issue sufficient to carry out quickly such projects as may be approved after a careful investigation.

JUDGE BURNETT UPHOLDS STATE RAILROAD LAW

Albany, Or., Oct. 25.—Judge Burnett, of the state circuit court, today overruled the demurrer of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad to the complaint filed against the road by the state of Oregon to compel payment of the \$10,000 penalty for not obeying the order of the commission to build a depot at Lyons, Linn county.

The railroad set up in its demurrer the contention that the law is unconstitutional in that the legislature did not have the power to delegate the authority to impose penalties upon the state commission. Although the case will be carried to the supreme court, it is considered important as it is the first time any court has ruled on the question.

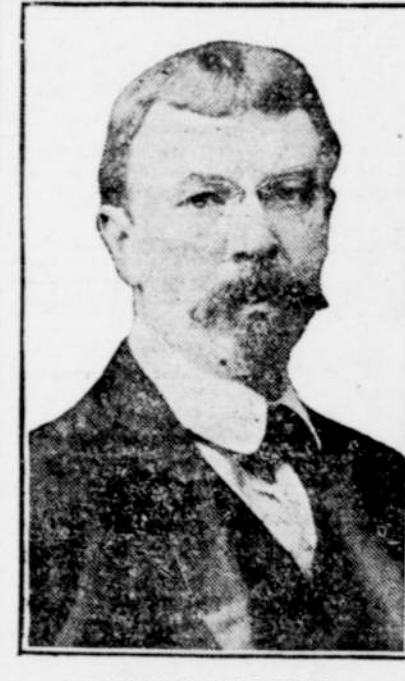
CRESWELL RAILROAD DEPOT IS ROBBED

GREAT STORM REPORTED IN BERING SEA

Nome, Oct. 26.—A furious storm is raging in the Bering sea. The whaler Olga, of San Francisco, has been wrecked, and several small coasters washed ashore. The steamer Senator, with eight passengers and a crew of 68, was unable to land at Nome and has taken shelter behind Sledge Island, eight miles away.

Liner Is Wrecked
St. John, N. B., Oct. 26.—A large steamer, answering the description of the Donaldson liner Hestia, from Glasgow, October 9, to St. John and Baltimore, is ashore on Old Proprietor ledge, off Seal Cove, Grand Manan. There is no sign of the crew and the vessel is virtually submerged. A lifeboat is on its way to the steamer.

MEXICAN CITY INUNDATED BY A GREAT TIDAL WAVE

Mexico City, Oct. 26.—The town of Santa Rosa, state of Tabasco, was inundated by a tidal wave last night. The loss of life is not known, but is believed to be large.

The property loss is estimated at \$5,000,000.

For a time the streets and public gardens were flooded with three feet of water, and trees were uprooted and crops washed out.
