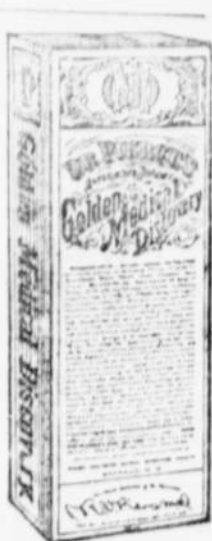

C. E. GEORGE MAN OF MUCH NOTORIETY

Chas. E. George, the Tacoma lawyer, mentioned in yesterday's Guard as being in Eugene, has gained a lot of notoriety in Tacoma and Seattle and the papers of those cities are devoting columns of their space to him and his wife, together with his wife's former husband, George left yesterday morning for Southern Oregon, telling H. Chezem, the real estate dealer, that he would return to Eugene in a few days. A press dispatch gives the following story:

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 12.—Publica-

tion of the fact that C. E. George, attorney, publisher, high class criminal lawyer, and defender of the "radical" philosopher, Joshua Klein, is in Eugene, Or., after it had been given out that he was hastening east to the rescue of Harry K. Thaw, will serve to accentuate interest in a career that for rapid and spectacular features justifies the word "meteoric."

George arrived in Tacoma last week after a year ago, and took an active part in the national campaign through the state on behalf of the democrats. Defended Joshua Klein. Later he appeared in the defense of "Joshua" Klein, and gained additional fame. Following the trial he was married in New Westminster, B. C. to Mrs. Albertine Janson, of Seattle, a divorcee, who had been a constant attendant at the Klein trial. Shortly after this marriage suit for the annulment of the marriage was instituted by a woman styling herself Ida L. Austrian George, who showed a marriage certificate that she had wedded George in Montreal in September, 1908. Later May E. Ritter George appeared and showed that her marriage to George in Chicago in 1898 had not been annulled in September, 1908. Then Dr. Elvira Janson, former husband of Mrs. Janson George, started a suit for annulment of his 11-year-old son, alleging George to be an improper person for his son to associate with.

It developed that George had a criminal record, having served five days of a sentence for defrauding a client, in the state prison at Joliet, Ill., before being pardoned by Governor Tanner; and having also "done time" in the Milwaukee house of correction. Mrs. Janson George is now suing George for annulment of their marriage, on the basis of these facts.

George left Tuesday, ostensibly for New York, his partner stating that he had been employed in the Thaw case.

Some months ago George started a monthly publication known as "Lawyer and Banker," which has met with considerable success.

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 15.—Mrs. Jansen-George, the latest wife of Attorney Charles E. George, whose marital troubles have been the sensation of Western Washington for the past month, and Mrs. Edmund James Hunter, of Victoria, B. C., the alleged soul-mate whom George is reported to have said is the only woman he ever really loved, and who expects to wed the attorney when he is legally freed of entanglements, met in Tacoma today in the office of the missing attorney's partner, A. H. Garretson.

The women eyed each other, then clasped hands. Both were visibly affected. The women came to Tacoma to try and learn the whereabouts of George, but Mr. Garretson was unable to enlighten them, although he reported that George was in Eugene, Or., yesterday. Mrs. Jansen-George apparently believed that Mrs. Hunter knew George's place of hiding. She did not know. She wished she did, she said.

Mrs. Hunter expressed her regret at the predicament into which Mrs. Jansen-George had drifted. She was sorry, but declared that George loved her best—in fact, had told her that she was the only woman he ever

really loved, and that she was the one woman who might have made a better man of him, and she did not think it too late to save him.

She did not hesitate to tell Mrs. Jansen-George that she believed George loved her, and that she in return loved George. She was sorry for Mrs. Jansen-George. Mrs. George said she was sorry for Mrs. Hunter.

George left Eugene Friday for Southern Oregon. He told H. Chezem, the real estate dealer, that he was looking after a real estate proposition. He said he would be back to Eugene in a few days.

SIUSLAW CLUB HOLDS MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the Siuslaw River Improvement Club was held Monday evening.

Among other matters brought up there was a set of resolutions favoring the proposed change in North Fork road above the portage, and urging the county court to grant the proposed change and to have a bridge built across the North Fork on the line of the new road. The resolutions were adopted unanimously.

While these resolutions were under consideration, a letter from Jared Scott was read opposing such a change in the road and setting forth his reasons for opposing it.

The need of a bridge across North Fork on the Mapleton-Florence road, and of a bridge across the marsh in Aene was brought up and on motion W. H. Weatherston, Charles R. David and W. R. Hollenbeck were appointed a committee to correspond with the county court with a view of having the bridge built next summer.—Florence West.

HUNDREDS OF MINERS ARE VICTIMS

Explosion in Illinois Mine Is Followed by Prolonged Loss of Life

Spring Valley, Ill., Nov. 13.—An unknown number of miners, estimated at 450, are dead—literally roasted alive—some hundred feet under the earth as the result of a fire in the second vein of a coal mine at Cherry, Ill., seven miles from Spring Valley, late this afternoon. Men escaped with their lives to tell horrible stories of the scenes they witnessed below the earth's surface.

Rescuers Perish.

Tonight 12 volunteers got into a cage and were lowered into the mine in the hope of rescuing the entombed men. Fifteen minutes later the cage was drawn to the surface with 12 dead bodies, horribly charred and twisted by heat were found in a little heap on the floor of the cage. The exact number of men entombed is not known, but it is roughly estimated at 450.

The mine usually employs 500 and about this number went down in the cage early this morning. Only 50 are known to have been recovered. It was reported late tonight that 200 more had been taken out leaving only 250 still in the mine. The fire has not been confirmed. The fire was caused by an explosion of mine dust in the lower levels at 4 p. m.

The first that was known of it was when there was a deafening explosion and a column of fire and smoke shot out of the mine shaft. The cage was instantly lowered and a moment later it was pulled back full of miners, who staggered to the ground as it reached the surface and grasped the story of the scenes of horror they had witnessed below.

Before they could tell their story again, each time bringing up its burden of blackened and weakened men. Finally there was no signal from below to drag the cage up, and then it came up empty.

Explosion Is Cause.

Then the survivors told the story while the physicians attended them. They said all the men were at work at 3 o'clock when there was a terrific report, and almost in an instant the whole mine was filled with flames. They seemed to go everywhere and it was impossible to escape the terrible heat, the men said. There was a deafening roar, and when the cage came down the living men fought with each other to clamber in. All of them were blackened and burned with coal dust, and the bodies of some of them were horribly burned.

Brave Sacrifice.

Volunteers were called for to attempt to rescue the entombed men. Art Lewis, of Ladd, Ill., was the first to respond and within a minute 11 more men stood at his side. They got into the cage and it was sent down into the mine. The men waited for a few minutes—long enough to hear from the party—and when no signal was received the cage was drawn up again. The 12 rescuers were all dead. Their faces were burned and the crust were still smoking when the cage reached the surface.

Cherry, Ill., Nov. 14.—Nearly 400 men and boys, it is now believed, are now dead or perishing in the St. Paul mine, though experts who succeeded in penetrating to the smoke-filled shaft to the depth of 300 feet late today returned with a ray of hope for the grief-stricken relatives of the entombed.

For more than 30 hours the prisoners have been cut off from fresh air. That life could exist under such conditions is doubted, but because no trace of high temperature was found in the depths of the mine tonight officials of the company hope that the victims may have found safety in remote recesses of the mine.

NINETY LIVES LOST

IN SHIPWRECK

Singapore, Nov. 14.—The mail steamer Laryne, of the Messageries maritime service, running between Java and Singapore, and on her way to this port, collided early this morning with the steamer Onda of the British India line, and sank two minutes later.

Several European passengers, including Baron and Baroness Becken, the captain of the Laryne, five European officers and 88 others, comprising native passengers and members of the crew, were drowned.

The rescue of 61 passengers, practically from the jaws of sharks, formed a thrilling incident of the wreck.

Christie, a grain buyer of the little town of Rudolph, Mrs. Christie, Mildred Christie, and Michael Ronayne, a young man employed by the Christies. Robbery was the motive of the quadruple murder.

MRS. MADDOX IS ACQUITTED BY JURY

Portland, Or., Nov. 13.—Mrs. Hazel Maddox has been exonerated from any guilt in connection with the death of Mrs. Clara May Real, who was run down and killed by two joy riders in a touring car the night of August 5.

After deliberating for 35 minutes yesterday afternoon the jury that heard the evidence in the case reported to Judge Cleland that it had agreed upon a verdict. Foreman J. C. McGraw handed in the verdict, as Clerk Theo. S. Wells read the words, "Not Guilty," there were suppressed exclamations of joy from a group of friends of the defendant.

Mrs. Maddox was commanded to stand while the verdict was read. When the moment of suspense was over a broad smile spread over her face and a few moments later she pressed forward with her husband to thank the members of the jury.
