

FIEND KILLS HUSBAND, WIFE AND CHILD

Frontenac, Kas., Nov. 27.—On a lonely road a mile north of here occurred a triple murder and an assault upon a woman last night. The dead are Mr. and Mrs. William Bork, Germans, of Frontenac, and their infant son. The attack upon Mrs. Bork is supposed to have been the motive of the crime, and the husband was presumably killed while trying to defend his wife.

Mr. and Mrs. Bork and child were last seen alive last night, when they started to drive home from Frontenac from the home of Mrs. Bork's mother, at a point two miles in the country. Today the horse and buggy were found standing in the roadway at a deserted spot. In the bottom of the buggy was the infant child shot through the head.

The searchers found the body of Bork lying in the middle of the road some distance away, shot through the head once, and twice through the body. A trail through the dust led the searchers to a field about a hundred feet away, where they found the body of the woman. An assault had been committed on her and she had then been shot through the heart. The woman had fought desperately with her assailant. Blood hounds have been sent to the scene.

ROAD CASE IS FINALLY SETTLED IN SUPREME COURT

A road case that has been in the courts for a long time and in which D. E. Yoran, J. W. Kays and David Llan, Eugene merchants, have been the appellants each time it has been appealed, has finally been decided by the supreme court against them.

The case was started in the Justice court, S. A. Sage and Ella V. Neal attempted to open a public road through a piece of land owned by Messrs. Yoran, Kays and Llan south of the city. They wanted damages of the city. The latter asked damages about \$100. The case was appealed to the circuit court and the jury awarded them even less. Then the supreme court was resorted to with the result that the judgment of the circuit court is affirmed. The mandate was received from Salem this morning.

REPORTS OF DAMAGE DONE BY HIGH WATER ARE STILL COMING IN

Loss to P. E. & E. Track Greater Than At First Thought—First Mail From Siuslaw

Dr. P. J. Bartle, while on a trip to the country in the vicinity of Irving yesterday, found many culverts and small bridges washed out, and the roads in bad shape. He says the water from the Willamette river cut across the country and flooded the streets of Irving, which is two miles from the river.

The first mail from the lower Siuslaw since the high water was received at the Eugene postoffice last night. The sacks were carried on foot over parts of the road where bridges have washed out. The stages will not be able to make the through trip before some time next week.

J. E. P. Withers returned yesterday from Coburg, where he was marooned by the high water since Saturday. He says the wagon bridge across the McKenzie was rendered unsafe by the flood, but it is still open to travel. Some of the county agents in the vicinity of the Bogart place, between Eugene and Coburg, was washed out.

Foreman Utterback, of the construction force of the P. E. & E. railway, said this morning that the flood did greater damage to the company's trestle along the bottom west of Springfield than he first thought. "As good as eight bends of the trestle went out," he said, "and it will take a long time to repair the damage." He also said that a great hole was washed in the ground beneath the southern Pacific trestle between the river and Coburg road, and the piling was all but washed away.

NAT GOODWIN BACK TO STAGE

Chicago, Nov. 26.—"You cannot beat the Wall Street game. The curb brokers have got you, coming and going. I do not care what property is worth, all they want to know is what they can get out of you or the public for stock. If you do not do as they want you to, they will put prices down so low that you will be ruined."

This was the statement made here today by Nat Goodwin, the actor, who, with his wife, is enroute to his Southern California home.

"I am going back on the stage," declared Goodwin, "and quit the oil and land business. I am not going to do this because I am broke or anything like that. I do not like the game. The curb brokers hammer the prices down and everybody thinks that you are crooked."

SENATOR CLARK NO FRIEND OF COMBINES

New York, Nov. 26.—Ex-Senator Clark of Montana returned from Europe today and declared socialism was spreading in England more rapidly than ever before. He declared the entire country was wrought up over the budget fight.

When asked about market conditions here, Clark said he thought 13 cents was too low for copper.

In reply to a question as to what he thought of the decision ordering a dissolution of the Standard Oil Co., he said:

"I never believed in combinations. I have always worked on the individual basis, myself."

HEROIC STATESMAN AND GRANSON REST IN THE SAME GRAVE

Butler, Mo., Nov. 26.—Hundreds of prominent men of Missouri and many outside states joined the citizens of Butler today in paying respects to the memory of the late Representative David L. Atchard, who met a tragic death Tuesday in the vain effort to save the life of his favorite grandson. The bodies of both victims were buried in the local cemetery in one casket, following a simple service at the Methodist Episcopal church.

HOWARD LITTLE GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

Richmond, Va., Nov. 27.—Howard Little, charged with the murder of Mrs. Betty Justis, George Meadows, his wife, and three members of his family, was found guilty in the first degree today. He will be electrocuted at Richmond January 7.

FIVE KILLED, FIVE INJURED IN AUTO WRECK

Los Angeles, Nov. 26.—Five members of one family are dead, two near death in the hospital and three have slight injuries as a result of an automobile accident last night. When the Los Angeles and Santa Fe Electric car, running a mile a minute, struck the auto of Nicholas Jacobs, containing the Jacobs family of ten and Josephine Solan, affianced to one of Jacobs' sons, in a suburb of the city, Mr. Jacobs, his two daughters, Katie and Mamie, aged eighteen and sixteen, aged six and four years, were instantly killed. Mrs. Jacobs and infant daughter, Cecilia, aged two months, were seriously and perhaps fatally hurt.

Mrs. Jacobs has not been told of the death of her husband and four children, and from her hospital cot are heard cries for her infant, and piteously begging for news of her other children.

On the way from the scene of the wreck the trolley car, bearing the injured, ran into another trolley car and ten persons were injured but not seriously. Two other persons were also injured as a result of the auto accident. They were driving a horse near the scene and when the collision occurred the horse ran away, throwing two of them out.

PLANING MILL HAND SHOT BY THE FOREMAN

E. G. Hurst, who up to yesterday afternoon was an employee at the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company's planing mill at Wendling, was shot in the chest and the left hand yesterday afternoon by Al Seekatz, foreman of the mill, but the injuries are not serious.

The trouble arose over Seekatz discharging Hurst from the mill. According to the story received at the offices of Sheriff Hosen and Deputy District Attorney Skipworth today, Hurst and another employee of the mill named Wright had some trouble between themselves, and Wright told the foreman a lot of things about Hurst, reflecting on his character. Seekatz, believing Hurst to be a bad man, discharged him yesterday afternoon, whereupon Hurst knocked the foreman down. Seekatz, who was armed with a revolver, pulled the weapon from his pocket and began firing at Hurst, the first shot striking him on the right arm, and the second shot grazing his left hand. Another shot went through the coat of a bystander, but did not injure him. There was great excitement at Wendling at the time, and there was a report in Eugene that the man who was shot had been killed. The foreman and had Dr. Kuykendall dress the wounds, which are pronounced not serious.

No complaint has yet been sworn out against Seekatz, and Deputy District Attorney Skipworth states this afternoon that he did not know whether there would be one or not.

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FOURTEEN LIVES LOST WHEN LITTLE STEAMER ARGO STRUCK ROCKS OFF TILLAMOOK BAY

Tillamook, Or., Nov. 27.—The death roll of the little steamer Argo, which was stranded off Tillamook Bay late yesterday, has undoubtedly been increased to fourteen. Following the three deaths recorded last night came the news today that the lifeboat containing Captain Snyder and ten other persons has been lost. Another lifeboat containing Mate Johnson and nine others was saved by the schooner Oskosk, which put to sea last night from Astoria to locate the stranded Argo and render her assistance. The three persons drowned last night were Mrs. N. A. Oldig, Nellie Hunter, a young girl, and Henry Wickman, a member of the life-saving crew from the Garabaldi beach station. Nellie Hunter was the child of George Hunter, of Napa, Cal.

The Argo showed indications of turning turtle last night, and Captain Snyder ordered all on board to take to the boats. Mate Johnson commanded one boat and Captain Snyder commanded the other. The two boats became separated in the mist and rough seas. Mate Johnson's boat cruised around and was picked up by the Oskosk, which had been beating up and down the coast in the vicinity of Tillamook bay in an effort to locate the disabled Argo. It is believed that Captain Snyder tried to make the shore with his boat, and that in the effort the boat was overturned, as no signs of it were seen today, although the Oskosk men patrolled up and down the coast all night in the search for the missing boat.

The known dead are: Nellie Hunter, aged six, a passenger; Mrs. L. A. Holdrege of Portland, a passenger; Henry Wickman, a member of the life saving crew.

THE MISSING

Captain Levi Snyder, chief engineer, J. H. Snyder, purser, W. A. Stinson, A. Macklenberg, sailor; A. Leslie, sailor; Graves, steward; Thomas Russell, assistant engineer; Tony Delborte, passenger; an unnamed passenger who boarded Argo at Astoria; and two unnamed others, members of the crew. The last seen of Captain Snyder's life boat was when her crew began pulling toward the shore. A gale was blowing and a terrific sea was running, making navigation of the boat most hazardous.

The rescued are: Mate J. A. Johnson, L. A. Holdrege of Portland, a passenger; W. C. King, a passenger; George Hunter, passenger; Hooland the negro cook; Howard Wolfe, A. E. Millard, E. Salmonson and two Scandinavians, members of the crew, whose names could not be learned.

A high wind and heavy sea drove the Argo out of the narrow channel as she was attempting to cross into Tillamook Bay. She struck on the South Spit, but in a short time managed to work her way off.

A few moments later the Argo struck again. This time it was on the bar proper, where she hung. Distress signals were displayed and the Garabaldi life-saving crew put out a lifeboat to the Argo's relief. The seas meanwhile breaking high over the stranded vessel and threatening to wash those on board into the sea.

After a tremendous struggle the life saving crew succeeded in forcing their boat through the breakers to the wreck. Into the lifeboat were loaded Mrs. W. C. King, who with her husband was returning home from the coast, two small girls of the crew, George Hunter of Tillamook, who was coming home from a visit at Astoria, and a woman who has not been identified.
