

THIRTY MILLIONS FOR COMPLETION OF OLD PROJECTS

Washington, Jan. 4.—In the special message on conservation which President Taft will send to congress Monday, a loan of thirty million dollars to complete existing reclamation projects will be suggested. Western senators who have visited Taft in the last few days have been given to understand that such a loan will be recommended. The loan will probably be floated in short term bonds or certificates of indebtedness.

RAILROAD MAN

IS NOT SCARED

New York, Jan. 4.—"I know pretty well what the bill will provide and I can say it need not alarm any investor or nor embarrass any railroad that wants to do business in a straightforward and orderly manner," declared W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central lines, today. Brown was one of six railroad presidents who conferred with President Taft yesterday on railroad legislation, which the president will recommend to congress next week in a message on interstate commerce.

BOY'S HEAD NEARLY SHOT OFF BUT HE LIVES

Clay Babb, the ten-year-old son of Mrs. Louise Young, who resides near the river several miles north of the city, lies near the point of death at the general hospital, as a result of the accidental discharge of his shotgun while hunting Saturday.

The boy was out in a field near his home with his younger brother. He had seen a goose not far distant, and was in the act of slipping up on the bird when he came to a log which he started to climb over. He suddenly slipped, the gun dropped out of his hands and was discharged, the full load of shot tearing through his right hand and striking him on the chin, tearing away a greater portion of his jaw, some of the shot coming out at his nose.

MRS. S. P. SLADDEN DIES IN IOWA

Well-Known Former Eugene Resident Passed Away Saturday Night in East

Rev. P. K. Hammond, rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church of this city, received a telegram today from Webster City, Iowa, informing him of the death of Mrs. Harriet Sladden, widow of the late S. P. Sladden, in that city Saturday night.

At the time of Mr. Sladden's death less than a year ago, Mrs. Sladden was in poor health and from that time on she continued to decline until death relieved her of all suffering.

Mr. and Mrs. Sladden were the owners of the Sladden farm in the northwestern part of the city, the most of which was divided into city lots several years ago, and a large part of it built up. They came to Eugene during the eighties, and were considered among the city's wealthiest people.

Mrs. Sladden's host of friends here will hear of her death with great pain. She was prominent in society circles, and entertained very much during her last few years of residence here.

BANKER EAKIN HOME HOME AGAIN AFTER LONG VACATION TRIP

Hon. S. B. Eakin, vice president of the First National Bank, returned home New Year's day from an extended trip, having been absent for three months. He visited the principal cities of the East and South, and enjoyed his vacation greatly, so he says.

Mr. Eakin spent about a month with relatives at Chicago Heights and visited the big city daily, taking in the sights and seeing the many attractions there, and afterward visited Niagara Falls, New York City, Washington, New Orleans and other cities. The last month was spent in Los Angeles, where he was met by Mrs. Eakin, who returned home with him. Mr. Eakin enjoyed a real vacation on the trip, having no time limit or business affairs to hamper him, and no set program mapped out to follow. Relatives at several places in the East made his stay especially enjoyable by providing a round of entertainment and sight-seeing.

CURTISS ENJOINED FROM MAKING AND SELLING AEROPLANES

Buffalo, Jan. 3.—Judge Hazel, in the federal court today, granted the preliminary injunction asked by the Wright Brothers against the Herring-Curtiss Company and Glenn H. Curtiss, restraining them from manufacturing and selling aeroplanes.

AGED WOMAN KILLS MAN IN PISTOL DUEL

Dresden, Tenn., Jan. 3.—Clarence Carney faced his 65-year-old mother-in-law in a revolver duel last night and was killed. The mother-in-law, Mrs. Sarah Griffith, had met Carney in the front yard of a neighbor to discuss a quarrel of long standing. The discussion became heated, revolvers flashed and Carney fired three times at the aged woman. One bullet struck her in the hip, but she stood her ground, firing five times before Carney fell dead.

About a year ago Carney's wife committed suicide by taking carbolic acid.

DR. COOK'S BROTHER IS POSITIVE EXPLORER CAN PROVE TRUTH OF HIS POLE CLAIM

New York, Jan. 3.—William L. Cook, brother of Dr. Frederick A. Cook, declared today that Mrs. Cook has joined her husband and that he is in communication with them. Mrs. Cook is asserted to have the explorer's original records of his North Pole quest in her possession.

"Dr. Cook has by no means abandoned his intention to prove conclusively, despite the verdict of the Copenhagen University, that he reached the North Pole," said his brother, "and his detractors will have a pretty bill to pay. The talk that Mrs. Cook is estranged from the doctor, that she contemplates a suit for separation, with a large alimony, is unwarranted. Mrs. Cook is standing by her husband, and will continue to do so. Just now she is of immeasurable comfort to him, and together they are planning and working for the future. I have positive information that Dr. Cook and wife will publicly appear together, and that then there will be a great change of feeling. It may be only a few weeks and it may be months before they appear publicly together again. That all depends on how long it requires Dr. Cook to fully substantiate his claims."

Mr. Cook declined to say whether Dr. and Mrs. Cook were in this country or abroad.

RAILROAD MEN CONFER WITH TAFT OVER MESSAGE

Washington, Jan. 3.—President Taft had an extended conference today with the presidents of the six big railways of the country, who has requested a hearing with him before his special message, dealing with the interstate commerce law amendments, should be sent to congress. The railroad men came to present their views regarding various phases of the proposed recommendations, as they have gleaned them from the speeches of Taft, made from time to time.

Those attending the conference were Attorney-General Wickersham, President Mellen, of the New York, New Haven & Hartford; President McCrae, of the Pennsylvania; President Lovett, of the Union Pacific and allied Harriman lines; President Baer, of the Philadelphia & Reading; President Finley, of the Southern Railway, and President Brown, of the New York Central.

Washington, Jan. 3.—One of the recommendations which it is believed the president will make to congress will prevent any interstate railway company from acquiring stock in a competing railroad and will fix the time limit within which railroads now holding such stock shall dispose of it. The president, it is said, will recommend that no railroad company engaged in interstate commerce shall issue additional stocks or bonds or other obligations, except with the approval of the interstate commerce commission, based upon a finding by the commission that the same are issued. First, for a purpose authorized by law, and second, for a price not less than par for the stock, and not less than reasonable value for the bonds, such price being paid, either in cash or in property, or in services; if in property or services, then at a fair value, as determined by the commission. These are amendments to which the railroad presidents are said to have most strenuously objected.

JOHN D., JR., IS FOREMAN OF JURY

New York, Jan. 3.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was today sworn as foreman of the grand jury, the special mission of which will be the investigation of the so-called "white slave" traffic. Rockefeller sought to be excused on account of health and pressure of business, but upon Judge O'Sullivan reminding him of his duty to the community he withdrew his excuse and was sworn in as foreman.

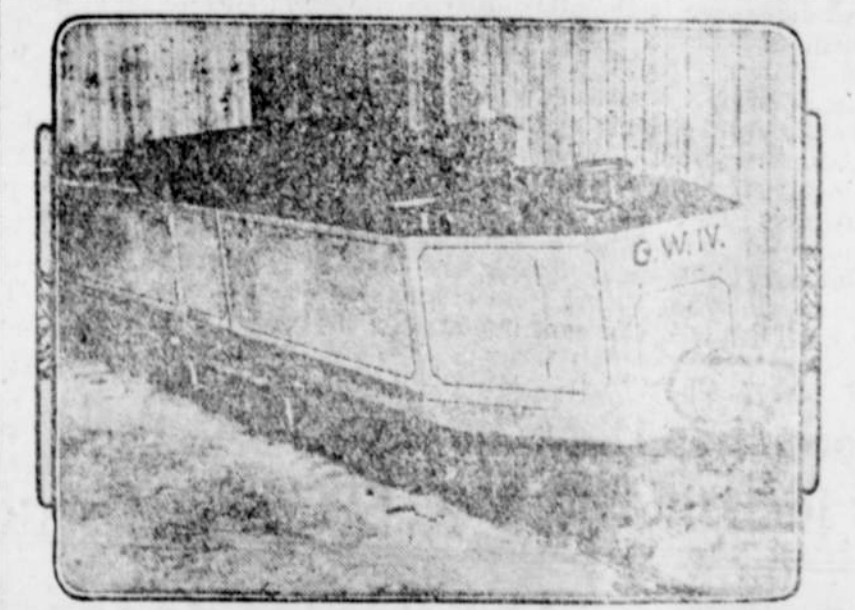

MRS. MARGARET CURRIN, PIONEER OF '53, DIES

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 3.—Mrs. Margaret Currin, aged 91, died at the home of her son Felix Currin four miles east of town Saturday, after an illness of three weeks. She was a pioneer of Oregon, having crossed the plains by ox-team from Missouri in 1853 with a husband, John Currin, who died two years ago. The trip consumed several months. She resided continuously on the farm where she died for 56 years and was active up to her last illness. Of her seven children, only one survives.

GERMAN GYROSCOPE CAR NOW IN UNITED STATES.

Emil Facke, Emil Sussermann and a force of ten engineers have arrived in this country, bringing with them the German gyroscopic motor car which August Scherr, proprietor of the daily Berlin newspaper Lokal Anzeiger, has sent to this country for exhibition. The car is not as large as the one used for demonstration by Louis Brennan in England, but the motorizing system is the same. It is twenty feet long and four feet wide and is capable of carrying ten persons. The gyroscopic motor at the rate of 8000 revolutions a minute. It is run by an independent motor. The exhibition car can attain a speed of thirty-five miles an hour.

FROM PALACE TO POOR HOUSE IS HER FATE

New Orleans, Jan. 3.—From a palace where she presided as the first lady of the land to the almshouse, such is the fate that has overtaken Senora Alaguer Barrios, wife of the former president of Guatemala. With almost the complete impairment of her vision, without means to earn her livelihood, Senora Barrios knocked for admittance to the almshouse here on New Year's day. Her husband, José María Barrios, was assassinated a short time after ascending to the presidency, and his widow went to Europe, where her fortune was dissipated by the mismanagement of those who had charge of it, she asserts. For several months she has lived obscurely in New Orleans.

BROWN RETIRES FROM PRESIDENCY OF EUGENE LOAN AND SAVINGS

After Fourteen Years' Service At Head of Institution Retires From Active Life

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Eugene Loan and Savings bank Saturday afternoon W. E. Brown, who has been president of the institution for the past fourteen years, resigned and will hereafter lead a retired life, although being financially interested in the bank. He retires on account of poor health and advanced age. He quits the office of president with the utmost good feeling and has the good will of the stockholders and patrons at large.

Dr. D. A. Faine was elected to fill the position as president and E. K. Wheeler was chosen vice president. F. W. Osburn was re-elected cashier, and W. W. Brown will continue to act in the capacity of assistant cashier.

Before the election of officers the stockholders elected the following directors: D. A. Faine, F. W. Osburn, E. K. Wheeler, Stephen Smeed and E. W. Polders. E. K. Wheeler, the new vice-president, while he has lived here for a long time, is not generally known to the people of Lane county. He is one of the county's solidest men and was in the drug business here with F. M. Williams from 1884 to 1888. He attended the University of Oregon in the early eighties.

The regular quarterly dividend of three per cent was declared at the meeting Saturday.

MRS. MORSE FIGHTS FOR CONVICT HUSBAND

New York, Jan. 3.—Mrs. Charles W. Morse, wife of the banker now in the federal prison at Atlanta, announces she will make a fight to release her husband. She says a crying injustice has been done, and refuses to believe he will be compelled to serve out his 15-year sentence.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 3.—Morse arrived here today from New York and was taken to the federal prison, where the usual formalities were followed by the exchange of his business suit for the striped prison garb.

JUDGE JOHN O. BOOTH TAKEN SUDDENLY ILL

Judge J. O. Booth was taken suddenly and alarmingly ill at his home, the Western hotel, on Monday evening. Between 10 and 11 o'clock Monday evening he was found in an unconscious condition in the bath room, and it was not until the evening of the following day that he fully regained consciousness. It is believed that ptomaine poisoning was the cause of the sudden attack and at the present time he is much improved in health. R. A. Booth, the judge's brother, who lives at Eugene, was immediately notified and he came at once.—Rogue River Courier.

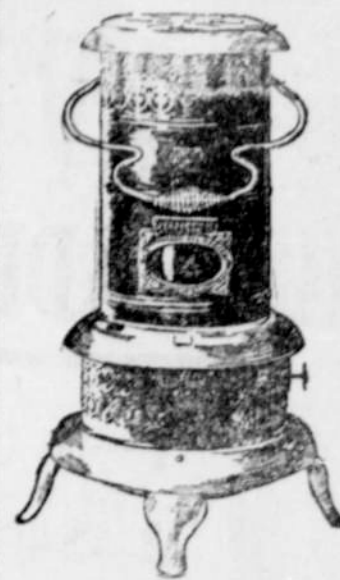
FIGHT BETWEEN MAN AND PET DEER
