PRITCHARD IS FINALLY SENT TO INSANE ASYLUM

(From Monday's Daily Guard.) Ernest Pritchard, the youth who has been accused of causing the several incendiary fires southwest of the city and of killing several horses and cows in the same neighborhood during the past few months, was arrested Saturday evening as he was entering the city with his parents, and was committed to the insane asylum this afternoon.

Arrested Through a Ruse.
Young Pritchard had wanted to go to Australia for some time past and has frequently importuned his father for money on which to go. Recently upon being refused, the youth shot one of his father's cows. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Pritchard, firmly believing that the boy is insane, decided to turn him over to the officers again. It being remembered that he was examined on the same charge a few weeks ago, in order that there would be no trouble in arresting him his father resorted to a ruse. He gave the young man \$200, telling him he could make his long-desired trip to Australia. He notified the sheriff and arranged to drive the boy into town and for the sheriff to meet him at a certain place. At the appointed time and place the officer appeared and placed the boy under arrest without any difficulty.

Parents Tell of Peculiarities.
Young Pritchard was examined this afternoon before County Judge Thompson by Drs. T. W. Harris and W. Kykendall. His mother and father were the principal witnesses. They testified to the boy's morose and ugly disposition and stated that he constantly carried a rifle with him and even slept with it. He appeared to think that someone was trying to poison him and asked his mother a number of times if there was poison in his coffee. They testified many acts of his that were very peculiar, yet in court he did not appear to be at all insane. He is a deserter from the army and is in constant fear of being arrested by the army officers.

After due deliberation, Judge Thompson committed the youth and he will be taken to Salem tomorrow.

Washington, Jan. 17.—"Most prices for food products out of all reason," said Cardinal Gibbons in an interview last evening, "and people cannot go on paying such prices when they are not earning any more than they were some years ago and when prices were not so high." Cardinal Gibbons is unable to assign the reason for the high prices that prevail, but he said: "Something is evidently wrong where many of the commonest necessities in food are priced at such enormous figures. Something must be done soon to put prices on a reasonable basis, and any method which will bring this about, I endorse."

The Eugene team was composed of Jesse Kellems, Harold Young and Harold Humbert; the Salem team, Alonzo Tyler, Clevie Simpkins and Joseph Bogynski. The decision was popular and as expected.

Before the debate the High school gym club gave a selection that was heartily enjoyed, followed by the E. H. S. orchestra under the direction of Mr. Yoran. The Eugene-Salem-Albany debate division is no better off in the final decision than it was a week ago, for last night's debates in the three cities resulted in a tie. Eugene won here and lost in Albany. Salem won at home and lost here. This means another debate and a delay in the final contest.

SPRING TRAINING BEGINS AT STATE UNIVERSITY

Second Interclass Track Meet To Be Held on February Twenty-Second

Spring training at the University begins next Monday, for the track athletic season of 1910, is the announcement of Bill Hayward, and on February 22, a second interclass track meet will be held. However, this date is not absolutely definite for weather conditions may change it and possibly the cross-country run between O. A. C. and the U. of O. may interfere.

That training begins Monday does not infer that there has been nothing doing in this line of athletics since the last meet in November, for nearly every afternoon has seen two, three, or perhaps five thinly-clad athletes on the covered track, and residents on Underly avenue or Alder street see daily the long swinging strides of the cross-country men. The cross-country course, whose distance, three and a half miles, is not excessive, has been used by all the track runners from the 220 men to half-mileers to lengthen their wind and put their muscles in shape that can be quickly developed.

Freshmen Will Help.
But what will be the rating of Oregon's track team this season? Will it be a winning team after the loss of four or five of her best men? It is pretty early yet to predict anything, but it can be said that the boys do look good. Upon the Freshmen class must it rely to fill up its ranks and they are there with Bob Kuykendall, who, at the high hurdles, has already broken the record held by his brother, famous all over the coast in college athletics. Briedwell, a Portland lad, can make himself known in the low hurdles and in Adam Kreiger is a man who in his first race this year, made the best senior 100-yard man hustle; Ersel Kay last year was the whole Salem track team and can be expected to make good in any event he tries. In McClure another Eugene boy, Hayward

thinks he has the start of the best mile man Oregon or the Northwest has ever seen. There are other Freshmen besides these who have won their laurels in High school work and can be developed by next year or perhaps this year into men who will not let Oregon meet defeat by any ordinary team.

These are just the freshmen part of the outlook for track athletics and there is nothing discouraging in the other classes. Oregon will have a well-rounded and balanced team ready for the first of the season, that will make the rest of the coast hustle.

The Cross Country Race.

The cross-country men are training hard for the try-out which will be held in a few weeks, for the O. A. C. meet. Corvallis is not so strong on distance men as she was a year or two ago, but she has one or two stars that are dangerous. McClure should get first place but the second is not so sure. There are differences of opinions as to the other places and it is not wise to count too much beforehand on any sport. Oregon, however, has no reason to lose this race as far as material and better runners are concerned.

It has not been decided whether the race will be run here or there, possibly here. If run at Corvallis their course will be shortened to the length of ours; their course is five miles long.
