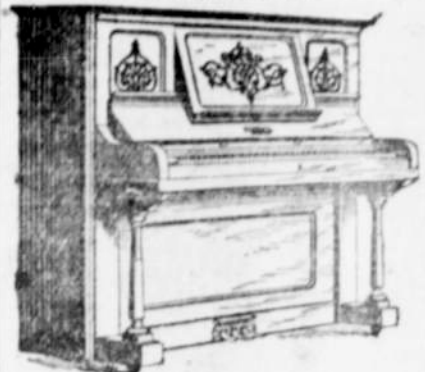

Industrious Forge Ahead.

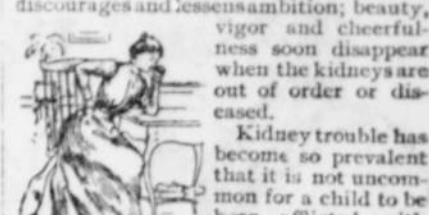
