CRESWELL NEWS.

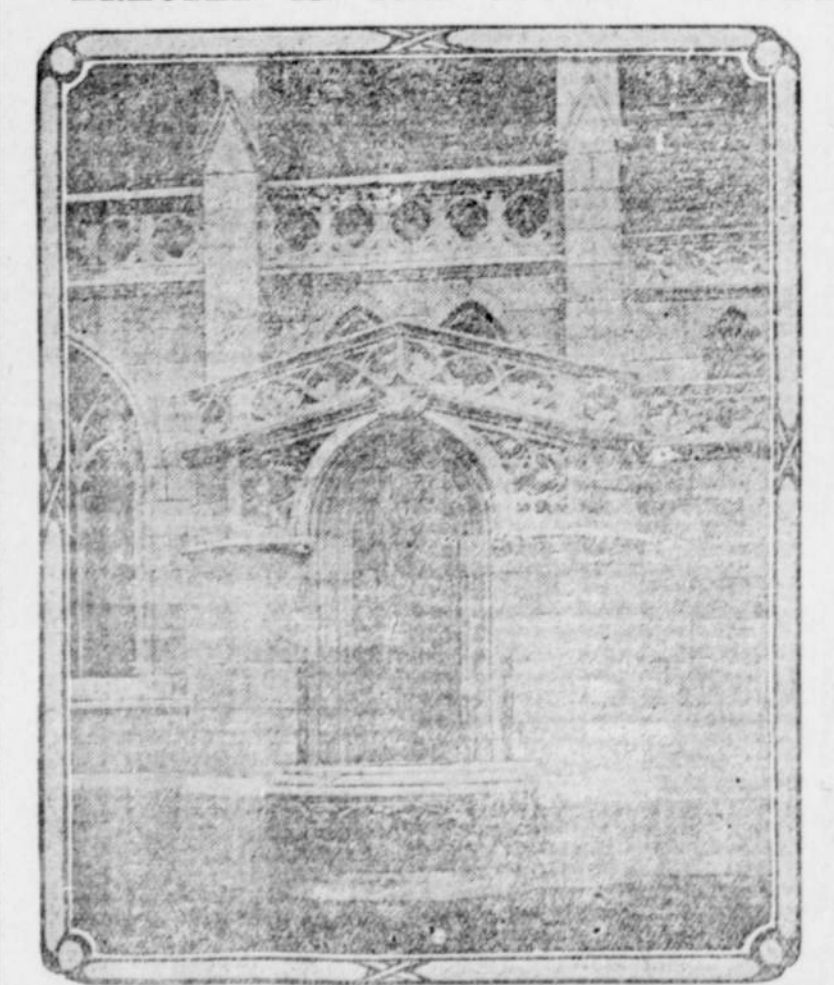

It is situated on the south side of the famous old Grace church, at Broadway and East Tenth street. The pulpit is a very beautiful structure of white marble.

FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, April 2.—The striped cotton madras cloths are likely to be used for early spring gowns. They come in half open work and a satin finish to the stripes. A new touch is added this year which puts them in the same class as the robe gowns.

On the bottom of the skirt portion is a knee-deep design all around which shows wide apart meanderings partly in braid work, with touches of satin stitch figures in vogue. There is showiness in this sprawling crudeness for skirt ornamentation. The model chosen for such a gown was a one-piece affair. The skirt comes up just a little above the waist line and the bodice has much the effect of a bolero. The embroidery is used to trim bands of the cloth about two inches wide being worked in a flowered design with dark blue floss. This is generously put on, and borders around the yoke, the cap of the sleeve, the cuffs, and also forms the half belt on either side. Especially graceful is the skirt gored at the hips so that it preserves slenderness of effect, and with its plaits brought in just about on a line with the knee in a panel. From the knee down is shown the bordered portion of the good fabric, a piece of net and motifs from the borders. The lower parts of the sleeve attach to the gimples.

Speaking of the gimples reminds one of the many seen in the shops, but women are learning that gimples should be a separate fitted affair. A fitted gimples gives much more grace and ease fastening over corset and well fitted to the lines of the neck and bust in security. There is a special art in fitting these accessories, including those becoming neckties, and undersleeves, both of which are as indispensable and are undoubtedly to be worn quite as much this spring and summer.

For the spring motoring trip, a dust coat of mercerized cotton is a splendid investment, and an inexpensive one as well. These coats come in drab, cream color and linen shades. A silk and cotton mixture makes a serviceable coat, and for summer brown drill is smart. A few were shown in white drill with black collar and cuffs, and a black leather belt and black pockets. They were very chic in appearance, but the practical woman will stop to consider her laundry bills.

Some charming blouses that will be just the thing for spring wear were shown developed in Indian cashmere and plaided mousseline. The mousseline is used for the yoke, part of the sleeve and the frill in front now so much worn.

Cotton voile is a boon to women, and especially where expenses must be considered, or where many gowns must be purchased. For warm weather one will give as much service as three or four muslins. It never needs pressing and is not affected by dampness, so it is always ready to slip on, and particularly suited for seashore gowns. A pretty gown of this description came in white cotton voile of a very good quality with tiny colored dots set in groups of two over its surface. The bordering was a running arrangement of flowers. No two are just alike, and come in many colors, both light and dark. A lining is always necessary, as the goods is so transparent, but many substitutes for silk are offered for cotton gowns. Cotton voile is most useful for shirtwaists and simple morning frocks and often take the place of lawn and dimity. The prices range from 40 cents upward to 75 cents, but the material is very wide.

Cotton batiste is another material that serves well for many purposes and does not wrinkle or muss like many of the finer mercerized fabrics are apt to do. They are thirty inches wide. They often are shown in patterns. Some of them have fine stripes or a white cord running thro them.

NEWS OF COBURG AND VICINITY

Mr. and Mrs. D. Wasson were in Eugene on business Saturday.

Carl Hopkins, the precinct assessor, has just finished the assessing of this district. Of the 22 children, 10 are boys and 12 are girls.

"It kept me poor to raise such a family," said Mr. Bulger, "but I have no regrets. I believe in large families. Children are indeed an expensive luxury, but they are worth all they cost."

The Oregon Posten, a Swedish paper published in Portland, will issue a special edition about May 1, which will contain a write-up of Lane county. This edition will be circulated extensively in Minnesota and other Middle Western states where there is a large Swedish population.

RAILWAY BILL REPORTED BY CHAIRMAN MANN

Washington, April 1.—The administration railroad bill, stripped of its original features, but still providing for the creation of a commerce court, and the regulation of railway agreements, consolidations, rates, routes and securities, all as amendments to the interstate commerce law, was reported to the house today by the committee on interstate commerce. The bill was introduced by Representative Chairman Mann, of the committee, whose views are not in accordance with the administration, but who takes charge of the bill on the floor as committee chairman, though personally opposed to many of its provisions.

Special attention will be given to the construction of the road along the places where the river overflows in the winter time, and special methods will be employed there to prevent as far as possible the waters from the washing out portions of the road.

Mr. McElroy is not a civil engineer, but a practical road builder, who was trained under H. H. Chapman, road supervisor of Multnomah county, and recommended by that official to the Lane county court. He knows the road business from first to last and will build some of the best highways to be found in the state.

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By a vote of 132 to 123 the house adopted a provision amending the corporation tax law so as to provide for publicity of corporation returns at the discretion of the president alone, instead of at the discretion of the senate or house.

An inhibition against purchase or leases of capital stock of a directly or substantially competitive railroad or waterline is made in section 12, which also prohibits the same person serving on competing directorates.

It permits any corporation desiring to acquire any stock on bonds except upon application to the commission, which is to specify the respective amounts of stocks, bonds, etc., authorized to be issued for the respective purposes to which the proceeds are to be applied and stating the price—there reasonable value—at which such securities may be sold.

The commission is authorized to issue certificates in relation to stocks and bonds and to penalize officers or stockholders who assented to prohibitions.

Common carriers are authorized to enter into agreement specifying freight classification and passenger and freight transportation charges, notwithstanding existing laws, including the Sherman anti-trust law, if a copy of the agreement in form and detail prescribed by the commission is filed with that body within 20 days after it is made and at least thirty days before the classification or charges go into effect. The commission however, is vested with full authority in the matter and may suspend their taking effect.

The carriers are expressly prohibited from making any agreement for pooling or division of earnings, under penalty. A long and short haul clause is embraced in the bill, prohibiting a greater rate for a shorter than a longer distance over the same line in the same direction, the shorter being within the longer, or from receiving a greater compensation as a through rate than the aggregate of the local rates through special exceptions are authorized.

All the minority members of the committee in a separate report, oppose the commerce court, the change in the law requiring notice and hearings on restraining orders and the provision legalizing agreements among carriers if filed, even if not approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Further they think the commerce court should not be authorized to legalize consolidation by competing line by another.

A GIANT PEAR TREE NEAR COTTAGE GROVE

S. B. Morris, the nurseryman, top worked a pear tree planted in place on the Phillips place, two miles northwest of the city last week. This tree had a trunk a little over six feet in circumference two feet above the ground, and was 45 feet in height. Mr. Morris was up to a height of 22 feet and cut the branches off and put them in the fruit being worthless. It is probably the largest pear tree in this part of the country.—Leader.

DIED

George Thompson, a prominent farmer citizen of Silk Creek valley, died at his farm home, about six miles west of Cottage Grove, March 26, 1910, aged 71 years, 1 month and 9 days. Mr. Thompson was born in Sweden February 7, 1839, and came to America when but 14 years of age and lived in New York city for several years. He then went to a charter member of Washington Lodge, No. 1, I. O. O. F. He was a sailor by occupation.—Leader.

WORK BEGUN TODAY ON MODEL COUNTY ROAD

(From Friday's Daily Guard.)

The work of building the model road between Eugene and Springfield was begun this morning by the county court. John McElroy, the expert road builder from Portland, who has been engaged by the court to superintend the construction, put a force of men to work at the west approach of the wagon bridge across the river from Springfield today. The county road roller was taken over there yesterday afternoon and this morning the spikes were placed on the big wheels and the surface of the road picked up in that manner. A fill about a foot high in the low place just off the bridge to make that portion of the road more level will be about the first thing done on the road. After that is finished the crew will work toward Eugene and it is expected that the work will be completed early in the summer.

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HILL OWNER OF BOISE & WESTERN

But Railroad Builder Has No Interest in Big Land Deal

Colonel C. E. S. Wood returned yesterday from Ontario, Or., and confirmed the report published by the Oregonian Tuesday that the Willamette Valley Cascade Mountain Wagon Road, grant of 750,000 acres will probably be purchased by a syndicate of Minnesota capitalists.

Colonel Wood said that J. C. Wood, W. P. Davidson, A. C. Robertson and John E. Burchard have secured an option on the property for which they paid the sum of \$100,000. The option will run until May 1. Colonel Wood is positive in his statement that the purchasers are not acting for James J. Hill, of the Great Northern railroad, and that the plan upon which they are working cannot contemplate the acquisition of the Boise & Western railroad, of which C. E. S. Wood is president.

Boise & Western Hill Line "As president of the Boise & Western I am glad to state that it is a Hill line and that it has occupied the Malheur Canyon as the first section of its line because that is an important pass, but it is not a Hill line, and has nothing to do with the Boise & Western, nor any other railroad, so far as I know. The Boise & Western is not for sale to anybody, individual or corporation. It is a permanent part of Mr. Hill's Oregon plans."—Oregonian.

Mr. Burchard and Mr. Davidson, Mr. Robertson and Mr. Wood are land operators and have nothing whatever to do with the Boise & Western, nor any other railroad, so far as I know. The Boise & Western is not for sale to anybody, individual or corporation. It is a permanent part of Mr. Hill's Oregon plans."—Oregonian.

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BANKER MOORE ACQUITTED BY JURY

Verdict Rendered After Jurymen Were Out 29 Hours

Portland, Or., April 2.—W. H. Moore was acquitted yesterday afternoon.

Tacked on to the verdict of "not guilty," however, was a rebuke from the jury for guilty knowledge and participation in unlawful and dishonest acts in the conduct of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank.

The outcome of the two weeks' trial was a complete surprise, for the jury had been out more than 29 hours and the general belief prevailed that a "hung" jury agreement as to verdict had resulted.

Immediately following the news of the acquittal came the announcement from District Attorney Cameron that Mr. Moore would be tried again on the same issue. But of receiving a deposit in a bank knowing it to be insolvent, as soon as a second count on the list of indictments pending against him could be set for trial. The second charge will be entered on the trial docket of the Circuit court as early today as the case may be settled today by the district attorney.
